How did you find your way to the church? Some of us have been coming to church ever since we can remember. It was our parents that insured that we could find our way into the community of Christ. Others found their way later, but usually this was not on their own. It was because of someone else that these folks came to members of the body of Christ. Sometimes people make it here on their own but that is usually the exception rather than the rule. How did you find your way to the church?

My mom was the one that helped me find my way to the church. She brought me, sometimes kicking and screaming, to the church. Then as I grew older I started to exert my independence yet she still made sure that I made it to church. I'm sure the struggle was not easy for her. I'm sure there were times she wished she could just leave me at home and not have to deal with my fussing about having to go to church. But she helped me to church anyway.

During my late teens and the first year or so in college I kind of got out of the habit of church. But the die had been cast by this time. And at a difficult time in my life a friend suggested I go to church with her. She didn't just leave it at the invitation. She called me to remind me at 7 a.m. on a Sunday morning. She told me she would be waiting for me in the lounge of my dormitory at 8:00 sharp. She went out of her way to make sure that I not only made it to church that one time, she persisted. That persistence continued until I found for myself the life in the community of Christ that I had lost. I guess you know the rest of the story.

People don't find their way through the doors of the church by accident. I certainly didn't find my way by accident. It was only through the persistence of a number of people, primarily the ones I mention above, that I made it here. If you think about it perhaps you may realize that there were one or two people in your life who with intention and persistence brought you into the fold. Very few of us made it here by accident.

That's why I find it very strange that we often expect people to just come accidently walking through our doors. Yes it may happen once and a while, but not with a great deal of regularity. No people find their way here because we intentionally invite them and are persistent in our efforts at getting them here. People find their way through our doors because someone goes out of their way to get them here.

Each person reading this article knows someone who may be interested in or in need of what we can offer them as the body of Christ. These people will not find their way here unless you invite them and are persistent in that invitation. They will not come through those doors unless you share the story of Christ's presence in your life with them. They will not find their way here unless you bring them. The bottom line is we are all evangelists.

This September is Homecoming Month at NMUMC. There is something planned each Sunday for you to invite people to. But don't just invite. Go out of your way to bring them. Let them know how important it is to you that they come. Offer to pick them up and drive them here. Follow up with them, bring them again. It took an awful lot of effort on a lot of people's parts to bring me through the doors of the church. It didn't happen accidently in my case. It probably wasn't accidental in your case. And for most of the people in New Market, they won't accidently come strolling through our doors. It's going to take all our effort. We are really going to have to go out of our way to get them here. But once they are here they will thank you for ever.

# **New Events Upcoming!**

Pastor Mike is planning several new weekly events to begin this fall. Both are aimed at providing opportunities for individuals to develop their prayer and meditation life. There will be a Prayer and Meditation group forming and meeting on Wednesday evenings after Bible Study. The time will be either 7:45 or 8:00pm and the group will meet in the sanctuary. The purpose of this weekly gathering is to introduce individuals to the practice of Contemplative Prayer in the Benedictine tradition. The people who become involved in this group will learn what Christian Contemplative prayer is all about, they will have the opportunity to develop their meditative skills and learn how to create a sacred space in their busy lives where they can simply rest in God's presence. Though new to many in our church, Contemplative prayer is a wonderful resource for achieving spiritual growth and a sense of inner peace. The other weekly event is an intercessory prayer group. We will gather on Thursday evenings, at 6:30 for a half an hour to pray together for community needs and concerns. This group will meet in the Kitchen of the Education Building.

I also encourage you to attend the Wednesday evening bible study. This group has been meeting for over a year now and is always engaged in scripture and lively discussion.

