The ISRA web site has changed its address.....and it's a lot easier to remember. Please check us out at: www.illinoisracquetball.com

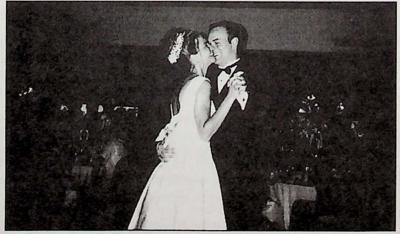
Last season's tournaments winners are changing divisions. Check last month's article listing those players moving to a new division or go to the ISRA website.

Cheryl Gudinas: Ean she win the Triple Crown of Racquetball?

Cheryl Gudinas has been having quite a year. She won the U. S. National Singles in Houston this past May and won the Pam Am Games gold medal in dramatic fashion. Her performance sparked some discussion in the racquetball internet newsgroup (alt.sport.racquetball) regarding the potential to record one of the best years ever in racquetball, if she were able to win the U. S. Open in Memphis.

If Cheryl Gudinas does win the US Open, she would be the first person to win the US National Singles, the Pan Am Games gold medal and the US Open in the same year. That would be quite an accomplishment, comparable to what Michele Gould did in 1996.

Racquetball competition in the Pan Am Games has only been held twice - in 1995 and 1999. World Championships are also held every two years (even numbered years - never the same year as the Pan Am Games). In 1995, Michele Gould won the National Singles, and also the gold medal at the Pan Am Games. There was no US Open in 1995. In 1996, she was the US National Singles Champion, World Champion and the US Open Champion. I think it will be years, if ever, before anyone puts together a streak like that. To "top" Michele's record, Cheryl would have to win the US Open, then win National's, Worlds and the US Open in 2000, the Nationals and US Open again in 2001.

However...if Cheryl wins the US Open, she'd be the first and only person to win the US National Singles, Pan Am Games Singles and US Open Singles crowns in the same year. And this feat would be on a par with Gould's Nationals, Worlds, US Open "triple crown" of 1996.

Junior Clinic Tour Status Report ____

The Junior Clinic Tour got off to a rousing start this year, with the first two stops under our belt as we go to press. The Junior Clinics are 2-3 hour training sessions for kids with some of the top racquetball players in the state. The kids are taught the forehand and backhand strokes, game techniques and training tips.

The first stop was at the Evergreen Racquet and Fitness Club, a new club to the Junior Clinic Tour. T. J. Ferro, Tour Co-commissioner, noted that the Tour hopes to continue to add new stops. The Evergreen stop picked up 17 kids, all new to racquetball. "The kids had a great time and this stop meant a lot to me personally as I really got the feeling of giving something back to the sport, said T.J. Ferro. Club Pro Winston Cole and Lee Cherry set up the stop and helped with the training duties along with Rob Ayres of Pro-Kennex and Dorothy McDavid, all of whom volunteered their time to help the kids out. The highlight of the session, according to T.J., came at the end of day when time came to give away a few gifts. "We gave away a set of eye guards, T-shirts and a new racquet from Ektelon," said T.J. "I wish I could have given away racquets to all of the kids attending, but we just do not have the funds. The look on their faces over the free stuff was just something else." As a result of this experience, the Junior Tour is looking for your help. At upcoming tournaments a box will be set up at the tournament desk so that ISRA members can donate their used racquets and equipment. The tour will see to it that these racquets find a good, loving home.

The second stop of the year was at the Glass Court in Lombard. Twenty-one kids came to the club, despite some excellent early fall weather. Most of the kids had never been to a Tour stop, even though the Tour has had sessions at the Glass Court many times in

A Triple Victory at National Doubles as Terri Graham Leads Illinois Players to Baltimore

Three events. Two different partners. Three gold medals. Not a bad week at the National Doubles for Terri Graham. As double first seeds in Women's 30+ and Women's 35+ Terri Graham along with partner Chris Evon took home double wins. Chris and Terri had to face second seeds in both finals as the draw held to form in both events. In the Women's 30+ they defeated Doreen Fowler and Sandra Kubany both from Maryland 5, 10 after only losing one game in their march to the finals. In the 35+ division they were tested early losing their first game in the finals to second seeds Kersten Hallander and Chau Phan both of California 7-15 before winning 15-7 and 11-4. Terri Graham, obviously not in Baltimore for sightseeing, took her third gold medal with Bill Lyman in Mixed 35+. Bill also came to Baltimore to get some work done as he also played in three events, taking third in Men's 35+ with Bobby Haab (Ct.) and fourth with Chris Evon in Mixed 35+.

