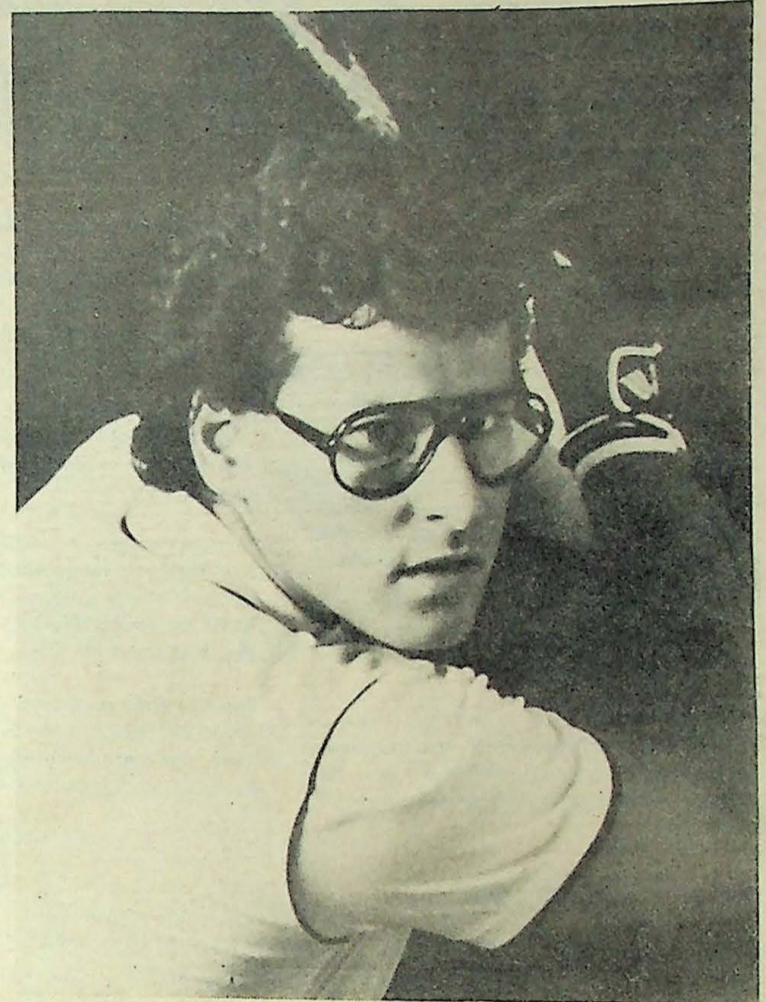

Top names come to state

A series of tournament promotions put together by the *Florida Racquet Journal* will bring the top names in racquetball to the Sunshine State this month and January. Coming to Florida are Mike Yellen, Marty Hogan, Lynn Adams and Steve Strandemo.

Yellen, the world's No. 1 player the last two years, will be at the Body Tech of Fort Walton Beach December 14-16 at the *Florida Racquet Journal* Shootout!! Yellen, who defeated Hogan in the DP Nationals the last two years for the title, will give a clinic, answer questions and put on an exhibition. Yellen will take on six-time national champ Jay Schwartz of Pensacola and former state champ and touring pro Matt Mathews. Yellen's last appearance in Florida was at the Harbour Pines Racquet Club in Florida. The tournament application is on page five. The

entry fee enables all tournament players to attend the clinic and exhibition.

The legendary Marty Hogan comes to Orlando January 4-6 for the *Florida Racquet Journal/Sports Unlimited Racquetball Challenge* at The Racquet Ball. This is the first stop of the second annual "Marty Hogan Tours America" circuit which brought him to 35 cities in 1984 as more than 17,000 racquetball enthusiasts had the opportunity to watch Hogan. The tour is presented by Marty Hogan Racquetball Division of Pro Kennex and co-sponsored by Leader Eyeguards and Ram Racquetballs.

The Hogan tour has been well received and Marty, racquetball's only millionaire and the man credited with single-handedly revolutionizing the sport, will pass along his expertise in an attempt to somehow repay a debt to racquetball for which he feels he is personally responsible for.

