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# BEFORE HITTING THE ROAD

RV CAMPING OFFERS A UNIQUE WAY TO TRAVEL, BLENDING FREEDOM AND COMFORT WITH ADVENTURE AND EXPLORATION. BEFORE HITTING THE ROAD, NEW RVERS SHOULD BE FAMILIAR WITH SEVERAL KEY ASPECTS OF THEIR RV TO ENSURE A SMOOTH AND SAFE TRIP:

## 1 Weight Limits and Towing Capacity

Understand your RV's **gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR)** and make sure your vehicle can safely tow or carry the load. Overloading can lead to dangerous driving conditions and damage to your RV or vehicle.

## 2 Electrical Systems

Know how your RV's electrical system works, including the **12-volt system**, **shore power connections**, and how to safely operate or charge your batteries. Familiarize yourself with the power limits to avoid overloading circuits.

## 3 Water Systems

Learn how to manage the **freshwater**, **greywater**, and **blackwater tanks**. Understand how to fill and empty them properly, and keep track of tank levels.

## 4 Propane Usage

If your RV uses propane for appliances like the stove, refrigerator, or heating system, make sure you know how to turn it on, off, and monitor the tank levels safely.

## 5 Tire Maintenance

Check the **tire pressure** regularly and ensure that tires are in good condition to avoid blowouts. Also, carry a spare tire and know how to change it if needed.

## 6 Emergency Tools

Keep essential tools, including **wheel chocks**, **leveling blocks**, a **jack**, and an **emergency roadside kit** for quick fixes or emergencies.

## 7 Parking and Leveling

Practice parking and leveling your RV, as uneven surfaces can affect the functionality of appliances like the refrigerator and lead to discomfort while inside.

## 8 Insurance and Paperwork

Ensure you have proper **RV insurance**, registration, and any necessary roadside assistance plans in place before your trip.

## 9 Driving Skills

If you're new to driving or towing an RV, practice maneuvering in different conditions like parking, turning, and backing up before embarking on a long trip.

## 10 Battery Management

Understand how to manage and conserve your battery, especially if you're boondocking (camping without hookups), so you don't run out of power unexpectedly.

# QUICK TIPS FOR NEW RVERS

# RV PRE-TRIP CHECKLIST

## Planning Your Trip

### MAP OUT YOUR ROUTE

Plan your route ahead of time to ensure it's suitable for your RV. Use RV-specific GPS or mapping tools that consider low clearances, weight limits, and other restrictions.

### CHECK FOR ROAD RESTRICTIONS AND RV-FRIENDLY ROUTES

Research any road restrictions, such as bridges or tunnels with height limits, and choose routes that are RV-friendly. Avoid narrow, winding roads or congested city areas when possible.

### MAKE RESERVATIONS AT CAMPGROUNDS IN ADVANCE

Secure your spot at popular campgrounds ahead of time, especially during peak seasons. Ensure the sites you choose can accommodate the size of your RV and provide the necessary hookups.



## RV Maintenance

### INSPECT TIRES (CHECK PRESSURE AND TREAD)

Ensure your tires are in good condition with the correct pressure and adequate tread. Check for any signs of wear, cracks, or bulges.

### TEST BRAKES AND LIGHTS

Inspect the brake system and test all exterior lights, including headlights, taillights, turn signals, and brake lights.

### CHECK ENGINE FLUIDS AND FUEL LEVELS

Verify that all engine fluids (oil, coolant, brake fluid, etc.) are at the correct levels. Top off the fuel tank and ensure you have enough propane if needed.

### INSPECT RV ROOF AND SEALANTS

Check the roof for any signs of damage or leaks. Inspect sealants around vents, windows, and seams, and reseal if necessary.

### ENSURE BATTERY IS CHARGED

Test your RV battery's charge level and ensure it's fully charged before departure. If your battery is older, consider replacing it if it shows signs of weakening.

## Packing Essentials

### FOOD AND BEVERAGES

Pack enough non-perishable food, snacks, and drinks for the duration of your trip. Plan meals that are easy to prepare in your RV kitchen or over a campfire.

### PERSONAL ITEMS (CLOTHING, TOILETRIES, ETC.)

Bring clothing appropriate for the weather, toiletries, and any personal care items. Don't forget extra towels, sunscreen, and insect repellent.

