The Bud Light banquet provided the setting for the presentation of Michigan's most prestigious racquethall awards. The award nominees are selected after evaluating last year's tournament results and the list of nominees is then sent out in August to 50 of Michigan's most prominent racquethall personalities. The Hall of Fame nominees must meet certain established criteria before being selected for inclusion on the ballot. To accentuate the importance of these awards, professional players and

and HEAD are asked to make the award presentations

This year the junior scholarship award was increased to \$2000. Originally the award wes set at \$500 but a group of individuals (Dr Fred Lewerenz, J.R. Slavik, Tom Blakeslee, Jim Hiser and Mike Yellen) decided to make enough contributions to raise the award to the present amount. To qualify for the award, the individual must be efficient in both academics and racquetbell. This year's scholarship was divided between Jimmy Floyd and Nick Rallis.

Both individuals carried 3.9 grade points, were active in school activities and had excellent racquetball seasons. The award recipients do not receive their scholarships until they are full time registered students in college, and they must continue to play intercollegiate racquetball.

The Hall of Fame Inductees for this year were Stu Hastings and Bob Wilhelm. Both inductees had been previously nominated for this prestigious award. Bob in 1984, 85, 86 and Stu in 1985 and 86. The accomplishments of both Stu and Bob

are too numerous to mention, but both recipients will have their photo and description of accomplishments placed in the Hall of Fame display case at Davison Racquet Club.

Other award winners were Outstanding Female - Irene Chmura, Outstanding Male - Stu Hastings, Most Improved Male - Joel Bonnett and Sean McCune, and Most Improved Female - Lori Troszak. Also, the Outstanding Contribution Award went to Dianne Easterling

BUD LIGHT - HEAD PRO-AM Attracts Largest Draw Ever

The 10th annual Bud Light — HEAD Pro-Am attracted over 550 entrants from three Canadian providences and twenty-two states. The Bud Light event is annually considered Michigan's premiere racquetball event and this year's tournament was no exception. Hosting a sit-down banquet, outdoor beer tent, two dances, chicken barb-que and of course the nation's top players, this year's event was the most successful in the tournament's ten year history.

The banquet is the only banquet on the professional tour and provides the forum for the presentation of both amateur and professional awards. Receiving professional awards for 1986-87 were Bret Harnett outstanding player; Ruben Gonzalez sportmanship and Egan Inoue - most improved. Also receiving awards were Michigan's outstanding racquetball players from last season (see player award story).

Cliff Swain started the 87-88 season by defeating Marty Hogan 11-4, 7-11, 2-11, 11-8, 11-5. Swain's devastating serve and

tremendous retrieving ability proved too much for Marty on this occasion. Marty displayed his immaturity by insulting both the spectators and sponsors during his acceptance speech. Marty's inability to comprehend the realisms of professional racquetball combined with his declining popularity seems to have produced an overpowering frustration which Hogan is unable to handle.

Of the thirty five divisions offered, Michigan players captured 15 titles Those winners were: Scott McPherson - Mens C; Robert Pfieffer Mens D; Joel Bonnett - 18 & Under; Scott Zimmerman - Boys 12 & Under; Al Tackett - Mens 25+; Dave Rodriguez - Mens 30+; Terry Lawlor - Mens 30B; Stu Hastings - Mens 35A+; Jim Hiser - Mens 40A; Charles Wheelihan - Mens 45B; Lynn Hahn - Mens 55+; M. Riley & M., Niedzielski - Mens C Doubles; Carol Collish - Womens A; Tracey Troszak - Womens 19+ and Beth Gutowski - Womens 30A.



NEW REGIONAL DIRECTOR


A new regional director for region 9 (Michigan, West Virginia and Ohio) has been selected by Jim Hiser previous regional director







Hi, Susie Smothers here. I'm twelve Well . . . really I'm eleven and a half . . but I look twelve! - at least the boys say I do. My brother and I are in Florida attending the national racquetball portion of the Junior Orange Bowl.

Hundreds of star juniors representing racquetball's best are here competing in grueling, fight-to-the-finish, contests. My first-round match, for example, was a thriller which went to the eleven point. tie-breaker. I lost it. And entered the long list of those who have been beaten by the number one and number two seeds of the tournament.

Oh well ... my brother is still in the tournament so there remains a player who is proudly wearing a collared shirt with the name "SMOTHERS" embroidered across the back.

Coming into today's championship rounds my brother was the only "giant killer" still playing in the tournament. His triumphant, first-round match against the number two seed was awesome. Boy was

In today's match his opponent is Johnny Lee Mack - number one seed! He even looks the part: dark wavy hair suntanned rippled with muscles. His lean, muscular frame swiftly leaps about the court like a jungle cat.

