Sugar Land's Safe Return Registry



Who amongst us doesn't appreciate a happy ending? Many of us have family members and/or friends who are non-verbal or affected by Austim, Alzheimer's, Dementia, or some other mental/intellectual disability.

Safe Return was implemented by the

Sugar Land Police Department in order to assist during encounters with members of the community having special needs. The program evolved from discussions between Sugar Land Police Officers and local parents.

When seconds count in an emergency situation, the Safe Return Program registry allows first responders to have access to critical information designed to help safely reunite families of registered participants.

Participation in the program is **completely voluntary and free.** An application must be submitted to the Sugar Land Police Department annually. Eligibility includes:

- Participant or guardian is a resident of Sugar Land
- Participant attends school within SLPD jurisdiction

- **Participant** may be unable to communicate basic personal information due to a diagnosed medical disorder. ■
- Participant is prone to wander away or runaway from guardians, residence or school due to a diagnosed medical disorder.
- **™**Guardians voluntarily submit a completed application and photo with all required medical information.

You must renew and register again ANNUALLY. The City suggests doing so on the registrant's birthday so you won't forget. You will **not** be notified.

Did you know?

The City of Sugar Land has parking restrictions that limit parking for a maximum of 48 hours without moving the vehicle. We have had reports of passenger vehicles parked very close to intersections (less than the 10 feet restriction) and frequently for extended periods of time, sometimes weeks. This limits the view of oncoming vehicles and creates an unsafe situation for both residents and emergency vehicles (Not to mention trash trucks.)

PS Lightwave Fiber Optic Cable Progress

PSL started the burial project that will lead to taking the low fiber optic cable down from the poles in Commonwealth last month. They began at Scenic Rivers Drive and are working west along the south side of Commonwealth Blvd.

Most of Commonwealth was covered with utility easements that required all utilities other than electric distribution facilities to be buried. Most developers granted aerial easements for telecom and electric distribution public utilities so PS Lightwave didn't bother to worry about easements. We caught them and now they are having to spend quite a bit of money to do what they should have done from the beginning in Commonwealth and Avalon. On an unfortunate note, when Perry Homes took over the development of Commonwealth they declared an aerial telecom public utility easement in Bridgewater III around the southwest corner of Commonwealth near Avondale. That declaration allowed Entouch to run their fiber optic cable on the utility poles from the FCLID 2 pump station to around behind Berkshire Ct where it crosses the levee into Riverstone.

LET'S TALK GREEN WASTE

Green waste service is provided once a week and is recycled into mulch or compost at a composting facility.

Green waste includes: Grass clippings - Leaves - Brush - Tree limbs - Christmas trees (ornaments and lights removed) Organic material produced in your yard or garden.

Does **not** include food waste or treated wood.

Program Guidelines:

Set your green waste out by 7 a.m. on your collection day but no earlier than 6 p.m. the evening before. No more than 10 cubic yards will be collected.

Loose materials such as grass clippings and leaves should be placed in a reusable container or in bags and tied. Clear or translucent bags are recommended. Compostable bags are not required.

If a reusable container is used, it needs to be removed from the curb by the end of the day, after your collection has occurred. Brush and tree limbs must be less than 4 inches in diameter and less than 4 feet in length; or between 4 and 6 inches and less than 2 feet in length.

Brush and tree limbs must be stacked in small piles (3 feet high and 3 feet wide). Bundling of tree limbs is not required, but recommended.

Green waste should be set out at the curb at least four feet from other objects.

Do not place green waste in your city issued garbage or recycle cart.

If you have a lawn care professional tending your yard, please request that they service your yard prior to your collection day.
