



From the Pastor

Do you remember the old saying, "Time is money?" Although I rarely hear that expression anymore, I believe it still rings quite true. At the same time, I also believe that time is also a gift. In fact, it's the greatest resource that any of us will ever have. Our use of it will help determine our prospective earnings, how we spend our money, how healthy we are, what the



value of our relationships will be, the quality of our overall well-being.

Time is also the ultimate counterbalance – no matter who you are or where you live, you have the exact same 24 hours each day and the freedom to decide how you're going to use them. And yet, no matter how hard we try, time seems impossible to manage. All that you can manage is yourself. It's inevitable: time keeps on ticking, whether you're paying attention to it or not. So rather than making every attempt to

manage it, why not make it our aim to make the most of it?

What this does is takes our everyday schedule out of the hands of Father Time and places it squarely into our own. I can never fall prey to busyness or a crowded schedule because I have given permission to every last item on my calendar. Time didn't crowd my calendar, I did.

As believers in Christ, how well we use our time becomes even more important. As our most valuable resource, God gives us the freedom to use our time in whatever way we want. Our time should therefore, be subject above all else, to Christ.

For example, it would be most inconsistent for me to offer my financial treasures for the advancement of God's work, but not the way I offer my time. One could easily make the comparison to the Parable of the Talents in Matthew 25— two men wisely used the resources given to them and their money increased significantly. A third man was lazy with what he had been entrusted with and he was punished. The time we are given cannot be magically increased, but how we use the precious time we have been given can magnify the difference we make for others.

In our world today, our time is up for grabs. We face family, friends, employers and co-workers, advertisers, and marketers, competing for as much of it as they can get. And all of these constant demands on our time, leave us distracted, adding to the various "multi-tasking" that is already distorting our sanity.

An article written by James Hewitt in the World Economic Forum a few years ago, properly describes our constant distractions brought on by today's technology: "Our smartphones buzz with notifications throughout the day and night; we accept relentless distraction as the default option. Habitual checking on missed calls and messages can become an addictive pattern of behavior, increasing stress and disturbing sleep. More than 90% of people multi-task during meetings. 42% of us admit to reading and responding to e-mail in the bathroom. 70% of us check e-mail while watching TV. When we find the opportunity to rest, 34% of us admit to using social media as a form of mental break."

If the Parable of Talents had been written today, it would probably look significantly different. I'm guessing the "wicked and slothful" man who did nothing with the money would have been too distracted with his various social media profiles and overwhelming work schedule that he just didn't feel like he had time to invest. But what I feel is most important for us to realize is that, when the stewardship of our time and finances work in unison, our likely investment in the advancement of God's Kingdom grows dramatically.

Let's liken this to an employee who uses his time wisely and productively, he becomes a better employee and may receive a raise, promotion, or a new career opportunity. When an individual uses their time throughout the week wisely to plan,

budget, and organize, they save money at the grocery store, reduces their stress, and increases their resourcefulness.

But the opposite is also true – the more time you waste, the faster your earning potential decreases and the more money you waste. In fact, often, ill use of your time can cost you far more than overspending would.

There is much written in the Bible that deals with using our time well. The book of Proverbs reminds us to ask the Lord, "To teach us to number our days so that we may gain a heart of wisdom." How we guard our hearts and minds can significantly influence how we spend our time and money.

But, more than anything else, being good stewards of our time is a perfect way to serve God. The problem is, many of us are too busy--too busy doing things for God that we neglect to do the things of God.

Why not decide to be the best user-of-time you can be, and pray for wisdom on how to increase your productivity as well. Honor God in the way you do your job, the amount of time you spend on social media, and how you personally interact with others. In the same manner that making a budget forces you to cut out the excess, organizing your time will force you to make hard sacrifices as well. It might mean waking up an extra 15 minutes early in the morning or deleting Facebook off your phone to meet with the Lord in prayer instead, or to bring a meal to a neighbor in need, or to serve in one of our church's many ministries. But, most importantly, it may be the key to hearing, "well done, good and faithful servant". Make time. Choose wisely of your time--but choose.


