




THE HISTORY OF CLEVELAND STATE UNIVERSITY



THE HISTORY OF THE OHIO RACQUETBALL ASSOCIATION

The Ohio Racquetball Association was formed in July 1974 with a meeting of representatives from across the state for the purpose of approving the Ohio Racquetball State Constitution and election of state officers.

The State Racquetball Association Constitution with By-Laws was approved and has been properly recorded. In addition, the State has granted a Charter for the formation of the Association and it is duly recorded in Columbus, Ohio.

The following are the officers elected who also serve on the Executive Committee:

The State is divided into essentially four geographical districts. Each district has or will have a representative who will sit on the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall determine the direction of racquetball in the State of Ohio in accordance with the wishes of the State members and the State Constitution.

Each district representative is responsible for the promotion of racquetball within his district. He also provides a source for the members in that district to express their feelings on the development of racquetball both on a local as well as a national level. He coordinates racquetball activity within this district, reporting it to the Home Office in order that a Newsletter can be sent to all members of the O.R.A. informing them of developments around the State.

Each district is also participating in League play with the clubs meeting in a home and home series with clubs in that division for a total of 8 matches in a period from October thru April.

In April a playoff will be held between Districts in the State which will determine a State Team Champion.

Team play consists of 6 players ranked 1 thru 6. The number 1 player plays the other number 1 player two games of 21 points. Subsequently, the number 2 thru number 6 players play their counterpart two games of 21 points also. This provides a total of 21 team points in singles. Then the number 1 player becomes partners with his number 6 player and plays the other team's number 1 & 6 players a game of doubles of one game of 21 points. Subsequently, the number 2 & 5 and 3 & 4 play their counterparts. This provides a total of 3 team points in the doubles play. The total match then consists of 15 team points. The winner of the League, again of the season, is the team with the best winning percentage.

The growth of racquetball in the State of Ohio has been aided by the cooperation of all clubs, private and public. The 1971 League play consisted of a couple of invitational matches between 2 or 3 clubs in Northeast Ohio. This was followed in 1972 by a League of 6 clubs. In 1973, it was a League of 8 clubs and this year, 1974, teams. This type of growth will be experienced both in the Northwest District 1 as well as the Southern Districts 3 & 4.

The growth of the sport in a sense is a natural one but there are two people that have devoted an extra effort to the promotion of racquetball. One is Gerry Lapierre who is the first President of the Ohio Racquetball Association and former member of the Executive Committee of the International Racquetball Association. His efforts have always been to organize the State into an Association for the control of its own destiny and the promotion of the sport of racquetball. Second is Reed Gunselman who has promoted League play locally in Northeast Ohio and now this year the League has developed into play around the State.

The Association feels that racquetball is in the infant stage and within the next few years we will see a phenomenal growth in the number of players.
"Be a swinger and join the racquetball team".

THE HISTORY OF RACQUETBALL

Racquetball was started in 1949 by Joe Sobek who is credited with inventing the game. The original name of the game was "Paddle - Racquets". Prior to 1949 Sobek left his profession as a tennis and squash pro and was working in a white collar job with a Bridgeport, Connecticut company. His answer to the lack of physical activity was supplied at the local Greenwich YMCA. However, there were problems as to what activities he could participate in conveniently. Handball was too painful for the hands. However, paddleball was interesting because of its similarity to squash. He thought that paddleball could be a more interesting game if a strung racquet were used rather than a solid-faced wooden version.

Sobek designed a racquet with the same weight and measurements as the paddle, but with the additional advantage of a string-hitting surface. He took this design to a New England manufacturer of tennis racquets, squash racquets and badminton frames. The original order of 25 racquets were made from the badminton frames.

With these racquets, Sobek started a group playing at the Greenwich "Y". The new racquet opened up a new game as its resilient strings created all kinds of new shots.

In those early days, the only ball suitable was a Spalding red, white and blue child's ball. As the supply became exhausted, Sobek then put out a request to friends traveling throughout the country to buy this ball wherever it could be found in toy stores. Finally, the supply was exhausted. Sobek went to Spalding only to find that they did not plan to make this ball any longer. Spalding did, however, have a pink rubber ball that was similar to the inside core of a tennis ball. They had to wait two years before the ball lost its compression and would match the old play ball they had been using. This was used for many years as well as a softer ball, which was blue in color and developed especially for Joe Sobek.

The rules for the game were derived primarily from Squash rules. Over the years Sobek was reluctant to make changes, but most of those that were made concerned revisions in the serves. Sobek decided there must be uniformity in rules if the game was to grow. Hence, he organized a committee and compiled the present rules. He also formed the National Paddle Racquet Association to control the rules and promote the game.

The sport spread rapidly from the Greenwich "Y" as players moved to other towns and introduced the sport. During those early years, the "National Championships" were held at the Greenwich "Y" in Connecticut and the championships were really identified as Paddle-Racquets. In those early years, Sobek would often send a YMCA four racquets and several balls and ask them to try out the sport. He did this very frequently in the years from 1949 thru 1959 and as a result the sport spread rapidly throughout the nation's YMCA's. In this ten years, Sobek reports that the early participants in the game consisted of approximately 50 percent handball players and the remaining players from other racquet sports.

Even though Sobek had played many racquet sports, he felt that paddle-racquets had more to offer than any of the others. It proved to be a wonderful winter activity. It was also fun, gave tremendous exercise and was easy to learn. Another advantage was that anyone, young or old, could step into the court and play at his own pace. As the game continued to grow during the 60's and spread out into many other geographic areas and also into private clubs, many different types of balls were used in an experimental effort to find out which was most satisfactory. The official ball is now Seamco 558. Also during this same period of time the game was played under a number of different names, such as: "paddle-racquets", "paddle-tennis" and "paddleball", etc.

It was not until 1969 that the first International Tournament was organized. This first tournament was held in St. Louis, Missouri and the first singles I.R.A. Champion was Dr. Bud Muehleisen. At this time the International Racquetball Association was established through the resources and leadership of Robert Kandler and the U.S. Handball Association. The new leadership brought together most of the splinter groups throughout the country. Soon the newly formed association became the International Racquetball Association, or as it is referred to, the I.R.A.

Joe Sobek, the Father of Racquetball and Dr. Bud Muehleisen the first I.R.A. singles champion have been selected as charter members of the Racquetball Hall of Fame.
