
We thank them for taking on these roles so that we can continue our work of making Aberfoyle Park and Happy Valley a safe place to be.

Work from home revolution during pandemic powers spike in cybercrime By Daniel Ziffer, ABC Business, 30 October

Our work from home revolution has powered a spike in cybercrime, costing consumers more for everyday products and dragging billions of dollars out of the economy.

"The attackers have taken advantage of the situation," said Nicola Nicol, partner at consulting firm Pricewaterhouse Coopers (PwC).

"Attackers have started to look to take advantage of employees who are working from home and perhaps not thinking about security in the same way they would do in an office environment."

Breaches cost companies an estimated \$7.6 billion in the last financial year as COVID-19 forced employees out of skyscraper towers, suburban offices and factories. And experts expect the eye-watering impact to rise.

The months between April and June saw a 65 per cent increase in cybersecurity incidents, according to PwC's 2021 Global Digital Trust Insights survey of thousands of business, technology and security executives from large companies.

Workers swap secure servers & buildings for kitchen tables

An astonishing number of employees moved quickly this year from working on computers linked to secure servers, inside buildings protected by pass cards and gates, to performing vital business roles from their kitchens and bedrooms.

That shift was always going to be an opening for malicious and opportunistic cybercriminals, according to University of Melbourne senior lecturer in computing and information systems Suelette Dreyfus.

"You've got many more 'BYO devices', home devices, little Angus who's 15 years old who's been on that device playing games that he's downloaded from the internet — and God knows what else.

You have problems — people using their wifi from home maybe they haven't updated the firmware on their wi-fi devices for five years - that's a security risk," Dr Dreyfus said.

More than half of malicious attacks are by financially motivated-criminals

In the past year, ransomware attacks have crippled organisation and institutions as varied as Victorian country hospitals, logistics company Toll, Service NSW, Anglicare Sydney, money management company MyBudget and the hot strip mill of BlueScope Steel's Port Kembla plant.

Attacks even shut wool sales across Australia in February.

Ransomware is malicious software that goes inside existing computer networks. Once in, it steals information from your computer and demands a fee for it to be returned or stops the system from working until a ransom is paid.

Ransomware attacks and statesponsored attempts to harm critical infrastructure are also considered 'likely', said Nicola Nicol.

What you can do to make yourself cyber-safe

The good news is that the surveyed organisations expect to spend more money and pay more attention to the problem. The better news is that it is cheap, often free, to better protect your business and personal accounts.

Dr Dreyfus suggests some simple steps:

- Have 'full disc encryption' (FDE) turned on
- Always have a passcode on your phone
- Use two-factor authentication. For example, requiring a text message to your phone to get access to social media accounts on your computer
- Get password manager software

• Update your software regularly "And don't reuse passwords, that's a bad idea." she said.





ATO Scam

Southern District police are warning the local community about attempted ATO scams in the last few weeks.

A suspect has been contacting local community members via telephone, stating they are a police officer from Christies Beach.

The caller advises the recipient that they are collecting money for tax purposes and recipients need to make payments immediately.

The telephone number the call is being made from displays as Christies Beach Police Station, which is not correct.

Police are not making these calls and are not collecting money for taxation purposes.

If you receive a similar call;

- DO NOT provide any personal or personal banking details
- DO NOT transfer any of your own funds
- END THE CALL immediately, AND
- REPORT the attempted scam to 'Report Cyber' website <u>https://</u> www.cyber.gov.au/report

Snap, Send, Solve

It takes just 2 minutes to report graffiti, vandalism, trip hazards, and many more on the app 'Snap Send Solve'.

The App works on any android device or iPhone/iPad, and you can report issues on the spot to local councils and also water, gas, electricity, phone etc. with little effort.

If you come across a problem, the app will allow you to take a picture of the fault, record the exact location automatically, identify what the defect is and add any further details. The app will then send the details to the correct department responsible for fixing the problem.

SECURE YOUR NUMBER PLATES

Approximately 3,000 number plates are stolen in South Australia each year.

RAA is working with the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure, SA Police, the Attorney General's Department and the Motor Trade Association to encourage motorists to have tamper-resistant screws installed on their vehicle's number plates.

A number of RAA Approved Repairers are offering to supply and install tamper-resistant screws <u>free</u> of charge.