Since the first day he has had an everincreasing troupe of followers who support him with loud chanting which I don't mind saying "I can't stand!"

When he entered the court for today's championship match against my brother, they were already screaming loud enough to scare the dust bunnies out of the court: "Panther!" "Panther!" "Panther!"

And besides that, next to the jungle panther my brother, William Tell Smothers III (I will call him "Bill" for obvious reasons), looked more like a brainy, computer whiz kid than a finalist in a national racquetball tournament. Wirerimmed, Coke bottle-bottom glasses were always the first thing anyone ever noticed when my not-so-muscular brother Bill entered the court. And, behind those magnifiers they saw a clear, boyish face. He is after all, nearly two years younger

than Johnny Lee Mack

Speaking of him: as he stood by the side glasswall of the court with shoulders so broad and with so well-developed arms and legs, I truly began to fear all that I was hearing around me: Johnny Lee probably did have a banana-peel slide into the championship!

Before seeing the two of them there actually together, I had really felt that the courtside talk was going to be wrong and that my brother was going to win this Junior Orange Bowl, But when I saw them together - Johnny Lee was awesome looking.

My hopes began to build once again, however, when Bill moved toward the front section of the court. That's where he practices his favorite shot; he calls it the layup option.

He coined the feather touch shot a lay⊔p″ for its ease and reliability: thus, to him it closely resembled the simple layup in basketball. The shot is a low, soft pinch which he has so mastered that it simply floats into the front forehand corner. When he's on, I have never seen anyone be able to get to it before its second bounce. And I heve never seen another junior ever shoot the leyup shot as effeciently and lightly, as my brother.

Another key to his overwhelming success with the shot is his computer mind patience. Moving to the front of the court, he always knows where he is, where the ball is, and where his opponent is. With the racquet up and arm muscles flexed, his eyes ere trained to watch his opponent with peripheral vision as they stay focused on the forward-moving ball. Finally, as the bell floats closer toward the front he never reveals his choice of shots until his opponent makes the first move: that is, whether he is going to lightly hit his layup or smash its option — a hard low downthe-line screamer!

In game one however, Johnny Lee Mack never gave him the chance to even try it once. Even worse, when the score was 11.2 and the large, patronizing noise machine was raising the roof. Johnny Lee dove nearly a third of the court! extending his racquet straight out in front of him - to put away a cross court pass! That flying spectacle caused the loud, boisterous pulsating to throb throughout the rest of the game

The final score was: 15-2 Mack.

In game two the piercing pandemonium started with Johnny Lee's first point. It continued until halfway through, During the vile massacre, I leaned back against the chair so that my embroidered "SMOTHERS" shirt couldn't be read. I seriously even considered retreating to a quiet, solitary game of Donkey Kong.

Bill's agility, however, finally sparked! And we could see the momentum begin to

Getting frustrated, Johnny Lee began to lose his precise hitting and timing Consequently, my brother was to be able to play his style of ball. His computer mind and his awesome control muzzled Johnny Lee and his rambunctious crowd for the better part of the remainder of the game.

The final score for game two was 15-13 Smothers!

Going to the courtside drinking fountain to splash water on his face, game two was his; but he had fought so hard that he looked like a wrung-out two year old's

Rebuking his body's demand for rest, I could sense that he was telling himself that his exhaustion would be gone the moment he stepped back on the court. Then he knew that from somewhere down deep within, latent energy would surface

Next, I could see him trying to focus upon what had been the key to the turnaround in game two which had given him the victory. His computer's decision (I found out later - probably at least a dozen times just in our long ride home!) was that it was his ability to keep the ball in play until Johnny Lee made a poor hit which resulted in his being able to shoot his most lethal shot: the layup option.

Still looking down at him I saw him savor one last long drink and smile I did too!

I then turned and looked over at Johnny Lee Mack. He was still sitting, frustrated and dejected, by the glass backwall of their court: his head down between his knees His shirt and shorts were thoroughly soaked.

'Mark," I heard a neighbor-spectator say to a friend "I really like this Smother's

DO YOU DESERVE A SLUMP TODAY?

The first step to getting out of a slump is to know when you are in a slump. Define the problem What is a slump?

A slump may be defined as playing below your normal standard. We will all play badly from time to time. How long must you play badly to constitute a slump? A bad game? A bad match? A bad tournament? Below standard for a week or a month? There is no set answer to this question. Only you can answer this question based on your normal level of consistency.

