# NEW MARKET UMC NEWSLETTER FOR NOVEMBER 2010

We've just finished a month long emphasis on stewardship. And as you might have guessed it was mostly about money. Yes we heard about how everything that we possess, the things we can see, touch, hear, taste, and feel, all belongs to God. We heard and talked about the importance of presenting God our "first fruits" signifying Gods place in our lives. We even talked a little about tithing, the point being that God is letting us use 90% of all he has given us and only asks 10% to be returned in order that the ministry of God's word may be spread. We heard a lot about taking care of the church through the giving of our wealth. But when I think about it there is another kind of stewardship I didn't mention, but perhaps should.

One of the greatest gifts God has given us is each other. God has placed us in relationship with each other. We don't have to do ministry alone, because we have each other. We need each other for encouragement, for guidance, for comfort and mutual strength – the ability to do things that can't be done by just one person. We need each other's wisdom, each others sense of humor; sometimes we just need each other's smile to get us through the day. There is no doubt that the greatest resource we have as a church is not money, or property. Our greatest resource is not the buildings, or the office equipment. The greatest resource we have is the greatest gift that God has entrusted to us - each other.

God expects us to take care of that relationship! God expects us to care for each other. God expects us to cherish each other, because that is the way we take care of our relationships we have to practice stewardship of our relationships keeping them alive and vital and by so doing keeping our ministry alive and vital. And this is probably the hardest thing to do because it means we must be as servants to each other. It means putting away pride and our own agendas and caring for another first.

Perhaps it is fitting that this stewardship month ended on the Sunday we celebrated the saints of the church. The saints I can think of are the people who grew the church. And every single one of them grew the church through cherishing and

caring for the relationships they had been given in the church. They were the people who made sure everyone else was cared for. They were the ones that never said a hurtful word to or about another. They were the ones that were always spreading joy, lighting up the room. When criticism of another was given it was always done in a positive and nurturing way. They were not complaining people. They were the ones always mending fences, making peace, soothing hurt feelings. The saints that I have known were truly gentle people. Everyone in their orbit flourished in the loving light of their spirit. For them the other was the most important and they themselves the least. They could do this because of their absolute trust in God. They nurtured and cared for every relationship that God placed in their hands and those relationships flourished. And when those relationships comprised a church, that church grew.

A very wise man, a saint named Roger Elgert who recently left for the realms of light, taught me a wonderful lesson about the church. He was the Sr. Pastor and I was the associate. He loved gardening, and he drove me crazy with all the potted plants he set about his office and mine. He said that a church is like a garden filled with a wonderful variety of beautiful flowers. And every one of those flowers is delicate. You need to be gentle around them. Disturb them, bruise them, step on them, fail to nourish them with love and care, poison them with hurtful actions and words and they will die spiritually, and we won't see them again. I never heard him say an unkind word about anyone. He went out of his way to compliment or encourage everyone he met. I never saw him not smiling. The people around him glowed in his care. He practiced what he preached and his garden flourished.

We are the gardeners, and we have been entrusted with all the wonderful relationships God has brought into our lives in this church. Each relationship, each person is fragile. We all need to have a care and do our best to nurture each relationship with love.