"I'm looking forward to coming to Orlando for this tournament and working with the *Florida Racquet Journal*. I get many requests each month to make personal appearances and I believe that I owe it to the game to travel around and honor as many of these requests as possible," Hogan said. "It's extremely gratifying to see that the sport is alive and well throughout the country and several thousand people are playing racquetball as enthusiastically as they ever have been." Two weeks later, the top female in racquetball, Lynn Adams of Costa Mesa, CA, will be at The Club in Melbourne, January 18-20 for the *Florida Racquet Journal* Showdown!. Adams, currently ranked first on the

Adams will mingle with the tournament players, give a clinic, answer questions and challenge some of the top male players in the area. The tournament flyer is on page 11.

A couple of weeks later, Steve Strandemo, regarded as the nation's top instructor, will come to Florida for his second winter racquetball camp, at the Sportrooms of Coral Gables January 24-27 and January 31-February 3. The four-day session

offers a complete instructional package for players from novice to advanced abilities. Each player will receive a personal video tape of his play during the session to take home.

Tourney Report

FORT LAUDERDALE — Ruben Gonzalez and Diane Bullard each won \$600 in the Bud Light/Ektelon racquetball tournament last month at the South Florida Racquet & Sports Club.

Ruben, who lost to Mike Ray in the final of the semipro division at the National Realty/Tom Sawyer's Auto Corner Cash Classic, defeated Tim Hansen in two games to earn the \$600. Gonzalez had defeated Hansen in Melbourne.

Hansen, the top-ranked player in the state, defeated Sergio Gonzalez to advance to the final. It was the first time Hansen defeated Gonzalez since he assumed the top ranking.

In the women's division, Bullard, who re-

cently regained her amateur status, defeated Mary Holroyd.

"It was a great tournament," said club manager Seymour Gladstone.

DAVIE — The 40+ division will no longer be dominated by Miami's Jack Ross, who has a virtual lock in that category the last year. Fort Lauderdale's Mike Winslow proved he's a force to be reckoned with. Winslow defeated Ross 11-10 in the tie-breaker during the *Florida Racquet Journal* Winter Classic at the Racquetball Club of West Broward during Thanksgiving.

Winslow also took the 30+ division.

In the men's open division, James Lorello, the former 12 and under national champ, defeated Kurt Nystrom.