### FIRST-AID KIT AND MEDICATIONS

Ensure your first-aid kit is well-stocked with bandages, antiseptics, and any necessary medications. Include items like pain relievers, allergy meds, and motion sickness tablets.

### TRAVEL DOCUMENTS (INSURANCE, LICENSES, RESERVATIONS):

Gather all essential travel documents, including your RV insurance, driver's license, vehicle registration, and any reservation confirmations. Keep these in a designated folder for easy access.

## RV Interior Preparation

### SECURE LOOSE ITEMS INSIDE

Safeguard all loose items that could move or fall while driving. Use storage bins, straps, and non-slip mats to keep everything in place.

### STOCK UP ON CLEANING SUPPLIES

Bring cleaning products like disinfectant wipes, paper towels, and trash bags. Don't forget a broom and dustpan for quick cleanups.

### FILL WATER TANKS (FRESH, GRAY, BLACK)

Make sure your fresh water tank is filled and the gray and black tanks are emptied. If needed, treat the black tank with chemicals to help break down waste.

### TEST APPLIANCES (FRIDGE, STOVE, ETC.)

Turn on and test all appliances to ensure they are working properly. Check the fridge and freezer to see that they are cooling, and test your stove, oven, and microwave.





# AT YOUR CAMPSITE

## Arrival

### Level Your RV:

- **Use a Leveling Tool:** Place a bubble level on the RV's floor or use a built-in leveling system to check if the RV is level from side to side and front to back.
- **Adjust the RV:** If necessary, use leveling blocks or ramps under the low side tires. For RVs with hydraulic or electric jacks, adjust the jacks to level the RV.

### Engage Parking Brake & Chock Wheel:

- **Parking Brake:** Make sure the parking brake is fully engaged to prevent any movement while you're setting up.
- **Wheel Chocks:** Place chocks in front of and behind the wheels to prevent the RV from rolling.

## Connecting Utilities

### Hook Up to Water, Electricity, and Sewer:

- **Water Connection:**
  - Attach the freshwater hose to the RV's water inlet and to the campground's spigot.
  - Use a water pressure regulator to prevent high pressure from damaging your RV's plumbing.
- **Electricity Connection:**
  - Plug the RV's power cord into the campsite's electrical pedestal.
  - Ensure the power cord matches the pedestal's amperage (30-amp, 50-amp) and check for a proper connection.
- **Sewer Connection:**
  - Attach the sewer hose to the RV's waste outlet and the other end to the campsite's sewer inlet.
  - Use a sewer hose support to prevent kinks and ensure a proper flow.
- **Test Connections:**
  - Water: Turn on the water and check for leaks at the connection points.
  - Electricity: Test electrical appliances inside the RV to confirm that power is properly connected.
  - Sewer: Check the connection for leaks and ensure the waste flows correctly into the sewer system.
- **Ensure Propane is Turned On (If Needed):**
  - Open the propane valves on your tanks and check that the system is functioning properly. Inspect for leaks using soapy water on the connections.





# AT YOUR CAMPSITE

## Outdoor Setup

- **Extend Awnings:**
  - Pull out the awning, ensuring there are no obstructions in the area. Secure the awning legs and adjust to the desired height.
- **Set Up Outdoor Furniture and Gear:**
  - Arrange outdoor chairs, tables, mats, and any other gear you've brought. Create a comfortable outdoor living space.
- **Connect Outdoor Lighting and Decorations:**
  - Set up string lights, lanterns, or other lighting. Add any decorative items like flags, rugs, or banners to enhance your campsite.
- 

## Safety Checks

- **Check Fire Extinguishers and Smoke/CO Detectors:**
  - Verify that fire extinguishers are fully charged and easily accessible.
  - Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are functioning properly.
- **Lock Doors and Secure Storage Compartments:**
  - Ensure all doors, windows, and compartments are securely locked to prevent theft and keep out pests.





# SETTING UP YOUR *Campsite*

## Arrival

- Locate your designated spot
- Is the site level? If yes, place wheel
- chocks in front of and behind the tires
- If not, proceed to leveling the RV

## Leveling the RV

- Park and engage the parking brake
- Use a bubble level (or built in leveling system)
- Add Leveling blocks under wheels if needed
- Adjust stabilizing jacks for final leveling

## Slide outs, awnings, outdoors, & Safety

- Set up camping chair, mats, & outdoor gear
- Ensure the area is clear of obstacles,
- slowly extend slide outs. deploy the awning and secure.
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Lock doors and secure storage compartments.



