One of the great benefits of a “traditional” or “liturgical” church like ours is the use of a lectionary, a schedule of Scripture readings for the various worship services throughout the year. The schedule we usually follow is in a three-year cycle, and each service includes three readings: usually Old Testament, New Testament Epistle, and Gospel.

Over the course of three years, we can cover a lot of ground. However, with as much material as the Bible has to offer, some things are still left out. Nine out of the sixty-six books are not used at all; another twelve are used only once during that three-year span. The year of the Church does not line up exactly with the year of our civil calendar; as of November 29, we have just begun

a new church year -- and this year, I want to invite you to join me in a project of visiting every book in the Bible at least once.

There are sixty-six books in the Old and New Testaments; and, when we include all the Sundays, all the Advent and Lenten midweek services, and a few special occasions like Christmas Eve, Good Friday, Thanksgiving, etc. we arrive at sixty-six worship services during the year. What a wonderful opportunity! So during this new church year, each service will feature a reading from each book of the Bible; by the end, we won't have read every word in the Bible, but we will have visited each of the books in the Scriptural collection (We won't be going through in order, from Genesis to Revelation; for example, our four Sundays of Advent will take us to

Titus, Daniel, Genesis, and Numbers).

Perhaps it will help us better appreciate the comprehensiveness and consistency of God's message to us, and help us better see how Christ and the Good News about him is at the center of Scripture from beginning to end. “All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness,” as 2 Timothy says, and God declares via the prophet Isaiah, “so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it,” so when we are turning back to all of Scripture to receive the gifts God gives us by His Word, we cannot help but benefit.

Membership, Worship, and Christian Education

- Search for an additional organist: we are thankful for Rita and Tanya's service, but they'd appreciate some relief if we can find another organist to help out!
- Advent Midweek services this year are December 2, 9, and 16. Are we having suppers?
- I would like to plan a Christmas Day service this year. In light of the coronavirus situation, I expect there are some people who would normally get together or travel to be with family, but won't be able to this year; there may be others who would like to have a Christmas service but are uneasy with the typical Christmas Eve crowd. I suggest a service in the afternoon on Christmas Day, 2pm or 3pm; simple lessons and carols, singing a lot of favorite Christmas songs.

Mission, Witness, and Outreach

- The online services are a good outreach tool! I encourage everyone to share these on your own pages, as some of you already have. The services stay available after the initial premiere, so anyone can go back and watch older ones too.

Circuit, District, and Synod

- For the foreseeable future, we are holding our monthly circuit meetings online via Zoom.

Due to COVID restrictions, an abbreviated Voters Assembly was held in the sanctuary following service. All members maintained social distance guidelines and wore masks.

Pastor Waffel opened with prayer.

The reading of previous minutes was waived. Sign in sheets were not used (COVID guidelines). The ushers counted 29 members in attendance.

Pastor Waffel: We will continue to worship, observing social distancing guidelines. Two members have passed away since our last voters meeting, Melvin Hayes and Polly Ross. No services are planned at this time, but Pastor will notify us if a memorial services will be held in the future. Oktoberfest was held outside this year, about 40 people attended. New Bible

study begins next week. "The Story" is based on the Bible, one chapter a week will be covered. Study videos are also posted on Facebook.

Pastor was selected as the new Circuit Visitor for our district and will begin serving in that role next summer.

A Thought about Stewardship

Christmas is coming. It is a joyous time of feasting. The Church feasts upon the Word of God in sermon, song, and sacrament.

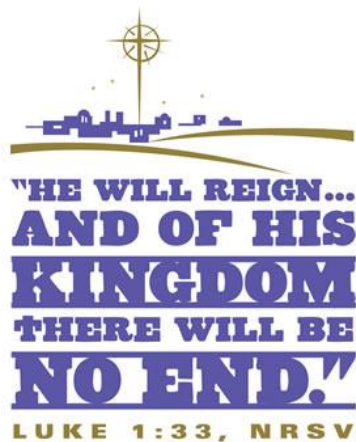
We hear the proclamation of the message of the angels: “Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord” (Luke 2:10-11). We mingle our voices with theirs as we sing, “Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased” (Luke 2:14)! We receive the proclaimed Savior, Christ the Lord, not wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in manger but wrapped in bread and wine placed into our mouths for the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. We feast in great joy indeed because of this great blessing from our Lord and God.

God’s people in ancient Israel also feasted with great joy. The Lord showered His abundant blessing on His people. And He commanded them to feast upon it (Deuteronomy 16). The people were to go to the place appointed, where the Lord would make His name dwell, and give offerings, each man as he was able, according to the blessing of the Lord that He had given them (Deut. 16:10, 15, 17).

And there the Lord would bless them with joy as they feasted upon what the Lord had provided. They ate of the choice parts of their offerings. They enjoyed the company of all the people of God as they together heard His promises of blessing, sang of His bountiful goodness, and partook of what He gave.

We feast on the Word who became flesh to dwell among us, not just during Christmas but throughout all the year. We feast not just on the salvation He has wrought for us in His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, but we feast also on all the temporal blessings that God gives out of His fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We enjoy the rich bounty that God provides, not only in Word and Sacrament, but also in house and home, property and income, family and friends.

Let us then, as did our brothers in the faith from ancient Israel, give as we are able, according to the blessing of the Lord our God that He has given us. Let us, like them, give generously of the first fruits of our income, which He gives, so that all may know and enjoy the salvation He gives and the joy we have in the Savior born in the city of David, who is Christ the Lord.

Advent

Advent specifically focuses on Christ's "coming," but Christ's coming manifests itself among us in three ways — past, present, and future.

The readings which highlight Christ's coming in the past focus on the Old Testament prophecies of his incarnation at Bethlehem. The readings, which highlight Christ's coming in the future, focus on his "second coming" on the Last Day at the end of time. And the readings that highlight Christ's coming in the present focus on his ministry among us through Word and Sacrament today.

The traditional use of Advent candles (sometimes held in a wreath) originated in eastern Germany even prior to the Reformation. As this tradition came down to us by the beginning of this century, it involved three purple candles and one pink candle.

The purple candles matched the purple paraments on the altar (purple for the royalty of the coming King). The pink candle was the third candle to be lit (not the fourth) on Gaudete Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent.

"Gaudete" means "Rejoice!" in Latin, which is taken from Phil. 4:4.

("Rejoice! ... the Lord is near"). Hence a "pink" candle was used to signify "rejoicing." Some also included a white "Christ candle" in the middle to be lit during the 12 days of Christmas (Dec. 25 to Jan. 5).

The concept of giving each candle a name, i.e., Prophecy, Bethlehem, Shepherd and Angel, etc., is a relatively novel phenomenon and probably originates with certain entrepreneurial publishers seeking to sell Advent candles and devotional booklets.
