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Luther's views on education

Public education was a fruit of the Reformation. Martin Luther and other reformers proclaimed that the neglect of educating common people—a notorious practice during the Middle Ages—endangered the welfare of a state. Instead, Luther asserted, a well-educated youth was an asset to society.

In a letter to German councilmen, dated 1524, Luther writes, "By helping the youth we shall be helping ourselves and all men." In other words, a well-ordered and stable society must have men and women who are professionally trained in their particular fields. It's essential because, Luther wrote, "Where there were no people who have been made wise through the Word and the laws, there bears, lions, goats and dogs hold public office and head the economy."


This issue was so important to Luther that he thought it was the government's general duty to keep children in school. "If it has the right to force its ablebodied subjects to carry pikes and firearms, to man the walls and do other work when fighting is called for, how much more has it the right and duty to force its subjects to keep their children in school."

There were spiritual implications as well. "The devil would rather have coarse blockheads and people who are good for nothing." Rather, Luther would have the common people educated to think, judge and act for themselves—that is, developing a sense of personal responsibility.

The Lutheran heritage is one of open inquiry, vigorous debate and intellectual honesty. Central to the purpose of Lutheran education is a mission to help each individual to find his or her vocation or calling.

Individuals and society weren't the only ones to benefit from the general education of children. For parents, it was an investment. "House and home may burn down, but an education is easy to carry off," Luther said. Yet, if the Holy Scriptures weren't taught at a particular school, Luther would not advise parents to send their children. He embraced a broad curriculum, but students should also be unceasingly occupied with God's Word.

What is Stewardship?

What is a steward? Most people, when asked this question, will reply: "A manager." That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner's property on the owner's behalf.

We are God's stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him. For we have brought nothing into this world, and we can take nothing out of it (1 Tim. 6:7). Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God's fatherly Divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner. Not only because, as the Creator, He created all things. But also, as the Redeemer, He has redeemed, that is, purchased and won all things. It all, therefore, belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege. Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, all -powerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage His possessions on His behalf here on earth. And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

What a responsibility. For to whom much is given, much shall be required (Luke 12:48). We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what His desire and will for His property is.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God? We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will for all His gifts are to be used. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing that we have that doesn't belong to Him. "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20). He informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards – His managers and custodians – of His property are to do the managing.

And that is what stewardship is. It is simply doing what God wants us to do with what He has given us. As St. Paul said: "Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness" (Rom. 6:13). So, let's dive into the God's Word and listen to what the owner desires from His stewards.

WHY LUTHERAN SCHOOLS?

STRENGTHENING CONGREGATIONS:

Lutheran schools equip children to become Christian leaders in the congregation. The school also involves young parents in congregation activities more than in congregations without schools. These young parents frequently become new leaders of the congregation. Students are encouraged to become future pastors and teachers, ensuring an ongoing supply of church workers.

NURTURING FAITH:

Faith is nurtured by daily proclamation of the Gospel, teaching children the Word of God and how to read and understand that Word on their own, and by modeling and challenging students to live the Christian faith.

A SAFE PLACE:

Unfortunately, in many communities, children are not safe. Lutheran schools provide places where children don't have to worry about being attacked verbally or physically. Loving teachers and other staff members daily demonstrate Christ's love for them and their love for children.

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES:

Every community needs students who are academically qualified and have learned to practice appropriate morality and respect. Since Lutheran schools accept students from all parts of the community, they can have a strong effect on the community itself.

CHILDREN IN GOD'S WORLD:

As the Christian faith is integrated into their lives, Christian decision-making and problem solving are facilitated.

VALUE BY CONGREGATIONS:

Lutheran schools require a considerable investment of prayers, energy, money, and staff. Such an investment by a congregation clearly demonstrates to the community that it places a high value on children, God's beloved little ones.

SEEKING THE LOST:

Lutheran schools, which enroll children from all parts of the community, provide new and varied opportunities for evangelism by the congregation and its staff. These opportunities are not available in any other way. That's why Lutheran schools are considered the most effective agencies in congregational evangelism and why pastors of growing congregations with schools in nearly every case, identify the school as the congregation's most effective outreach agency. Eighty-five percent of the fast est growing congregations in the Synod operate schools.


CONGREGATIONAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:

When the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod was formed, it became a requirement of Synodical membership that congregations would provide Christian education for their children. This was before public schools were available and before Sunday schools were popular. Thus, a congregation was expected to operate a Lutheran School if it was to become a member of the Synod. The Great Commission was not given only to parents, but to all members of the church. A current proverb, "It takes a village," reminds congregations that it is their corporate responsibility to provide a Christian education for the children of the congregation.

CONGREGATIONS IN THE COMMUNITY:

As the school reaches many segments of the community, the parents who come to the school begin to inquire about the sponsoring congregation. Members frequently ask each other, "Does this congregation have a school"? But non-member school parents frequently ask the school, "Does this school have a church?" The congregation becomes better known in the community because of the school parents, and the school's marketing efforts.







Bringing the Inner-City Children to Camp Lutheran Valley Retreat, Colorado — \$25,000

Lutheran Valley Retreat (LVR) shares God's glory through His creation in a retreat facility in the Rocky Mountains of Colorado. Research shows that camp transforms the lives of young people. Taking a break from regular routines, responsibilities, and technology allows young people to truly be themselves. Campers at LVR have an opportunity to enjoy nature through activities like archery, rock climbing, fishing, and crafts. They experience God's Word through daily devotions, singing, and worship around a campfire. The Gospel is shared through counselors and other campers, showing God's love to His children. Each summer, the camp serves nearly one thousand campers. There are families in the Denver area that are unable to fully finance summer camp or provide transportation. With this grant, LVR will work with Lutheran churches in Denver to arrange 50 camp scholarships for multicultural children of all socio-economic levels. The remainder of the grant money will be used to provide transportation.
