Valley of the Shadows

I think as we look back at the past year and look forward to the year to come, we can experience many feelings of uncertainty. It seems that we have emerged from the dark shadows of 2020 and still have trouble seeing the light. Many of us have lost loved ones expected and unexpected, lost jobs, lost work hours, lost community, lost rhythm, and may be on the verge of losing hope. That is why I think during this Lent it is so important to not only look at the cross but to fall on our knees and squeeze the lifegiving essence out of it and into our very souls. There is hope at the cross, there is promise at the cross, there is redemption at the cross. During each Sunday of this Lenten season, I will be concentrating on one of the seven words that Jesus spoke from the cross.

In the Episcopal tradition, these reflections would have been done in three hours on a single night during the Good Friday service. I believe that neither you, nor myself, have that kind of stamina, so the Sunday's during Lent it is. To assist me in these reflections I will be utilizing two main resources, Fleming Rutledge's "The seven Last Words from the Cross" and Adam Hamilton's "Final Words". I will also use Hamilton's book for our Thursday evening Advent studies.

In-Person Worship to Resume on February 17, Ash Wednesday

The Home Safe Team has convened in January and February and has determined to resume in-person worship for Lent. The first service will be at **7:00 p.m. on Ash Wednesday, February 17**th. The first in-person worship service for the 11:00 a.m. service will be on **February 21**st.

The factors considered in making this decision were based on the following criteria.

- 1. A congregant who was present in worship on Christmas Eve and the last Sunday in December tested positive for COVID-19. The protocols that your Home Safe Team established for inside worship were effective and no other worshipers became ill.
- 2. The positivity rate for Frederick County has started to decline.
- 3. Available beds at Frederick Health Hospital have increased.
- 4. The beginning distribution of the vaccine with our elder members who have had the opportunity to get vaccinated has begun and is underway.

The Team made the decision to resume worship with two caveats in mind.

- 1. In-person worship would be suspended for at least 30 days if a positive case is reported by a congregant who was present in worship.
- 2. That every person present in the sanctuary adhere to all the protocols set forth by the home safe team, as outlined below.

In-Person Worship Protocols:

- A. Please take your temperature at home. If it is registering out of your normal range, or above 99.9, please stay home. If you have a fever, feel ill, or feel you are at high risk for COVID-19, please stay home and worship with us on-line.
- B. To make sure we have a place for you and your family-- and to adhere to the CDC guidelines of contact tracing-- **you must sign-up that you are attending this service** online or by calling the church office. Failure to sign-up will result in your having to wait outside until the service starts to see if the service is not at capacity. Priority will be given to members of NMUMC. The current capacity is 30 persons on the first floor and 10 persons in the loft.
- C. Please wear a mask that fully covers your nose and extends to your chin, from the moment you leave your car until you return to your car.
- D. Please maintain 6 feet of physical distance from all those that do not live in your home. (Pews have been separated in the sanctuary to maintain this safe distance.)
- E. Please refrain from all physical contact including handshakes, hugs, etc. Air hugs are great!!
- F. Please wash your hands with soap and water or utilize hand sanitizer every time you enter our building (Touchless sanitizer dispensers are available when you enter and exit the building).
- G. Please ensure that children 5th grade and younger are always accompanied by an adult who is mindful of their physical distancing and hand/face hygiene.
- H. Bathrooms will be available with sanitation stations in each one.
- I. All doors will remain open before and after the service for safe entry and will be clearly labeled entrance and exit only. The stairs to the loft are similarly marked.
- J. No congregational singing is allowed at this time.

While on our property, we appreciate everyone's cooperation in following these precautions to keep our community safe. Please know these guidelines may be stricter than mandated. *Our priority is your health.* The Zoom worship will continue at 9:30 a.m. until the weather is conducive to return to the parking lot. The on-line worship will be new every week and can be accessed from our web page. Please continue to keep the Home Safe Team and our worship teams and services in your prayers. We thank you for your patience and your flexibility.


Lenten Small Group Study

Lenten DevotionsLent in a Bag for Adults

What is "Lent in a Bag?"

"Lent in a Bag" equips you with symbols of the season of Lent to help you have prayer or conversation at home.

Instructions for Devotions

For your own devotion, daily or weekly, choose one of the symbols to reflect on as you make your way through the season of Lent. Invite those around your table or by yourself, to pick one of the symbols as a starting point for conversation for the meditation.

Sand:

Hold the container of sand in your hand. Read and reflect: Between his baptism and the beginning of his adult ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness, crossing the desert and rocky earth for 40 days, "to be tested."

What constitutes wilderness in your life? What have you learned there?

How do you know you have left the desert or wilderness for a new life in Christ?



Rock:

Take the rock out of the bag. Read and reflect:

While in the wilderness, Jesus was invited to transform stone into bread. Though he resisted the temptation there and then, he became justly renowned for feeding people who were hungry for food, or for love, or for a word of encouragement, or simple acceptance. Might there be a stony place in you that needs transforming? Some attitude or habit that, with a little attention, might even become a gift for you and others? Are there stones you are still holding onto (anger, remorse, regret, judgment) that need to be dropped? Drop the stone (John 8a: 1-11) as the men did in this story, keep on dropping it until you are free from this burden, or carry it in your pocket during Lent to remind you of the grace that Jesus offers.

Human Figure (Fork Person):

Find the Fork Person figure. Read and reflect:

Because Jesus was, as we confess, fully human, he gets us, understands us from inside our skin, and knows from experience that we are each capable of great things, Godly things. And no matter what we do, he keeps on inviting us to join in his work, which has become our own work. This Lent, what might you plan to do over these 40 days?

When Easter arrives, will you reflect Christ who lives in and through you?

Candle:

Light the votive candle. Read and reflect:

Lent begins in the dimness of late winter and ends with the burst of bright spring. Jesus is, according to John's gospel, the "light of the world." That light shone brightly in the disciples, who chose to follow Jesus. Jesus insists to us that we are the light of the world. So where do you shine? How do you keep your light lit? How can you help "light" others with hope?

Replenishing Funds Used to Pay Off Loan

Through January, a total of \$16,200 has been credited toward replenishing the \$32,000+ in funds that were taken from the checking account to pay off the loan on the parsonage and schoolhouse. These funds are from donations, parsonage rental, and the Thanksgiving offering.
