But these folks will be spending the evening in the presence of their risen Lord, celebrating and anticipating resurrection. The choice is ours. We can live in the shadow of death and if we do that's all we will have and life will be difficult. Or we can while a way the storms in the presence of our risen Lord and let resurrection light drive a way all darkness. We can be the people who take the storms in stride, who don't allow life's occasional tornados to eclipse our view of heaven. We can be people of hope. And by being people of hope, resurrection people, we will be able to comfort all those overwhelmed by storms. And that's exactly what Christ calls us to do.
