The Reynella Community Centre **Incorporated: A Brief History**

John Reynell planted his first vines in the area in 1839. Following the establishment of the Reynella Township from 1836-1896, the Reynell family gave land to the people of Reynella for the provision of an oval and sporting facilities.

From there an Oval Committee was formed with the Committee consisting of two delegates from each of the sporting clubs (Cricket, Football, Tennis and Netball), plus independent representatives.

In 1975 the "bottom section" of the now Revnella Community Centre was built and opened in 1976. In 1979 the "top section" was added, to complete our present building as it is today.

In 1990 the Reynella Community Centre opened its new bowling facility (the first metropolitan Bowling Club to use artificial grass) which extended our affiliated sporting bodies to eight: Football; Tennis; Cricket; Bowls; Golf; Darts; Eight Ball; and Small Bore and Air Rifle Clubs.

A number of other community groups use the facilities to conduct meetings, hold functions and other activities, including the Reynella Neighbourhood Watch group.

The Reynella Community Centre was built for the people of Reynella and surrounding districts, and is managed by a Management Committee elected by the Members on a yearly basis.

Talking Rubbish

Q. If the bin is out for collection - can someone else come along and put their rubbish/ recycle / green into the bin?

A. No matter what situation, you can only place materials in another property's bins if you have the permission of the resident/ homeowner/business.

Note: Placing materials in bins without permission is a form of illegal dumping.

Q. Once placed for collection does hard waste remain the property of the person who put it out or is it now Council property?

A. When you put out your kerbside bins/ hard waste for collection, you are putting unwanted items in a council-owned bin on council-owned land for a council managed collection. Under South Australia 's Local Government Act. the contents of bins and other rubbish put out for collection belongs to the council.

- Q. Is it 'legal' for someone to come along and remove items out for a rubbish / hard waste collection?
- A. This is not something we are often asked! It is a bit of a grey area that has not been legally challenged in South Australia, to the best of my knowledge.

As above, items placed out for hard waste collection have been deemed 'unwanted'. However:

- If removed for reuse or recycling environmentally, these are more effective than waste to landfill (landfill being where all non-metal based hard waste goes).
- Items removed also means less waste to landfill (which is the most expensive way of disposing of items).
- In practical terms, we do not have the resources and there is little benefit to policing removal of items, so providing the materials left behind are kept in a neat/accessible manner we don't mind too much.
- If privacy is a concern, there is no law covering privacy of bin /hard waste contents in South Australia. However your personal information is valuable. Always think about the best wavs you can protect it. To lessen the risk of identity theft, always shred or tear up any documents before putting them in the bin.

RAA Security Report 2018

People are feeling less safe in their home and at public gatherings, according to RAA's 2018 Security Report.

More than a third of respondents (36%) felt South Australia was not as safe now as it was two years ago, according to RAA's survey of almost 400 members.

On the home front, one-in-five respondents said they felt less safe from intruders during the past 12 months.

This compared to just over one-in-ten who said they felt safer at home, while 68 per cent reported no change.

RAA Secure Services spokesman Ben Nottage said it was worrying that more people felt less secure in their home in the past year.

"This is reflected by a 25 per cent increase in enquiries we have had for home security systems during the same time," he said.

"People are seeking advice about personal alarm systems as well as home and monitored alarms."

The report also found:

- More women (37%) and men (30%) would not attend a public event due to security concerns.
- People also felt the least safe in large crowds (19%) and most safe when out with friends (3%).
- Adelaide residents were more concerned about safety in the community (20%) compared to those living in the regions (14%).

Almost two-thirds of respondents also said they had become more worried about a terrorist attack in SA during the past two years.

Terrorist attacks overseas and interstate in recent years have seen authorities identify potential risks in this state and invest in security upgrades.

This includes greater scrutiny of sports fans attending Adelaide Oval and more than \$1m spent on security measures at the city's top tourist attractions, such as installing bollards at Rundle Mall and the Adelaide Central Market.

While most respondents welcomed extra security measures at public events and at public places, the heightened security levels were causing anxiety, the report showed.

According to the survey, four-in-five respondents said increased security at public events made them feel safer.

However, almost half of respondents said, "increased security at public events makes me worried about my personal safety"

Mr Nottage said terror attacks interstate and overseas had naturally raised people's concerns our state could potentially be targeted.

"Security measures such as installing bollards at Rundle Mall highlight the potential risks and we see that reflected in the survey," he said.