REYE SYNDROME

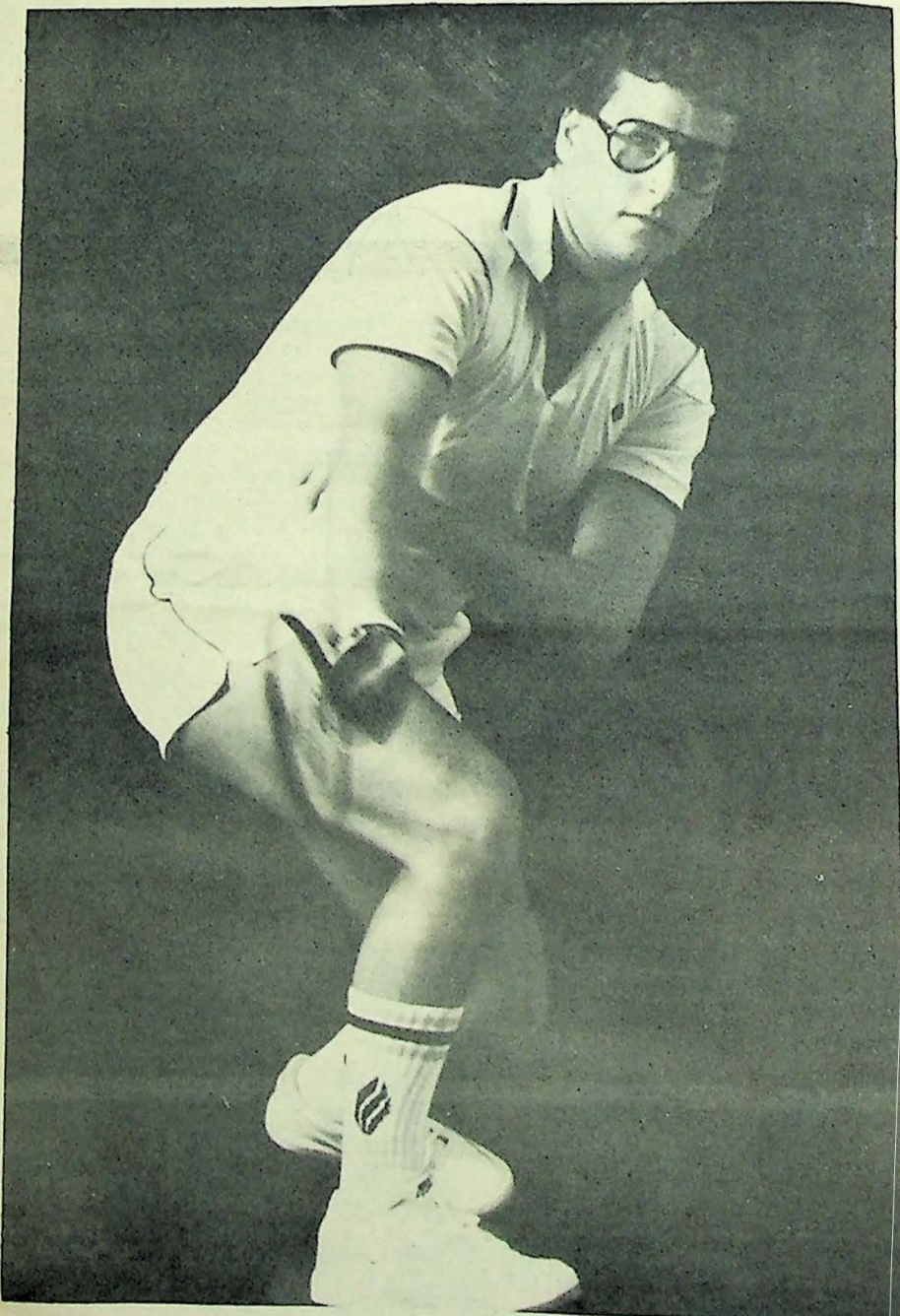

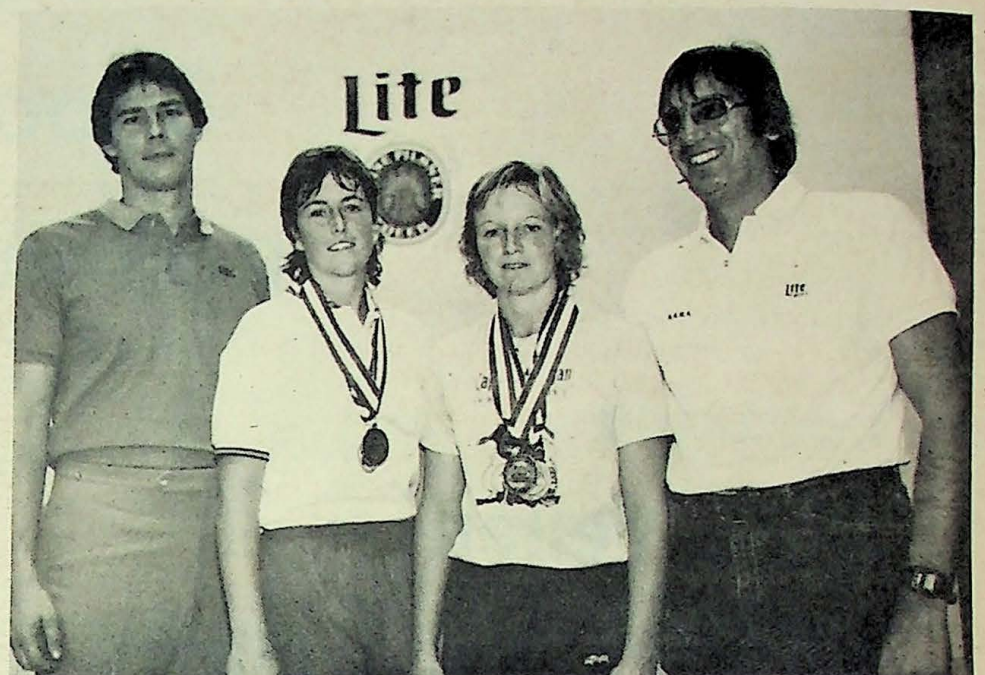

BOISE, IDAHO — They rarely travel to out-of-town tournaments and had no national titles to boast of. Their opponents weren't exactly shuddering with fear when they saw the team of Mary Lyons and Susan Morgan on the draw.

Today, Lyons and Morgan are name players, thank you.

The Jacksonville team won the National AARA 25+ Doubles Championship, defeating Florida's Diane Bullard and Julie Pinnell and lost an 11-10 tiebreaker in the open division to Bullard and Pinnell.

Having finished second in the regionals in both divisions, a strong national finish wasn't expected.

"I didn't think we were very prepared. We hadn't played together much before the tournament. We were prepared more for regionals. Of course I didn't think we would do as well as we did. Our first round was against Karen Walton Trent who has been on the pro tour and her partner," said Susan Morgan.

The Morgan/Lyons team won their first round in the open division and then defeated Marci Drexler and Theresa Nunn of California, 15-14, 15-12. Drexler was the rookie of the year on the pro circuit and a semifinalist at the DP Nationals. She also won every major amateur singles championship in 1984.

Lyons and Morgan then took on the defending national champs, Malia Kamahoa and Carol French. Lyons and Morgan defeated the champs in two straight games, 15-13 and 15-12 to advance to the final against Bullard and Pinnell.

Bullard and Pinnell had defeated them easily in the regionals. "In the regionals we didn't get 10 points against them. We were too laid back. They played that way

