From The Pastor

What is there to observe? Why celebrate what happened in the past, whether a birthday, a Christening, a wedding, or the 75th anniversary of the Good Shepherd Lutheran?

Cicero said it first. Much later, George Roche explained it in *A World Without Heroes*: "Men without a past are forever children, easily manipulated and enslaved." Neither man spoke specifically to spiritual roots, but their words have great relevance for the people of The Good Shepherd in

As we shortly enter into the 75th Anniversary year it is increasingly apparent that, by and large, members of The Good Shepherd are not well informed about the history of the congregation. In looking forward to the 75th anniversary year some expressed hope that observing our threescore-and-fifteen-year anniversary would lead us as a congregation to a new appreciation of why The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church was formed and of our heritage.

YESTERDAY, the charter members of the congregation in 1950 realized that under the blessing of God, they would be able to do His work far better together than any of them could do it alone. Indeed, without a congregation, would there be a church building offering Word and Sacrament ministry to the community? Or Bible studies and Sunday school to educate the laity? Or a Choir that does such a magnificent job helping all to sing praises to our God, like no other in Midwest City?

And what of our confessional heritage, centered in the saving work of Jesus Christ as our Sin-bearer, as we know that Gospel from Holy Scripture? Go where you will in the Midwest City religious community of 2025, and the name "The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church" bespeaks a congregation set on being faithful to God's Word and to "know nothing except Jesus Christ and Him crucified." (1 Corinthians 2:2)

True it is — and it has been said again and again — we thank God for the past, but we dare not live in the past. An anniversary must be more than remembering who we are and where we came from. It must be, and pray God will be, a launching pad to the future.

And right there, TODAY, will be where the rubber hits the road as we celebrate during this anniversary year, especially during this anniversary month — where The Good Shepherd Lutheran will be putting on an anniversary weekend, a celebration reception, dedicating a lawn cross, putting out a digital pictorial history, kitchen renovations. Will our future combine theological fidelity with evangelistic zeal, concerned not only with the truth but also with the determination to bring the truth of God's blessed plan of salvation in Christ to "the outermost ends of the earth"? (Acts 1:8)

In the organization of our congregation, God blended the formal theological training of Germans with the missionary fervor of others to give us what we have today.

How disastrous if we were ever to sacrifice concern for theological purity on the altar of statistical growth! And how distressing, on the other hand, if we were to glory in what we have and then fail to bring the message of the Savior to all those for whom He shed His blood and earned the joy of heaven!

Truly, TOMORROW, we who have been so blessed with the abiding treasure of the Gospel should be the most innovative, the most progressive, the most aggressive, in shouting to the world: Jesus Christ is Lord!

In Walking with God - yesterday, today, and tomorrow - use these anniversary days to that end and thus to His glory!

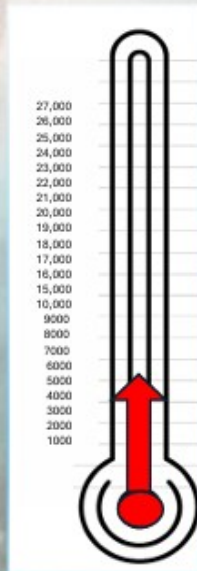

Harmonious Stewardship

*“For as in one body we have many members,
and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many,
are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another”
(Romans 12:4-5).*

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels.

Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other.

Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful.

The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous.

The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low.

But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to “carry the tune” for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn’t rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn’t rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

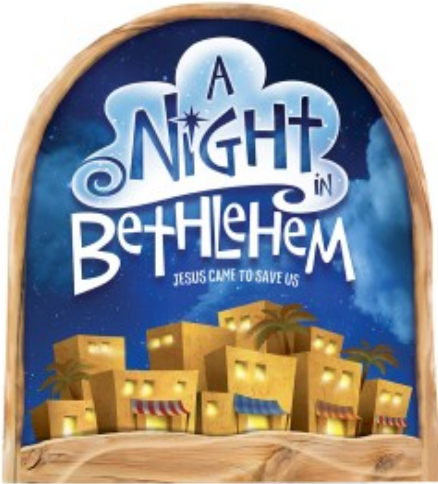
The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful:
the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn’t always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow’s mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness.

We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus!

As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!