# CONNECTING *Utilities*

## Water Hookup:

- Attach a water pressure regulator to the spigot.
- Connect the water hose to the regulator, then to your RV's inlet.
- Turn on the water slowly and check connections for leaks.

## Sewer Hookup:

- Attach the sewer hose to your RV's outlet valve.
- Use sewer hose supports if needed.
- Connect the other end to the campsite's sewer inlet.
- Keep the gray tank valve closed and only open it when needed; leave the black tank valve closed until it's time to dump.

## Electricity Hookup:

- Check the power pedestal for correct voltage (30-amp, 50-amp)
- Plug in your RV's power cable
- Flip the pedestal's circuit breaker on
- Test appliances inside the RV to ensure the connection is working



# LEAVING THE CAMPSITE

## Disconnecting Utilities

- **Disconnect and store hoses and cables:**
  - Unhook water, power, and sewer connections.
  - Coil and store hoses and cables properly.
- **Empty tanks and flush systems:**
  - Drain grey and black water tanks at the dump station.
  - Flush the tanks if needed before sealing caps.

## Interior Prep

- **Secure and stow loose items:**
  - Store any loose items in cupboards or secure them to avoid movement.
- **Turn off appliances:**
  - Switch off and unplug appliances like coffee makers and TVs.
- **Close windows and roof vents:**
  - Ensure all windows and vents are closed to prevent drafts and leaks.

## Exterior Prep

- **Retract awnings, slide-outs, and jacks:**
  - Fully retract the awnings, slide-outs, and leveling jacks.
- **Inspect tires and lights one last time:**
  - Check tire pressure and make sure all lights are functioning.
- **Double-check for any left-behind items:**
  - Walk around the site to ensure nothing is left behind, like chairs or tools.

## Departure Safety

- **Test brakes and check mirrors:**
  - **Perform a brake test and adjust mirrors for clear visibility.**
- **Ensure all passengers are seated and secure:**
  - Confirm everyone is seated with seatbelts fastened before driving off.

## Ensure your campsite is cleaned and free of hazards

These steps will help ensure a smooth and safe departure from the campsite.  
Have a safe trip home or to your next stop.

## Hot Spot & Internet Data Plan

- RV newcomers often face confusion when trying to find the best hotspot and data plan for staying connected on the road. For those working remotely or needing constant internet access.
- **Mobile Hotspot or similar**. You can use phones data plan. There are devices that typically come with a monthly fee. One option, is from **Reliable Internet**, offering completely unlimited data with no caps or throttling. It's a suitable choice for individuals living and working while traveling full-time.
- **Satellite Internet** If you're traveling in remote areas with no cell towers, satellite internet is probably your best bet. A few different companies offer satellite internet plans specifically for RVers and just recently the new Starlink service. It's a bit tricky right now with Starlink and more in "beta" mode, but in time, it could be a great addition to your Internet hotspot devices.
- **Camp ground or Public WiFi** If you're in a pinch, you can always try to find a public WiFi connection, like at a coffee shop or library.
- **Garmin Inreach Satellite Device** Also highly recommend, is getting a Garmin Inreach satellite communicator. This little device uses 100% satellite technology to allow you to send and receive text messages, track your location, and even call for help in an emergency, all without cell service.



# RV CAMPGROUND

## Site Size and Availability



Make sure the sites are spacious enough for your RV and allow for easy entry and exit. Level sites reduce setup time and make your stay more comfortable.

## Hookups and Utilities



Check if the campground offers full hookups (water, sewer, and electricity). Some campgrounds also provide Wi-Fi and cable TV, but be aware that internet quality can vary.

## Amenities and Activities



Depending on your preferences, look for amenities such as laundry facilities, showers, picnic tables, fire pits, and recreational areas. Some campgrounds offer pools, hiking trails, or organized events.

## Location and Surroundings



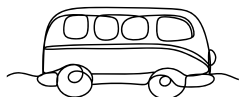
Proximity to attractions, scenic views, and safety of the surrounding area can enhance your experience. A well-situated campground allows you to enjoy both relaxation and exploration.

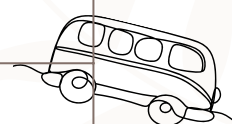