against us in final of the 25's and we beat them. We realized that we had to shoot the ball and everything had to be a kill shot. Because we beat them in the 25's they were really pumped up and they blew us away 15-5. We wanted to make everyone feel that we belonged in the final and it wasn't a fluke. That was the attitude Mary and I both had. We knew we could beat them and weren't coming close. I guess we just sort of got mad. We came back from 14-10 to win the second game 15-14.

"In the tiebreaker we had them. We were ahead 8-4. They came back to tie it at eight. They forged ahead 10-8 and we tied it at 10-10 and had two serves. We almost scored. Mary hit a crack serve which I thought was an ace but it was called short. We then lost the serve and they scored the final point with second server.

"The match could have gone either way. The reaction back home was outrageous. We surprised everyone. I don't think anyone had any idea we would do that well."

Mary Lyons was able to put her and Susan's performance into perspective.

"Our opponents had great reputations and were great tournament players. We felt we had the ability but didn't have the experience of playing in high-pressure tournaments," Lyons said.

Lyons and Morgan weren't the only Florida teams that did well in the nationals.

Bubba Gautier and Tim Hansen won the 19+ title and the team of Van Dubolsky and Joe Icaza took the 35+ title. Icaza and Sergio Gonzalez finished third place as the defending champs, Steve Trent and Stan Wright didn't play for third. Hansen and Gautier, Florida's state doubles champ, lost to the eventual winners, Dan Obremski and Kelvin Vantrese in the quarter finals, 12-15, 15-12, 11-9.

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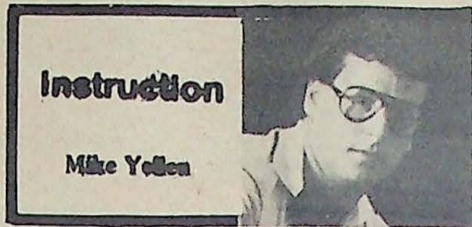
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Time-outs are more than rest

(Mike Yellen is the top-ranked player of the men's professional racquetball tour. He has held that title for two straight years. He is a regular contributor to the Journal and is a valued member of the Ektelon Professional Advisory Staff.)