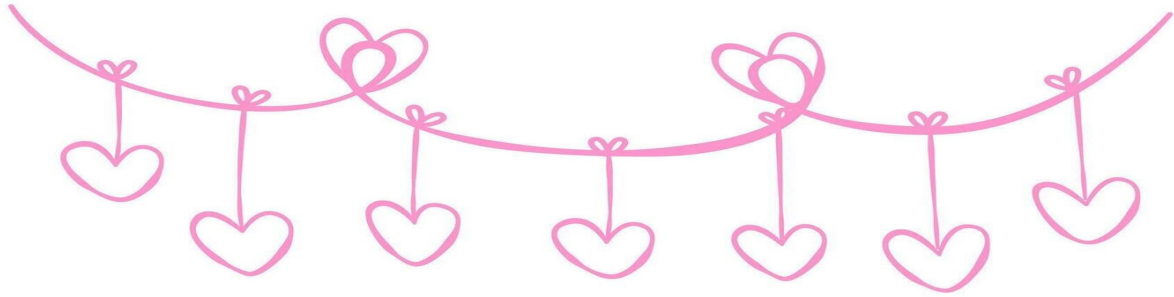
A Night in Bethlehem will be presented at

Update on Millie

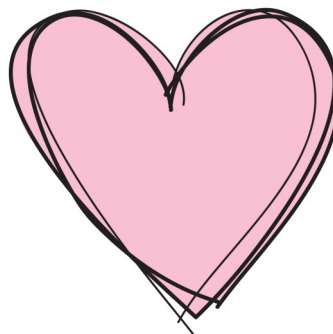


“Today marks the start of Millie’s big treatment that she receives every 12 weeks.

Ranger's Ramblings

Since the beginning of Trail Life Troop OK-4077, it has been my pleasure to serve as the Woodlands Ranger. From the troops inception with only three boys, we have gone on numerous adventures.

Many of these are just adventures and growth of the boys through their learning, new skills, improving their abilities and deepening their faith. The boys have participated by assisting a disabled veteran with yard work, joining in Midwest City's cleanup day and marching in the Veterans Day parade. They have helped around the church, gone on several

campouts, hikes and other weekend adventures which we call Hit the Trail.

The growth we have seen in the boys since the inception of the troop is remarkable. They have gone from being shy and very quiet to answering questions and stepping up to help without prompting. The Trailmen have launched 2-liter bottle rockets, had water gun battles, practiced archery, slingshots, and bb-guns. There have been mountains climbed, bridges crossed, tents pitched, fires built, and of course there have been S'mores. Museums have been toured. The boys have learned how to work together, through our weekly lessons, and our firewood fundraiser. have completed their core branches and Sylvan stars at the Fox, or Mountain Lion levels. Some have completed the Walk Worthy award. Rising to the Navigator rank allows the Trailmen to take on junior leadership roles. And they all have grown, maybe as much as their leaders.

MARY AND THE BLUE DOG



One good thing about being old is that you remember things which younger people never experienced, and some of those memories might even be true and accurate. I was a teenager when the "folk revival" passed through the music scene in the mid-sixties. We all learned to play the guitar or banjo and tried to sound like The Kingston Trio or Peter, Paul and Mary. Unfortunately for me, I sounded more like Bob Dylan. At any rate, we all learned dozens of folk songs.

There was a phenomenon in two of the songs which has always interested me: Two folk songs, "Oh Mary Don't You Weep" and "Old Blue," both had lyrics about three links of chain. And to compound the similarity, in each song, each link of chain was inscribed with the word, "Jesus." Why was it that a deep south gospel and a mountain tribute to a hunting dog would have the same lyric? As with most true folk music, the versions shifted with the passage of time and the singer, but as I learned the words, one said, "Now Mary had three link of chain / and on each link was Jesus' name /



Pharaoh's army got drowned / Oh Mary don't you weep." And the other said, "Old Blue died / and he died so hard. / Buried him in my back yard ./ Lowered him down with three link of chain / every link had Jesus' name."

You will not find the phrase "three links of chain" in the Bible, with or without Jesus' name being on the links. You can find "a cord of three strands" in Ecclesiastes 4:12. But the number three is found throughout the Good Book hundreds of times, from the three crosses at Calvary to the thrice repeated, "holy, holy, holy." There are three temptations, three days in the tomb, Peter's three denials and later three affirmations of love of Jesus, three days in the whale's belly, and three angels delivering messages. The list goes on and on. My personal favorite triad is found in 1 Corinthians 13: "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love." I included the chapter in almost every wedding ceremony I performed over twenty-five years.

But what is the true, everlasting genesis of the number three? Surely it is God himself. Surely it is the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Could it be anything different? If this is so, then the three links of chain are the Trinity itself, and the name of the Son on each link refers to God. As for why a hound dog has a chain with God inscribed on the links, as a lover of dogs, I ask you: Could it be heaven without them?
