






The white crosses displayed on our campus served as a powerful, visible reminder to all who passed by. Each one representing an unborn life lost to abortion. As a school, we came together to take a stand for life and to raise awareness about the overlooked impact on abortion in our communities. For many years, abortion has been widely accepted and legally protected, beginning with it becoming legal in 1973. But with this project, we wanted to highlight the reality behind the statistics. The total number of crosses reflected an estimate of lives lost to abortion in Shawano, Wisconsin alone. Each cross was not just a symbol, but a voice for the voiceless as well. Wisconsin alone, an estimated 13,000 potential lives are lost to abortion each year. Globally, that number reaches over 518,000 annually.

For many, abortion is seen not only as a tragedy, but as the loss of a voice that was never heard. The Christian faith holds that every life is created with purpose and value, and through efforts like the white cross memorial, believers seek to speak up for the voiceless and stand for life. Every white cross we placed reminded others of the voiceless lives lost, and we hope that one day, every life will be valued and protected from conception. Thank you for continuing to stand for life, even when it's not easy. Your courage and braveness impact our community. May we all remember that life is sacred, from its very first moment. Have these crosses remind people of the potential lives we lost.

Dolphins are considered to be one of the most intelligent animals in the world. They show many characteristics that mirror humans. In their brain dolphins have a cell called spindle neurons, which causes them to have a higher cognitive level that helps them display reasoning, remembering, and communication. Dolphins are quick to learn new concepts, can learn to complete complex tasks, and they even teach the behaviors to other dolphins which can lead to multiple generations of knowledge. Dolphins have a very high emotional intelligence; they can show empathy, mourn their dead, and can create long lasting bonds. Similar to humans, dolphins show physical touch to loved ones. Unlike humans, dolphins aren't able to use words so they have to communicate through other ways. Dolphins have to communicate using sounds and body language to display how they feel. They use verbalization sounds to communicate and show emotion, ex. burst pulse sounds and whistles that are more specific that help with identification. Nonverbal ways that dolphins communicate are tail slamming, breaching, body language, and movements.



#### **ECHOLOCATION**

The coolest resource that I found that dolphins use is echolocation. When I first heard about it, I was amazed. Dolphins use echolocation, which is a biological sonar system; they emit high frequent clicks that bounce off of objects. That way they can see their surroundings by interpreting the echoes that bounce back. It helps them navigate in places that are harder to see, locate prey, and sense any nearby danger. Echolocation can help them find information about the object in their surroundings like its size, shape, how far away it is and even what its texture is. The clicks are focused on the melon, it is then received in their lower jaw, then echoes in their ear which helps their brain understand and interpret it, giving them the information they need.

#### RELATING IT TO GOD

God made dolphins so special and so incredibly smart. God made animals to teach us that actions speak louder than words. Dolphins aren't able to talk and use words like humans but yet they find a way to communicate and show emotions. Dolphins use echolocation to see their surroundings, to communicate to others, and to watch out for dangers. In many ways God made dolphins like humans. Though we can't physically see or hear God, maybe He is trying to communicate with us and we don't even know it! We need to be a little more like dolphins and stop, and start using our senses or 'echolocation' to listen to what He might be trying to tell us all along! Isaiah 55:3 says, "Incline your ear, and come unto me: hear, and your soul shall live; and I will make an everlasting covenant with you, even the sure mercies of David."