In tournament play, a time-out is more than just a rest period. It's an offensive weapon you should learn to use against your opponents in the same way you use your drive serve or ceiling balls.

Too many tournament players, particularly those who are new to competition, fail to use their time-outs to their best advantage. In some cases, they forget to use them at all.

Each player is permitted three time-outs in a 15-point game and two time-outs in an 11-point tiebreaker. Time-outs are only supposed to last 30 seconds, but they usually turn out to be much longer.

Anyone who has watched a football or basketball game knows that time-outs can be very useful in those sports when the team which is behind wants to prolong the game.

That function doesn't really apply in a racquetball match where the duration of the game is measured by the number of points scored, rather than a time clock.

One reason for using a racquetball time-out is to give you time to get over a sudden onset of fatigue.

You should be in good enough shape to play three hard games in every match. But, after a particularly long rally in a competitive match, you easily find yourself huffing and puffing.

That's a very good time to call a time-out because your opponent can run off a couple of points on you anytime you slow down.

The greatest value is derived from your time-outs, though, when you use them to help you control the momentum of the game. Momentum and who controls it is a critical factor in any racquetball game.

When it's on your side, it seems as though you can do no wrong! More shots score for you while your opponent, who is on the defensive, seems to have every close one go against him.

Momentum is a two-way street, though, and the advantage will usually change several times during a competitive game.

Points are often scored in streaks so, when you see that your opponent is on a roll, cool him off by calling a time-out.

Never mind whether it is early or late in the game (that goes for calling time-outs when you are tired, too). If your opponent starts running off points that you aren't about to answer, break it off even if the score is only 4-0.

Too many players have been conditioned by "Monday Night Football" to save

their time-outs until "later in the game when they will really need them."

A racquetball game is a much shorter contest, and, too often, "later" never comes.

The same advice applies even if you happen to be the player sitting on a hefty lead. I've seen too many of those evaporate when the leader lets even a little of the pressure of.

It was P.T. Barnum who said, "Never give a sucker an even break." Don't give your racquetball opponent a break of any kind, unless you're into losing.

Racquetball is a game of seconds and inches. It can all be turned around by an impossible shot that scores, a bad call by the referee or even a momentary lapse in concentration.

Which brings us to another good reason for using a time-out; to regain your concentration.

It's important to have a game plan custom-tailed to each new opponent you meet and to make alterations in your plan as the game progresses.

Maintaining your concentration is vital. My Ektelon teammate Dave Peck may have the best concentration in the game. You can't afford to just stand around and wait to see where the ball is going to go next. You must anticipate and try to alter the flow of the game to your own advantage.

It's a full-time job, so, anytime you find that your mind isn't on business, call a

time-out. Again it doesn't matter whether it's during the first two points of the game or the last two or whether you are ahead or behind.

What should you do during a time-out? Whatever your reason for call it — to rest, cool off your opponent or get yourself back on track — don't squander it.

Use the time to analyze what is happening in the game and determine what alterations, if any, have to be made to keep things going your way. Ask yourself which shots are working for you, which are working for your opponent and where you both have weaknesses.

You should be doing the same thing during your opponent's time-outs. Remember, he gets the same number you do.

There are many other interruptions possible during a game. The ball may break or the floor need wiping. Each player can stall for 10 seconds before every serve.

These starts and stops can break up the pace of the game and can be used to throw off an opponent's concentration. Use these opportunities and learn to recognize when they are being used against you.

Given the nature of racquetball, I would say that you should be able to find plenty of reasons to use at least two of your three time-outs every game.

The exception, of course, is when you are the guy on a streak and your opponent isn't bright enough to call a time-out to slow you down.

As a rule, though, if you aren't using your time-outs, you're letting the other guy off too easy.

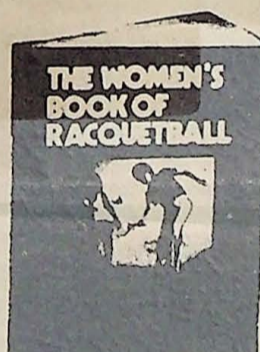
