#### **NBN SCAMS**

SAPOL advises that Australians are losing more money to NBN scams, with reported losses in 2019 already higher than the total of last year's losses.

It is important to remember that the NBN is a wholesale company and does not sell services directly to consumers.

They never make unsolicited calls or door knock to sell broadband services to the public. You need to contact your preferred phone and internet service provider to switch over.

The NBN will never request remote access to your computer and will never make unsolicited requests for payment or financial information. They also never make automated calls to tell you that you will be disconnected.


#### STURT POLICE STATION

### **GRAFFITI**

At our June meeting, Senior Constable Dick Hern from the Transit Police and local resident David Stretton informed us on the subject of graffiti. The following information may be of use to you.

If you notice graffiti on City of Holdfast Bay property and public spaces please report the matter to their Customer Service on 8229 9999 or in person at Brighton Civic Centre, 24 Jetty Road.

Their policy is to remove offensive graffiti within 24 hours and non-offensive graffiti within 48 hours.

The council can also report an incident on your behalf if notified.

Unfortunately, the Council cannot remove graffiti from private property however they will supply FREE graffiti removal products/kits to residents.

Please contact their Customer Service on 8229 9999 or in person at Brighton Civic Centre.

Should you be unable to remove the graffiti vourself, the Council may be able to offer assistance via a Graffiti Prevention Volunteer.

Contact the Community Safety Officer on 8229 9871 or in person at Brighton Civic Centre for this service.

To help prevent a graffiti attack, ensure existing outside lighting is operating correctly, apply graffiti resistant coatings to protect walls. fences and buildings, keep your property looking neat and tidy (an unkempt property may attract graffiti), keeping trees and shrubs trimmed can reduce concealment opportunities and increases visibility to your home, keep spray paints secured at all times.

Immediately call police on 131 444 if you are witnessing graffiti. If you have information about graffiti call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000. THE COMMUNITY MUST RESPOND **QUICKLY TO PREVENT GRAFFITI** CRIMINALS HAVING TIME TO ADMIRE THEIR ILLEGAL ACTS OF VANDALISM.

### VEHICLE SECURITY — THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLE

There are a number of valuable items that are a common target for thieves to steal from vehicles because of their value and ability to be sold for quick cash. These include:

- Laptops
- GPS devices
- Mobile phones
- Cameras
- Sporting and fishing goods
- Cash/wallets

To reduce your chances of becoming a victim of theft, please consider the following security tips.

- Ensure all valuables are removed from your vehicle or conceal them in the boot of the vehicle before arriving at your destination.
- Lock your vehicle doors and close windows.
- Install an audible alarm.
- At night park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Engrave your valuables with your driver's license number prefixed with 'S' for South Australia.
- Park your vehicle in a garage at night where possible.
- Avoid hiding a second set of keys in the vehicle if the vehicle is broken into, they may find the keys and take the car as well as your valuables.
- Avoid placing bags and wallets on the passenger seat where they could be easily grabbed.

Thieves will look into vehicles to see what items can be easily stolen. Even a small amount of cash may be the catalyst for becoming a target. Ensure you conceal or remove all cash and valuable items from your vehicle.