1999's National Singles Champ and Pam Am gold medal winner, Cheryl Gudinas took second along with her partner, Jimmy Lowe of Alaska, losing to Jackie and Joe Paraiso in Mixed Opens, 5, 9. Jackie Pariso and Laura Fenton also stopped Gudinas and partner Mailia Bailey, Virginia in the semis of Women's Open on their way to their eventual victory.

Racquet Service Technician or Stringer—a primer

Ed. Note: ISRA tournament players may know Ralph Kusche, even if they don't know his name. He is usually the guy standing quietly in a corner waiting for some string disaster to strike. Many a player would not be able to get through the tournament without the comfort and security of knowing he is there. We thought we would pick Ralph's brain over the next few issues to see what is up in the world of string. Got any questions you want to ask, send them to the ISRA at http://www.illinoisracquetball.com or just pick up the phone and give Ralph a call at 618-667-8243. Just don't call him a stringer. Ralph is a Racquet Service Technician as he explains below:

Anyone can learn to become a "stringer". However, I prefer the term, Racquet Service Technician (RST), even if it sounds too politically correct. I use this term instead of stringer because so many people seem to know how to string a racquet but so few know how to do it right. A good RST will ask you about your last set of strings-how

long did they last, how was the tension, power, control etc. They will ask about your level and playing style. Is there something you'd like to have more of? How often do you play and how often do your strings break, if ever? Next. your tech should explain tension recommendations for your racquet followed by differences in string gauges. You, as the paying customer, need to be able to answer these questions to the best your ability. You should try to learn as much about your RST you can. Ask how many racquets they normally string in a given week, if the tech is familiar with your racquet and if they are willing to stand behind their work? Once you decide on your tech, you should try to observe the installation of the cross strings. This is what separates good stringers from bad. Proper cross string installation is done by weaving the first two

crosses before tensioning the first one and then continually repeating the pattern. This accomplishes two things. First, it raises the opposing main strings as you proceed along the face of the racquet thus reducing the friction of the installation. This friction can cause premature notching, where a main and a cross string intersect. Notching, along with the power of today's players cause about 90% of string breakage. Second this method speeds the stringing which gets the racquet back in the player's hands faster. Things to remember when drilling

ed. note: This is part of a continuing series from AmPRO Instructors in Illinois and around the country. This excerpt is from Leo Vasquez, AmPRO Instructor and frequent racquetball internet newsgroup participant from Plano, Texas:

- 1. Drills should be set-up with precise goals in mind for each session.
- 2. Sessions should be approximately 20 minutes in length.
- Drills allow you maximum benefits because of their repetitive form involved.
- 4. Drills should be preceded by visualization of the perfect shot and footwork.
- 5. Stick with the same drill until you get positive results.
- 6. Follow the session plan.
- 7. To avoid boredom, think creatively and modify your drills.
- 8. Work on the basics first and then add difficulty.

DRILLS

Drop and Hit: A player drops and hits the ball from several locations on the court. The player executes forehand and ceiling shots using

this drill. The player should practice passing, pinching, ceiling, offthe-backwall, splats, and vary the locations. There are many different varieties of shots that can be practiced in this manner.

Setup Off the Backwall: The player tosses the ball into the backwall and strikes the ball as if playing the ball off the backwall. The player should practice all varieties of shots from several positions with their forehand and backhand.

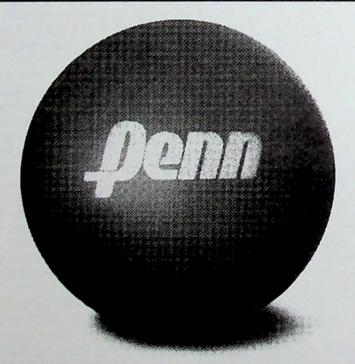
Setup Off the Frontwall: The player hits a shot that gives them a setup off the front wall. The player must execute a specific shot before the ball bounces twice.

Shuffle: To shuffle means stepping and sliding laterally from one side of the court to the other. When shuffling, both feet should be pushing, don't let the trail foot drag. Make sure both feet push off with each step. Keeping your center of gravity low, knees bent, and go as fast as you can back and forth across the court.

The amount of time you spend working on your racquetball skills will dictate your degree of success!

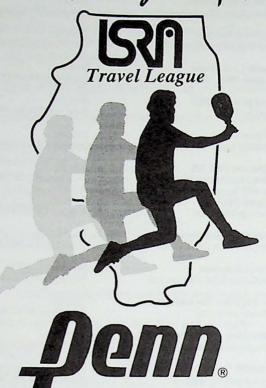