I feel that there are many different causes for slumps. Slumps are not always simple to pinpoint. They are many times multifaceted. Listed below are a few common causes of slumps and their cures.

SLUMP 1: Overthinking — This is when people over analyze everything. They skip 2 shots in a row and talk themselves into a slump. They figure that every bad shot, game match, or tournament has a reason.

CURE 1: Sometimes s—t happens and you just get beat Don't turn a mole hill into a mountain. Sometimes you need to relax and go with the flow. If you don't, you can mentally bring on a slump just like an illness.

SLUMP 2: Playing over your head — This happens when you are always playing competition too high for your level

CURE 2: It is good to play better players, but you should have a mixture: players below you that you can experiment on; players equal to you that you play dead eyen; and players above you that you try to play up to which helps raise your level of play. The key is balance. If you are learning to swim in the deep end, be careful that you don't drown before you learn

SLUMP 3: Lack of good competition — You play to the level that you are playing. If you only have lower level players to play you tend to lower your standard or level of play.

CURE 3: You may have to travel to other clubs to find the better players, but exposure to this level is the only way to reach it.

SLUMP 4: Injury — An injury can make you tentative and unsure of yourself. Depending on the seriousness of the injury and the length of time away from the game can determine how you will be affected.

CURE 4: Try and keep your mind in the game even if you can't play physically. Read; watch tournaments, referee talk

6 weeks with a bad ankle. Even though I couldn't play or move, I would stand with most of my weight on my right foot and drill certain shots. I would work on shots that didn't need movement. I worked on around the wall balls, ceiling balls, drop and hit shots from all areas of the court, and kill shots. Until this time I basically tried to beat my opponent by angles. I would move him from side to side, front to back, until he was out of position to make one of my shots a winner. This is a good enough strategy, but there are times when you need to kill the ball to be effective. It was during this ankle-cast period that I worked on ending the rally with 1 shot. I would give myself a setup and pretend that I couldn't move another step. (I guess I really wasn't pretending) and I had to end the rally on this next shot.

Until this time. I had always heard that kill shots were low percentage shots. However, I soon realized that the more you practice a shot the more high percentage it becomes. After all, if you make more than you miss, it's high percentage. As the game has evolved in the 80's, shooting the ball is a tool that all good players must have when needed. This is why I tell people that sometimes injuries can make them better players because it makes them slow down and think about the game, rather than only play physically.

SLUMP 5: Lost play time due to family work or personal obligations.

CURE 5: Sometimes we love this game so much taht we feel it is as important as family, work, and life obligations. Even though we hate to admit it, racquetball is recreation, something to be played after our obligations are met not to be used to avoid these obligations. What I mean, is take care of these obligations first and clear your mind: If you don't, it's always in the back of your mind while you are trying to play, and playing just will not be as fun It detracts from the feeling. The key is to keep a balance in life. Like I told a racquetball friend recently, "It's tough to play top racquetball when your personal or professional life is not in order

SLUMP 6: Trying to be too creative in your shot selection — This can produce poor execution.

CURE 6: Look at the top professionals of any sport and you will usually find that they win through a consistent steady game plan — not flash. They might show a little razzle dazzle to keep their opponent guessing or off balance, but they stick primarily to a sound high percentage. high execution game plan. The players that always seem to win or be near the top consistently aren't flash players.

SLUMP 7: Overtraining and overplaying — This usually results in a tired or injured player with no desire to play. Our American thinking of more is better comes into play here. This has been one of my greatest problems throughout my career. If 10 hours of racquetball is good, and 20 hours is better than 30 hours a week would be best

CURE 7: The body needs rest. Only you can decide how much down time you need.

This reason for being in a slump does not affect most people. However, those of you tat overplay-or overtrain might want to remember that even though you may love this game, think of it as your favorite food. Even though you love pizza for example, you could only eat it morning, noon and night for so long then you would lose interest in it. You might even hate it. Remember to keep a balance in life. Too much of anything can be detrimental to success or growth

SLUMP 8: Lack of a purpose or goal produces lack of dedication. As humans we rarely do something without having a reason to do it. We typically lose our desire or dedication when we reach our goal or realize we can't reach it.

CURE 8: When we reach our goal, it is important to set a new goal right away. Be specific in your goal setting and set short term & long range goals. Then, even when you reach an intermediate goal there are always long term goals to strive for. If your goal can't be reached and you know it, it doesn't mean you have to quit racquetball; it simply means you should lower your standards to something that is attainable. Then after you reach this new goal go after your original goal.

