- Easter Vigil: 7pm, March 30 at Christ Church, Cranbrook. For the past three years, our • informal Easter Vigil has featured Northbrook families enacting the core bible stories. With so many families away for spring break, we decided to step away from our intimate service and experience a more traditional Easter Vigil. I am honored to share leadership at this service, and, I hope you'll join me as we stretch together in this new experience.

Speaking of stretching, I can't help but think of Jesus stretching his hand out to Peter when the storm started to rage on the sea. It often feels like storms are raging out of control in our world... from the seemingly unending war in Ukraine to the brutal bombardment of Gaza. Thankfully, this season reminds us that Jesus isn't afraid to go to the worst places - even into hell - to set us free.

# Come and be Renewed!

Teach me your ways, O Lord Show me your path -Psalm 25:4

During Holy Week come for a rejuvenating walk on one of our labyrinths as you shake out the winter cobwebs and seek God's guidance in your life, calming your mind and opening your heart.

If you aren't familiar with the labyrinth and would like an introduction, please join Tracey Parker and Sherrill Heinrichs on Monday evening, March 25<sup>th</sup> at 6:30pm when we will be hosting a community-wide Labyrinth Workshop and Walk. Come and learn about the history of labyrinths, why we walk them, and the benefits of walking this spiritual path. Afterward, there will be an opportunity to walk one of our three labyrinths. Please sign up in fellowship hall or call the church office to let us know you're coming.

The 31-foot labyrinth, finger labyrinths and the outdoor labyrinth will all be available Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday (following the Maundy Thursday dinner and service). There will also be information on a table near the labyrinth entrance for those who wish to walk during the day. It's really very easy...just put one foot in front of the other and follow the path.

The labyrinth will be open on the following days and times:

- Monday March 25<sup>th</sup> 6:30pm 9:30pm
- Tuesday—Wednesday March 26-27 10am-4pm
- Maundy Thursday March 28<sup>th</sup> (following dinner and worship)



### The Story in March

### March 3 - Chapter 23: Jesus' Ministry Begins

Jesus is baptized and led into the wilderness. He begins his ministry by calling his first disciples, celebrating at a wedding, and seeing people - that others would rather avoid - as children of God. After waiting for God to send the Messiah to lead the people into freedom, people can't help but ask, "Are you the one who is to come?"

### March 10 - Chapter 24: No Ordinary Man

The teaching of Jesus flips people's expectations of God - and God's realm - upside down. Jesus reveals blessings where no one else can. He subdues the storms and sets people free from the spirits that enslave them. Jesus feeds thousands and reveals that he, *himself* is the bread of life and the cup of salvation.

### March 17 - Chapter 25: Jesus, the Son of God

"Who do you say that I am?" Jesus asked his disciples. Jesus' glory is revealed on the mountain and his fame spreads far and wide. People find freedom and the religious leaders are threatened. He raises Lazarus from the dead, and makes a dramatic entrance into Jerusalem, to the shouts of the crowds. During his final week, he teaches by day and withdraws to his closest friend by night.

### March 24 - Chapter 26: The Hour of Darkness

Jesus celebrates the Passover with those he loves, washing their feet and revealing that he is the one who will be broken open and poured out for the whole world. He is betrayed and arrested, brought before both religious leaders and political powers for sham trials. He is crucified between two criminals. Before he dies, he says, "It is finished."

### March 31 - Chapter 27: The Resurrection

Jesus is buried quickly in a tomb given by a wealthy citizen and guards are placed at the tomb. After the Sabbath was over, women go to the tomb to finish anointing the body only to find the stone rolled away and the body gone. The disciples verify the empty tomb and Jesus starts to appear to them: on the road, behind closed doors, on the seashore... He gathers his disciples and commissions them to go to all ends of the earth and make disciples, assuring them, "... surely I will be with you always until the end of the earth.

### Easter Basket Donation Drive—Assembly on Palm Sunday

Once again, the Northbrook Mission Connection Committee along with the youth, will host an Easter Basket donation drive during the month of March. This will support <u>Kids Empowered On the Move</u>, an organization dedicated to helping families stay out of homeless situations, primarily in Oakland County. We will be collecting Easter basket items, as well as other small requests from the families. Look for a sign-up table during coffee hour on March 3rd and 10th where you can view lists and sign up to make a donation. 

This event was a continuation of the church's efforts to coordinate quarterly planning, promote collaboration among committees, and to help ensure that we are collectively working towards Northbrook's three-year goals. Elders, deacons, committee chairs, and all members of the congregation were invited to participate.



Participants broke out into the following five groups where they brainstormed ideas and discussed possible activities for the

next quarter. The discussion was lively and productive. Look for more information to follow as the committees solidify their plans and schedule events.

- A mission group discussed holding an outdoor fundraiser on behalf of Heifer International.
- A children's ministry group discussed having our youth take over the meeter/greeter roles on Family Sundays.
- A neighborhood hangout group discussed fine tuning the hangouts this summer with an emphasis on ways to draw in more community involvement.
- A communications group developed ideas for a more coordinated and comprehensive process for generating media around church events.
- Finally, a group met to discuss the labyrinth and develop ways to promote it to the broader community and to integrate it into this year's Holy Week activities.




### **Finance Matters**

### A Recap of Recent Charitable Giving Talks

Your Finance Committee recently held two separate discussions (January 14 & February 4) centered around charitable giving, during which several creative ways to make contributions to the church were presented. These conversations received positive feedback from those who attended. If you were unable to attend either discussion, here are a few highlights:

- For those who are at a point of being forced to take distributions from qualified accounts (401k, 403b, IRA, etc.) and for which such Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) are not needed, a creative way to reduce one's annual tax burden could be to allocate a portion of such distributions directly from the account to the church, thereby simultaneously satisfying the RMD and bypassing income tax due on the directly-contributed amount.
- Beneficiary designations are significant! It is very simple to add Northbrook Church to one's life insurance policies or other accounts as a beneficiary – either split primary or contingent beneficiary. One may also consider identifying specific entire policies or accounts as intended for the church, while one's other accounts are allocated elsewhere.
- Donor Advised Fund (DAF) accounts can be funded by many types of assets (including traditional investments, restricted stock, privately held business shares, and even cryptocurrency), and can offer an immediate tax benefit to the donor while encompassing both current and future pledges to the church – a benefit to both the donor and Northbrook!

Of course, these are just a few of the several items that were discussed during these Talks.
