Who Are the People in Your Neighborhood?

If you are of a certain age, you'll remember the song from *Mr. Roger's Neighborhood*. A couple years ago, there was a resurgence of appreciation for Fred Rogers and all that unique Presbyterian pastor offered the world. What a kind, faithful soul. Such care for young people! As the tune runs through my head today, I'm also grateful for the question: "who are the people in your neighborhood?"

In the Gospel of Luke (10:29), a religious scholar asks a similar question of Jesus: "who is my neighbor?"

This year, I want to learn how to answer these questions.

Throughout last fall, I've been working with a pastor and scholar from Canada named Alan Roxburgh. I have been inspired by his conviction that - in the midst of all the disruptions of our world - God is at work and doing a new thing. Alan is also pretty convinced that God's doing the new thing beyond the walls of our churches...out in the neighborhood.

If Alan is right, we have a tremendous opportunity to get out into our neighborhood, meet our neighbors, and discover what God is doing among them. And, here's the best part: we get to join what God is doing! And, it all starts by getting to know our neighbors.

I'm grateful that a team of people from Northbrook has agreed to help me in this task of getting to know our neighbors and discern what God might be doing in the neighborhood. When I was interviewing with the PNC back in 2020, I was inspired by their openness to what God might be doing in calling me here. I decided to "get the band back together" and am excited to be working with Kathy Bauhof, Kim Bowden-Adair, Matt Broadwell, Ken Stetson, David Vander Weide, and Penny Willey again. And, I'm glad to add Tricia LaSota into the mix, who has been able to get a sense of what God has been doing in bringing an Afghan family to our neighborhood (see next page). This crew will be commissioned for this task during the same service when we ordain and install our new class of elders and deacons on January 9.

What will this team be doing? We'll be spending time in prayer and reading scripture. We'll be reflecting deeply about our neighbors and pondering how we might know them better. We'll also be coming up with an "experiment" for Northbrook to try in April or May. What will it look like? I'm not sure exactly, but it will be a way to stretch us into a new way of being with our neighbors.

In June, the team will wrap up with an evaluation. How will we succeed? How will we fail? And, most importantly, what will we learn - from the success *or the failure* of the experiment - that can lead us to the next one?

When the team finishes in June, that's when the rest of us take over. After learning from the Spring experiment, we get to come up with the next experiment. What will take us another step closer to our neighbors and how God is calling us to be among them?

This is the second of our monthly Soul Stroll series, with the first Saturday of the month dedicated to observing - and pondering - what God is doing in this place.

Mission Connection at Work

After seeing chaos as the US withdrew American troops from Afghanistan and refugees were frantically evacuated last August, the Mission Connection committee questioned ways in which Northbrook might be called to help with the influx of refugees that were slated to arrive in Michigan. In November, the answer came as we discovered that a refugee family had arrived from Fort McCoy Wisconsin and was temporarily staying with a family in the neighborhood next to the church.

This refugee family's story is both tragic and amazing. The father Sayed worked as an interpreter for the US Marines and Army for many years. Sayed was invaluable as he fought alongside US soldiers. As the Taliban retook control of the country, Sayed, his wife, and two young sons were forced to flee for their lives. They

were fortunate to have left from the Kabul airport just a day before the suicide bombing that killed many. After a few weeks of travel, the family arrived in the US and was housed on several military bases before coming to Michigan. When we were first introduced to the family, we discovered that their needs were great as they work to establish their lives here.

Northbrook immediately began to help by allowing their youngest son Ekram to attend our preschool tuition-free while his older brother Baset attends an ESL program through Birmingham Public Schools. As news of the family's needs spread through the Mission Connection Committee, others offered help.



One Northbrook member began tutoring the mother Firoza, who spoke no English, to help her become proficient enough to qualify for English classes. In Afghanistan, Firoza was never allowed to go to school, so she is not even able to read or write in her own language. Another member connected the family with a person who donated a car to them. We also provided the family with clothes and shoes from donations received in one of our Care and Share collections. In December, the family moved into their own fully furnished apartment complete with a new mattress and box springs Northbrook purchased for them using donated mission funds.

Many friends, neighbors, and others in the community including the school district have also given support through donations of clothing, furniture, and other household items, as well as monetary gifts. Sayed and his family are appreciative of the help that Northbrook and others have given them. The family was excited to move into their apartment, and Sayed is eager to start work. In the new year, we pray for this family and continue to look for ways in which we can support them as they settle into life here.

For our February *Care & Share* we will partner with the Furniture Bank to help provide the bedding part of these basic necessities; the Bank is currently without any linens to distribute. The January white sales would be a great way to maximize your donations of **NEW** bed linens.

Located in Pontiac, the Furniture Bank picks up gently used items and delivers them to clients needing essential home furniture. In 2020, through the *Furniture for Families* Program, 6,981 individuals (2,183 families) were served. More than 55% were children under 18. The families served are usually coming out of a crisis situation –fire, eviction, homelessness. Thanks to the Furniture Bank, more children remain healthy by sleeping in a warm bed, more families can share a meal at a dining table, and more people can live in a home with stability and dignity. Imagine the smile of a child who receives your Superman comforter!