# **HOMECOMING**

This coming September promises to be an exciting one for NMUMC. September has been designated as Homecoming month and planning for homecoming events are well under way. There will be events taking place each weekend in September all of which are intended to build an awareness of NMUMC in the wider New Market community: celebrate our own heritage; and provide opportunities to invite "church shoppers" to pay a visit. Everyone reading this notice has a key role to play in the success of Homecoming Month. Please consider inviting family members, friends, neighbors, acquaintances that you know might be interested in attending one or more of the events and worship services. Don't just invite them, bring them! Pick them up! You may be the person responsible for connecting someone with a church home. The sermon topics through September are ones that will be of interest to the unchurched and may answer some of the burning questions and objections that people have about "church". The plan, as it stands now, is as follows: The first Sunday (which is Labor Day Weekend) will be the opening day of Sunday school and the Sunday school Ice Cream Social. On the second Sunday (and the preceding Saturday) there will be an exhibition in the School House where we are hoping to show the Art (and Crafts) talent of people in the community. If you are a photographer, sketcher, painter, or artist of any kind, or if you would like to display a craft that you are talented in please consider putting your work in the show. This will not be a sale. If you are interested in selling your work you will be able to provide contact information along with your work. In conjunction with this we are planning a concert on Sunday afternoon highlighting the performing talents of people in our community.

The third Sunday will be an outdoor worship service in a tent set up in back of the Church. The service will be in the style of Worship in the year 1800. The preacher will be Francis Asbury who will arrive on horseback. (Francis Asbury was the first Methodist Bishop and was preaching in the area in 1800.) The service will be followed with a "Bring Your Own Picnic Lunch" along with a dessert to share. We are hoping the games from the period will be taught and played. Period dress is encouraged but is by no means necessary.

On the fourth Sunday will be the Homecoming service. We are inviting former pastors to attend and to take part in the service. This will be followed by a reception luncheon at the school house. These plans are still very fluid and still subject to change. Your prayers and your invitations to others in the community will be key to making these events a success. ## Harvest of Hope Retreat

This event is a weeklong experience including worship, study of Biblical teachings about hunger and gleaning (harvesting remnants of crops for donating to soup kitchens and homeless shelters). It will be October 22-24, 2010 at Camp Seltzer in Palmyra, PA and everyone 10 and up is encouraged to participate. The cost for this event is \$75.00 per person which covers your lodging and food for the weekend. Please call the church office if interested.

The highest rank in Boy Scouts is the rank of Eagle. Only about 5 in 100 boys involved in scouting reach the rank of Eagle. Each Eagle candidate must complete a service project for the organization of his choice in order to become an Eagle Scout. I chose to make a sign for the church for my Eagle Project. The sign will be modeled after the sign at Bush Creek Church of the Brethren. See the flyer attached to the newsletter for a picture of the Bush Creek sign. It will have removable letters that we can change to advertise services and events in the church. I am hoping that most of the supplies for building the sign will be donated from stores like Lowes and Home Depot, but the letters and the tracking for the letters will have to be purchased. The sign will be in the back corner of the church property along Route 874. The ground around it will be landscaped so that it will draw more attention to the sign.

With the sign along the road, people traveling along Route 874 can see special events the church has scheduled. The church can advertise events like the Easter egg hunt and Vacation Bible School so that more people know about them, and our congregation can provide more community outreach. When more people know about the events more people are likely to attend. Hopefully, this will also attract new church members.

In order to purchase materials for the sign, I need monetary donations. The sign will cost approximately \$500 to build. A group of Boy Scouts and adult volunteers will do all of the labor building the sign and preparing the site.

If you would like to donate toward the construction of the sign, I will be collecting

money through August 15<sup>th</sup>. All checks need to be payable to Boy Scout Troop 628. Donations can be put into the jar at the back of the church or mailed to Ben Grenier at 6233 Sawyer Road, New Market, MD 21774. Any money remaining after the sign is finished will be donated to the Schoolhouse kitchen project.

**Student Led Clubs**-(high school and middle school) clubs held on school campuses that are organized and led by students. YFC provides training and encouragement for students to exercise their right to organize prayer and bible study in school.

**Deaf Teen Quest**- A unique outreach to deaf students in Central Maryland-includes taking students on trips to regional student conferences like Impact and Alive and deaffocused camps such as Grow Camp and Adventure Camp.
