
Amherst Township Road Projects

The streets of Hidden Valley are concrete construction, and some of the older streets were constructed in the 1970's with little to no street base or drainage. Because of the lower speed limits and traffic volumes in the Valley, street repair does not usually qualify for grant funding through the Ohio Public Works Commission. Over the years, your local tax dollars have been used to repair only the most severely damaged street sections in the Valley. These emergency repairs required saw cutting of the damaged sections, and replacement with new concrete. The very small sectional replacement of street did not allow for adequate improvement of the street base, nor the addition of necessary drainage. As a result, the repairs were generally short lived, heaving & settling during freeze-thaw cycles, resulting in damage from routine plowing and road use. In addition, this type of repair has a very large unit cost.

In 2008, a different approach was taken for the Hidden Valley Subdivision street rehabilitation and safety improvement projects. The new method involved larger sectional replacement to allow for sub-base and drainage improvement. Funding of these larger street projects was made possible through interest free, 20-year term loans obtained from the Ohio Public Works Commission. The **2008** repairs were funded with a \$90K grant, \$110k loan, and \$95K local funds. The **2009** repairs were funded with a \$200K loan and \$110K in local funds. 2010 will allow for one additional large road rehabilitation project in Hidden Valley, funded by a \$200K loan and \$100K local funds. After 2010, it is expected that the Valley streets can be maintained with routine patching and crack sealing, allowing time for the interest free loans to be repaid, at which point further rehabilitation projects will be required.

Also in 2010, resurfacing of Bechtel Road is planned. Funding of Bechtel Road will be a combination of OPWC grant funds and local township tax dollars.

and ideas that she supported, sometimes resulted in heated disagreements among residents and various township officials. At the same time, Elaine’s passionate support for her position demonstrated her desire to continually improve the environment and quality of life in Amherst Township for current and future residents.

We will miss Elaine’s debates, her passion and her laughter, and we would like to extend our sincerest sympathy to Elaine’s husband, John, her children Allison and Mathew, her mother Lois, and the rest of Elaine’s family.

Fior General Contractors, Inc. and Mark Lesner, the architect.

PERMITS REQUIRED

Residents are reminded that permits are needed for pools, decks, porches, patios, gazebos, fences, ponds, signs, garages, new construction, building additions, accessory buildings, and driveways. When a permit is obtained before the start of construction, the fee will be reduced by 50%. Be sure you or your contractor has obtained a permit. **Payments must be made by check only. Cash is not accepted.**

Please contact Don Gargas, Amherst Township Zoning Inspector for these permits. Office hours for the Zoning Inspector are from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays. He can be reached at 988-5866. Voice Mail is checked daily.

“Building inspections” through the Lorain County Building Department may also be required. These building “inspections” are in addition to the building “permits” that are required from the Township. The Amherst Township Zoning Inspector can assist you for both of these requirements. A building “permit” from the township is required **before** applying for the building “inspection” from the county. Permits for both the township and the county may be viewed on the township’s website under “zoning”.

Amherst Township, as a member of the Sandstone Joint Ambulance District, has chosen “LifeCare” to be their ambulance provider. Home-Delivered Meal Program

A variety of food choices at prices geared to income level are available to those over 60 or disabled adults over 18. Call **988-5822** for more details. ATSSO is also looking for 2 more meal drivers.

Food Assistance Programs

The **Ohio Food Assistance Program** is a nutrition assistance program. Those who qualify for benefits receive an electronic card that works just like a debit or credit card at the grocery store. The **OBB Benefits Check Up's** new web-based service is another way to find assistance with paying for food. It provides easy access to information about the federal **SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program)**. It can assist older Americans or their caregivers with finding information about local food programs, eligibility standards, application information and state-specific hotline phone numbers.

Economic Difficulties?

The Ohio Benefits Bank (OBB) at www.OBB.Ohio.Gov is a web-based computer program designed to connect low- and moderate-income Ohioans with access to information about tax credit and public benefits. Ohioans can also check potential eligibility for other work support benefits such as health care coverage, home energy assistance, child care subsidies, and food stamps at an OBB site.

Special Pension

"Veterans Aid & Attendance Special Pension" is for Veterans and/or surviving spouses serving from WWI to present. It is **not** dependent on service-related injuries.

It **does** help to pay for in-home care, a nursing home or an assisted living facility. To qualify, an individual must (by a doctor's order) require help with eating, bathing, dressing or incontinence care. Those who are blind or are a nursing home patient due to mental or physical incapacity also qualify.

When COBRA Strikes

The new Stimulus Plan provides a **65% subsidy** for **COBRA continuation premiums** for up to nine months covering **workers, and their families, who have involuntarily been terminated from their jobs between September 1, 2008 and December 31, 2009**. Those who initially failed to elect COBRA because it was **unaffordable** would be given an **additional 60 days** to elect COBRA and receive the subsidy.

Lower Your Electric Bills!

You can save money on your electric bill every month by completely turning off electronic equipment. Household appliances and electronics contribute to a majority of the expenses seen on monthly electric bills. What consumers may not know is a significant portion of that expense could be the result of items that are not in use. Computers, video game consoles, digital clocks, televisions, refrigerators and cell phones still use power even when they are “off.” Items that use a remote control, have an external power supply (like an AC adapter), have digital displays, battery chargers or soft-touch key pads are all examples of “vampire” or “standby” power products that can drive consumer’s electric bills up.

The amount of power these items use in standby mode can be startling. While most devices use much less electricity while in standby mode, combined they can account for up to 10% of your monthly bill. The largest power vampires are desktop computers, laptop computers and digital cable boxes with DVR’s. Even PS3/Xbox, 360/Wii, TVs, DVD players, charged cell phones, cable modems and the LCD in CPU monitors use 1-5 watts.

Some standby power is necessary. It’s what makes conveniences convenient. While it may be impossible to eliminate it, there are ways to reduce it. Unplug items not regularly used. Attach several similar items, like computer equipment, to a plug strip and turn it off while away. Items like cable boxes and Internet modems, which rely on standby power to send information, should be connected to a different circuit so the connection is not lost.

Gas Choice Agreement’s Fine Print (from “Ohio Consumer Counsel News”)

The Ohio Consumer Counsel (OCC) advises consumers to become familiar and understand all supplier contract language before enrolling. It is the consumer’s responsibility to understand any agreement’s fine print. Be sure to check out the following before completing your enrollment agreement:

- Does the agreement automatically renew upon completion?
- Would automatic renewal subject you to a higher rate?
- Is your rate fixed or variable?
- Are there additional fees for enrollment, transfer or cancellation?
- Is the supplier a certified Choice Program participant?