If your goals are unreasonable based on your efforts toward reaching that goal, you are setting yourself up for a fall. See the following equations

A Hard Work + Reasonable Goals = Success

B. Too Little Work + Unrealistically High Goals = Failure & Frustration

C. Hard Work + Unrealistically Low Goals = Dissatisfying and Unrewarding Success
By setting equation A to work for you, you have purpose and a direction and a path to follow, It makes your work easier

to do when you know where you are going. Example of how it works: When I graduated from college, got a teaching job right away. I had my own apartment, a new car, and was coaching 2 school sports. I was on my own doing whatever I wanted to do I was also very unhappy and didn't know why. I now had everything that I had dreamed of as a young teenager. I took a while to figure it out, but the reason I was unhappy was that my dream (goal) had come true. That long high school and college journey to independence, freedom, and self sufficience had become a destination. I had arrived and didn't know it

I realized I needed a new challenge because I was going nowhere. I needed a new goal. I started a masters degree program immediately. This was my new goal or journey path. Teaching school and coaching full time. I went to school at night full time and finished within a year. After that, I started a journey into racquetball.

There are obviously other reasons why we get into slumps such as undertraining,

being overweight, poor eating habits, etc. The list goes on. The main key to remember is that you need to pinpoint the problem area so that you can set up a plan to attack it. If your strokes and game plans are bad, then you should seek your teaching professional out to get some medicine for them. But realize that if your strokes are really ill, it will take time to cure them. Many times players come to me and I feel like they want me to put my hand on their forehead, bow our heads and say, "let's pray." It doesn't work like that. It takes hard work, But oh, it's worth it when the success comes. It's an investment in your racquetball future. Anything attained easily usually isn't worth having

DON'T PANIC. When you get into the slump, many times it's just a little thing. If you don't panic and overthink, it can be just as easy to get your confidence back as it was to lose it.

KISS - Keep It Simple Stupid Keep things as simple as possible. The more simple the machine, the easier it is to repair. Frae yourself from complicated shots and strategies. Keep it basic.

WHAT GOT YOU HERE - Sometimes

WHAT GOT YOU HERE — Sometimes along our path on this racquetball journey, we get sidetracked. In the Rocky movies, I find inspiration. Rocky lost his confidence in The Eye of The Tiger movie. He was still a good fighter but he didn't believe in himself. Rocky had lost his old values and training methods because of success. Apollo took Rocky back to the old days where they both had started under a different value system and work ethic. What they found was a bunch of hungry fighters. (Eye of The Tiger). They had that look in their eye. That look of do whetever it takes.

Racquetball players are very similar. When they first come to me, they are hungry. If I ask them to drill, they drill. If I ask them to play a certain style, or train a certain way or play in certain tournaments, or a certain class lose weight, etc., they do it. Then they get a measure of success and they get lazy. This is typical of most people. Success spoils them. Their level of play drops or stays the same and their game stagnates because they refuse to work like they once did, when they were hungry. I guess it depends on the standards you hold for yourself.


Go back to what got you to where you are today. Don't forget that whatever got us here to begin with is a good bet to get us back again.

Volunteers Like Jerry Gray Help Collegiate Racquetball Grow

In the midst of the old logging town of Big Rapids, Michigan exists a modern machine. The name of that machine is Jerry Gray, Midwest Collegiate Regional Director for the American Collegiate Racquetball Association (ACRA). Jerry started getting involved in collegiate racquetball about 4 years ago, and has worked nonstop since that time. Jerry started the Midwest Collegiate Regionals in 1985 first held at Purdue University. Participation has been growing steadily and last year at Milwaukee, a total of 80 students competed in singles and doubles in the event. Jerry also coaches the men's team at Ferris State College

point is for the championship so your main priority is to never give that layup a chance to develop in the first place."

Confidence exuded from him when he returned to the court - a smile highlighted his beaming face. We all sensed that he was almost desiring the opportunity to put his coach's theory to the test,

In honor of these two excellent competitors, none of the crowd ever sat down during the time out Obviously our noise never calmed down till Bill prepared to servel

Then the place was hushed. Really hushed!

His hard, deceptive serve to Johnny Lee's forehand would have been an ace against anyone else! Johnny Lee's return, however though having been hit offbalanced sent my brother deep into the back court.

Bill answered with a splat shot that Johnny Lee dove for and barely retrieved. On the next exchange, Johnny Lee took over the offensive. Twice I thought that he had won back the serve with hard killshots; only to see Bill's agility keep the ball in play! - going down on all fours both times!

Then it happened!

