#### **VEHICLE SECURITY**

To help prevent thieves targeting your vehicle and property, consider implementing these security tips:

- Lock your vehicle doors and close all windows.
- Install an alarm or immobiliser and activate it every time you leave your vehicle
- At night park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Park off the road and if possible in a locked garage.
- Use secure car parking facilities where available.
- Remove all valuables from your vehicle. If you can't, then conceal them in the boot before arriving at your destination.
- Avoid leaving your property in the glove box or centre console—this is the first place thieves look. Mark or engrave your property with your driver's licence number prefixed by the letter 'S' for South Australia.
- Record the make, model and serial number of electronic equipment, such as GPS devices, laptops and mobile phones.
- Remove registration papers from your vehicle to prevent thieves identifying your home and easily disposing of your vehicle.
- Do not place hand bags, wallets or other valuable items on the passenger seat where they could be easily grabbed.
- Remove your keys from the ignition even if you are gone for a short time.



- At home, don't leave your keys on the kitchen bench or where they can be easily seen by thieves. Keep them in a safe place out of

Never include your name and address.

#### **Dealing with Graffiti**

**Rapid and Continual Removal** of graffiti is one of the best deterrents to stop graffiti returning to the site.

**Painting over the graffiti** is most effective way to remove the graffiti.

When the graffiti is removed by the "paint out method" be sure to match the colour of paint being used - as close as possible to the existing colour of the fence prior to the graffiti damaged.

Be sure to paint the graffiti over in a "block" formation and DO NOT follow the lines of the tag.

# Online sellers beware



SAPOL has received reports of robberies after victims have listed items for sale on popular buying/selling websites and social media.

Items commonly targeted are Apple products, jewellery, designer shoes/clothes, and vehicles.

## If you are selling items online then please follow this safety advice:

- Always meet in a public space that you are familiar with, ideally in an area with CCTV cameras, during daylight hours.
- Gather details about the potential buyer before meeting — their name, phone number and email address.
- Tell at least one person where you are going and who you are with, consider bringing someone else along.
- Ask for identification from the buyer e.g. a driver's licence, if they request a 'test drive'.
- Take note of the person's appearance and their vehicle and registration number.
- Be conscious that fake internet banking records can be created.
   Do not hand over items until you see the funds arrive in your account.
- If the buyer wishes to pay with cash, confirm they have money to pay. Sometimes the offenders are hoping to grab the items quickly and run: reducing their exposure and minimising the chance of being identified.



## Millions lost to social media scams

Social media is delivering a healthy return for scammers in Australia.

According to the ACCC's Scamwatch, it is a much better way to make money than scamming on the phone, email or text messaging.

In the past year, Australians have been fleeced more than \$21.5 million from scams on social networking sites.

ACCC Scamwatch data shows the amount of money lost to scams on social networking runs into the millions.

It has prompted the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) to call for urgent government action — which could potentially lead to a world-first digital platforms ombudsman.

"Consumers and small businesses find it almost impossible to have their disputes resolved with digital platforms when problems arise," chair Gina Cass-Gottlieb said.

While the ACCC works with social media companies to take content down, the commission has no power to force the company to act.

Now, Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman (TIO) Cynthia Gebert has told the government she wants the gig as the country's — and the world's — first digital platforms ombudsman, helping people with problems like dealing with scams and being locked out of their accounts.

The aim is for the new ombudsman to officiate in disputes between platforms and users and, based on the prevalence of smartphone use, there are plenty of areas it could help.

## National anti-scams centre to open in July

A national anti-scams centre is being established to help combat scams and online fraud, after Australians reported losing billions of dollars to fraudsters last year.

The federal government will spend \$86 million on a national effort to prevent scams, including \$58 million to create the national centre to report scams and distribute information to banks, law enforcement & vulnerable communities.

The government says the new initiative will change the way scams are dealt with by:

- Facilitating faster responses to scam reports — when a report is made to police or regulators information will be shared more quickly
- Establishing "fusion shells" described as a "hit squad" of experts from industry and law enforcement to act on scam trends
- Introducing a "white list" of approved phone numbers, with SMS messages will be blocked unless they're from an authorised agency

Last month, the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) reported Australians lost more than \$3.1 billion to scams in 2022 — an 80 per cent increase from 2021.

The ACCC estimates that at least 30 per cent of victims do not report scams, so the true losses are likely to be far higher.

The centre will open in July and sit within the ACCC.

Assistant Treasurer Stephen Jones said he anticipated reports of scams would actually go up after the centre was established.

Mr Jones said the anti-scams centre would bring together government and industry to collaborate closely for the first time to target emerging scams.

"We're also going to set up fusion cells, which are like a hit squad, where we're going up to certain types of scams and taking the fight up to the scammers, to ensure that they don't get an even break," he said.
