One catchphrase of 2020 that I'm sick of hearing is "the new normal." The idea is that the coronavirus pandemic has fundamentally changed our society; perhaps temporarily, perhaps permanently, but in either case there is a "new normal" we all have to adapt to. Certainly there are changes we have to come to terms with, but what does "normal" even mean? We're always adapting to new ideas of what is or is not normal.

Humans are, by and large, creatures of habit. Even the most spontaneous among us still need some stability and order -- total chaos is not an environment that humans can thrive in. And the world is always changing. 2020 may, in the long term, go down as a year with more profound changes than usual, but maybe not.

It's also natural for us to yearn for "the good old days" if the old days were actually good, a time when we had it pretty good. But the trajectory of history is heading toward one unchangeable, unknowable moment when God will actually make things truly good, and the

world is going to go through a lot of twists and turns to get there, both personally and societally. We don't find stability and security in maintaining or returning to the ways we've always done things; we find stability and security only in God and His future for us. He wants us to His gifts that do endure and will not change.

"New normals" are always sneaking up on us, whether in the gain or loss of a family member, the coming and going of political leaders, or more dramatic headline events. And the way to cope with them is always the same: not to cling onto worldly things, but onto eternal things. "The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the Word of the Lord endures forever, and this word is the Gospel that was preached to you" (1 Peter 1:24-25). The things of this world come and go; the "normals" of this world come and go. "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13:8)

I don't know what "normal" is supposed to mean, in a worldly sense. I certainly don't know if we're living in a "new normal" or not. But human life is always subject to the changes and chances of

this world, and there is only one Christ who is the rock that is always same, always the foundation and lodestar, always the true normal and one that does not change for us. While we may face challenges we have not encountered before, our resources remain the same: our Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit stand by us and supply us through the Word of God's promise in the Gospel.

The Holy Spirit lends His stabilizing presence to our everyday circumstances as they shift and refocus our thinking and living. Jesus Christ promised to be with us to the end of the age, and He assured His disciples the Holy Spirit would be here and there and everywhere for us. He who was born for us, who died for us, who rose for us comes to be with us and for us amidst all the changes we experience on the roller-coaster of life. The Holy Spirit works through the Word of God that created the world and gives it its stability, its order, and its peace. Jesus Christ, who gives a peace no human system or institution, no custom or practice can give, is here for us, at our side, on our side, in every "new normal."

2019-2021 Mission Grant 12 — \$100,000

Asia is a harvest field ripe for the gospel. Women in Mission realize that our grants to missionaries in the field bring God's Word to a dying world. Asia is predominately secular with Buddhist, Muslim, Hindu and other false religions. Throughout Taiwan, Thailand, Hong Kong, Macau and Southeast Asia, ten women do various mission works such as teaching, acts of mercy and witnessing the gospel. Some have

husbands and families working alongside of them while others work with a team or alone. One missionary teaches 242 students about Jesus in Taiwan while another has served for 10 years planting seeds of mercy and witnessing in Southeast Asia. Whether teaching English as a Second Language in Thailand or building relationships to open doors for sharing the gospel, each woman in the mission field helps in the growth God's Kingdom. This grant will help support these women in their unique mission setting in Asia.

A Thought about Stewardship

Winston Churchill reportedly said, “we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give.” According to Churchill then, our lives are defined less by what we have gotten and more by what we give away.



Our Lord's life is defined in this way. He gave completely of Himself for us. He became man for us. He taught the truth of God's Word. He healed those with many and various diseases. He died the death that we deserve because of sin. He gave of Himself in order to save us from sin, death, and hell. So it is that by giving completely of Himself, He got us for Himself, making us citizens of His eternal kingdom by grace.

Assisting Church Workers Impacted by the Pandemic Soldiers of the Cross



Since 2004, the Soldiers of the Cross program has delivered emergency financial support and pastoral care to rostered professional church workers in crisis. In early April, as churches and schools across the country were shutting down to help stem the spread of the coronavirus, the program's scope was expanded. Now any employee of an LCMS church, school, Recognized Service Organization or institution can request a one-time Soldiers grant through their district.

Initially, \$2.5 million was earmarked for this COVID-19 response — \$1 million from Lutheran Church Extension Fund and \$1.5 million from the LCMS, pulled from contributions previously given for Soldiers of the Cross, LCMS World Relief and Human Care, and LCMS Disaster Response.


The LCMS also is encouraging ongoing donations to help even more workers. Through the end of May, God's people have already responded to that call by providing \$400,000 in additional funding for more grants, with another \$438,570 to coordinate "after care" services likely to be needed by exhausted LCMS clergy when the pandemic is over.

"In this tumultuous time that we're going through as a country, we're also seeing that affecting our church workers in very tangible, financial ways," said the Rev. Dr. Ross Johnson, director of LCMS Disaster Response, who is currently overseeing the grant program. "This is a way that we can help our church workers who are going through a financial hardship."

Dollars for the Soldiers Amplified grants can come from donations directed to LCMS World Relief and Human Care. Some LCMS districts also are appealing for donations with the aim of underwriting at least 20 percent of each Soldiers Amplified grant given to workers in crisis.
