I have a bag of bags. Actually, many bags of bags. My husband thinks this is ridiculous. Plastic grocery bags at the ready for an eventual need. Reusable shopping bags just waiting to be called into action. Even a box of gift bags for every possible occasion. Baby shower? Boom, bag. Wedding gift? Ta-da! There's a bag for that. Birthday party? Would you like cake or balloons on your bag? Someday my husband will come around and admit that having a million bags is the best way to live.

Not all bags bring me such great satisfaction and joy. When the bags are full, they're a total burden. Heading into church on Sundays, I'm often carrying a diaper bag, a bag full of books, a Sunday School bag, and, finally, my purse. It's hard to get around. And if I drop something and need to bend down to pick it up? Oh, it's all over. Everything comes swinging down around me, and it's a total disaster. Too. Many. Bags.

Do you feel as though you're carrying too much? Heavier than a stocked diaper bag, our burdens weigh on us, making it impossible to move around freely and joyfully. Every step

is drudgery. We're slow, overly cautious, tense, cranky, and completely ill-positioned to help others with their burdens. It's hard to fulfill our vocations when we're so weighed down with sin, guilt, shame, bitterness, worry, anger, and fear. And you know what that gets us? Even more heavy bags, right under our eyes, caused by a lack of sleep. These bags just have to go.

Maybe my husband is on to something here. He knows the words of lesus well:

Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light. (Matthew 11:28–30)

Rather than filling more and more bags and carrying them around like pack mules, we're commanded by our Lord to just let them go. He slips them off our shoulders, transferring the heaviness of our sin, and all that goes

with it, onto Himself. He willingly went to the cross to take all of this on—we have only to trust Him.

Ah! That feels better. Our work is lighter. When bad things happen and something drops—and it will—we can easily scoop it up, no swinging bags in our way. We can have joy in vocations, brought to us by the peace that surpasses all understanding, even Christ Himself. He takes on our burdens, and the best thing of all is that we are now freed up to serve others with joy, helping them in their time of

need and pointing them to the source of that freedom and joy.

This isn't theoretical. This is reality. When we confess our sins—whether individually to a pastor, who stands in the stead of Christ, or corporately in worship—our sins are gone. Taken away. Forgiven. They aren't hiding in another bag. Jesus has made off with them, and He has no intention of handing them back to us. When we pray, He also promises to hear us, taking on our troubles and making them His own. He alone gives us rest. What a friend we have in Jesus!

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