Johnny Lee was going to get his chance. His off-balanced ceiling shot was poorly

Keeping his eyes fixed upon the ball. Bill effortlessly moved toward the front forehand court. He watched (as we all watched!) with his peripheral vision

Johnny Lee move into the service area:

Jerry's position as a regional director automatically puts him on the board of the national committee of the ACRA under commissioner, Neil Shapiro, Jerry has been very active at the national level. Draw sheets for both the collegiate regionals and the nationals were prepared by Jerry. The national ACRA board meets in Big Rapids every summer at the cottage of Dr. Matt Klein, the State Collegiate Director. The Midwest Region includes Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska: Tentative plans for the 1988 regionals are to host the event at the

multi-million dollar sports facility at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL.

Marketing students at Ferris State College have completed numerous research studies for Mr Gray Research shows that racquetball is growing at the collegiate level. Many midwest universities have added between 7 and 15 courts to meet the demand. Most college courts are packed between 5 and 11 p.m. It takes people like Jerry to make sure that students have the opportunity to compete among other colleges.

As Midwest Regional Director, Jerry has many duties and if you check out this picture, you'll wonder whether his real business is surveying and engineering or racquetball. Jerry's office staff is trained to handle all types of racquetball telephone inquiries

Jerry runs the collegiate regionals, continues to search for new teams and new coaches/advisors and is in charge of

the scoring at the nationals. Jerry also initiated a new collegiate computer scoring program, designed by Ferris computer graduate, Tim Purcey. The system allows any team to know their standing at any time. Usually at the nationals, teams other than first or second place have to wait a week to find out how they finished. Jerry pays most of his own expenses to help the collegiate racquetball cause He also pays some expenses of the Ferris team, and has sponsored many local tournaments.

Jerry's personal mission with racquetball stems from a change he made 7 years ago in his personal lifestyle. Jerry suffered a heart attack at age 39 and decided that the lifelong sport of racquetball was his ticket to health. Jerry also runs and lifts weights. Referee/Rules Clinic

The Referee/Rules Clinic presented by Jim Easterling at Gateway Racquet Club on October 21st was attended by 12 members of the Metro Women's Touring

AARA rules were discussed - including the new rules effective this year. Some rules discussed included: ball hitting a player faults, foot faults, crotch serves, screen serves, body contact, time outs, 10 second rule, hinders, avoidable hinders, contacting the ball behind the receiving line, technicals and technical warnings and forfeitures Above all a referee must remember - SAFETY FIRST.

We learned that a lot of calls are based on the referee's judgement; i.e. screen serves; or whether a ball would have made it to the front wall if it would not have hit

We also learned, as a referee, how to get the respect of a player - let them know you won't put up with profanity by issuing a technical - Rule 14 A 1

Also, how to control the match by making calls loud and quickly. And that referees are human and can make mistakes.

A few points to remember as a referee: Know the rules; safety first; if you make a mistake - you can change the call; control the match - don't put up with unsportsmanlike conduct

A few points to remember as a player: Know the rules; safety first; control your temper — it can work to your disadvantage; don't give the referee a hard time - you may be the ref in the next match!

Dear Racquetball Reporter:

As the 87-88 racquetball season approaches I remember my thoughts at the end of last season. I remember my thoughts as my son turned 20. This time instead of worrying because he didn't work out enough, or whatever, I would like to let myself play proud papa. In essence I am a proud father and appreciate the accomplishments of Chris Cole before he was 20.

In the 1986-87 season Chris won the State Open Singles Championship for the third consecutive year. It was his fourth title in the last five years which meant he was 15 when he won his first, the next to last MRA title. He won the State Open Doubles, with Stulland four Super 7 tournaments. Of the 20 tournaments he entered he won 11, a remarkable achievement.

I am a proud father not only because of his playing record but how he has conducted himself off the court. For example, when he was 16 the junior racquetball team was in debt. He raised money by holding a tournament, with prize money; he handled all of the responsibilities himself. He raised hundreds of dollars. For the last three years he has been a chaperone for the junior team. He was a chaperone at the same time he was a member of Team Michigan and a participant in the national tournament finishing third his last year. He was the only player not to have a chaperone listed for him and the AARA waived that rule for him. It meant that those in charge of the team and those in the AARA office thought enough of his character to give him extra responsibilities.

Finally, over the years, he has been offered more money and equipment than that given by his present sponsors. He felt that honesty and loyalty were more Important than personal material gain; therefore, he stayed with Ektelon (7 yrs.) and Asahi (3 yrs.) I am proud of Chris and I believe the people in the state can be proud of him too.
