Dear Members and Friends,

As you know September, now past, was designated "Homecoming Month" and it was a wonderful success thanks to many of you. It truly was a team effort and so many people helped that it would be hard to list them all here. I simply want to thank all of you. We learned a lot. We learned what needs to be done next time and we learned what not to do. I'm looking forward to it being an even greater success next time.

This month, October, is designated as stewardship month for our church. During this month you will be presented a church budget for 2011 and be given the opportunity to pledge toward it. During my sermon on Homecoming Sunday I compared our church to a well that needed to be maintained in order for it to produce the life giving water our community needs. You and I are refreshed, encouraged, and strengthened by its ministries only because of the countless people who have come before us who have supported and maintained its ministries through giving. They fulfilled their responsibility as stewards enabling the ministry from which we have benefited. Now we are the stewards and the future ministry of this church depends on us. It depends on our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our service. Please prayerfully consider your financial gifts for the coming year. Your pledging response will determine, to a great extent, our ministry for 2011.

The budget you will be presented is our very best estimate as to what will be needed to pay our apportionments, maintain the buildings, pay the salaries and utilities, and maintain our education and outreach ministries. This is a bare minimum budget and there will be very little that can be trimmed without having a major impact on the churches ministry.

In asking for your pledge we are asking for your best estimate. We understand that things happen and often those who pledge are not able to carry through as intended. Don't worry, if you are unable to keep up with your pledge no one will be calling you or writing to you. Of course if you find that you are able to increase your pledge at some point by all means do so!

We will be very conscientious in providing you with an accurate picture of the church's financial needs. All we can ask is that you, the members and friends of NMUMC, make a conscientious effort to support those needs and ensure our continued ministry here in the New Market community.

On the 2nd Sunday of October there will be copies of the 2011 Budget available at the back of the sanctuary along with a personnel letter and pledge materials. This information will be mailed to those who don't pick up their letters. There will be a box at the back of the church where you can deposit your completed pledge. You can also mail it to the church or leave it in the offering plate.

We will be keeping you posted as to how the pledge drive is doing. If you feel during the course of the campaign, in response to the pledging activity, that you wish to increase your pledge that will be no problem – simply send in a corrected pledge. If you have any questions about what a certain line item includes please contact Tim Summers or myself.


Harvest of Hope Retreat

OUR MISSION FOR OCTOBER IS WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

Originally a Presbyterian observance, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America established a Worldwide Communion Sunday in 1940 as a global, interdenominational event. Prompted by the impact of WWII, the Methodist Church received an offering on this Sunday for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service. It aided the work of the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (now UMCOR).

In 1971, the United Methodist Church changed the name of the observance to World Communion Sunday and redistributed the offering to support the Crusade Scholarship Program and the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries. In 1980, Chaplains and Related Ministries was moved to World Service funding but the World Communion Sunday offering continued to assist racial and ethnic minority persons pursuing various avenues of ministry.
