Planting in Road Right-of-Way





Residents should not landscape or plant near road intersections or inside the road right-ofway. Generally, the road right-of-way is 30 feet on either side of the centerline of the road. If planting occurs in this area, homeowners should not be disappointed if plants are destroyed or removed due to maintenance or repair. Trees should not be planted in this area. If storm sewers run across your property, it is better not to plant trees, shrubs, or other vegetation too close to these lines in order to minimize the chance of any roots penetrating these lines and causing a blockage. Please be aware of any visibility issues that may be caused due to trees and shrubs growing near an intersection or the road right-of-way. Property owners are also responsible for removing dead branches of a tree that overhangs the road.

Concerning intersections, Article 300 of the Amherst Township Zoning Resolution, Section 307 (Visibility at Intersections) states:

On every corner lot there shall be no obstruction to visibility (whether by the location of structures including fences, landscaping or other means) between the heights of 3 feet and 6 feet above the natural grade, within the triangle formed by the right-of-way lines of two intersecting streets, and a line drawn between two points, one on each such right-of-way line, each 25 feet from the point of intersection of such right-of-way lines.

Lorain County Solid Waste Events

The LCSWMD has indefinitely postponed all Household Hazardous Waste Collection days and all E-Scrap Collection days. However, you will not be forced to hold all your materials for an extended period. The District has been working on a general alternative to these one-day collection events.

A large building in Elyria is being remodeled to serve as a countywide collection center. This building was the old "DIY" store, located near the intersection of Route 57 & Broad Street in Elyria.

This center will be set up to accept all the materials previously collected at one-day type events, as well as other materials. It will be open on a set schedule, all through the year. There will no longer be a need to mark the calendar with a specific date, and then wait in a long line to dispose of your materials.

Fire Service Agreement



In the spirit of true government cooperation, the Amherst Township Board of Trustees and the Village of South Amherst have again entered into a contract for the provision of "Fire Service" and "First Responder Emergency Medical Service" (EMS) for the unincorporated area of the township located to the south of the Ohio Turnpike. By sharing Fire and EMS services, Amherst Township and the Village of South Amherst are able to provide these services respective necessary to our communities at a more effective cost, saving taxpayer dollars. This is a 3-year contract that began on January 1, 2010 and will expire on December 31, 2012.





PERMITS REQUIRED

As Springtime arrives, residents are reminded that permits are needed for the items listed below. When a permit is obtained before the start of construction, the fee will be reduced by 50%. Be sure you or your contractor has obtained a permit. Payments must be made by check only. Cash is not accepted.

Please contact Don Gargas, Amherst Township Zoning Inspector for these permits. Building inspections through the Lorain County Building Department may also be required. "Building inspections" through the Lorain County Building Department may also be required. These building "inspections" are in addition to the building "permits" that are required from the Township. The Amherst Township Zoning Inspector can assist you for both of these requirements. A building "permit" from the township is required before applying for the building "inspection" from the county. Permits for both the township and the county may be viewed on the township's website under "zoning".



ODOT will be replacing the Oberlin Road bridge structure that goes over State Route 2. This bridge reconstruction will require the closure of Oberlin Road for 90 consecutive days, while traffic will be maintained on SR 2 during construction.

ODOT anticipates selling the project and being under contract by May 15, 2010. Construction of the bridge could begin in the summer or fall of 2010 or in the spring of 2011. Signage will be in place at least 1 week before construction begins, so that residents can adjust their travel routes. The township Road Superintendent will be notified 18 days before the detour will be in effect.

Funding for this project is provided by Federal Stimulus Funds as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA).



\$\$ Home-Repair Funding Help \$\$

"Community Development Block Grant" (CDBG) funding is available through the Lorain County Community Development Department. They are taking applications for low-to-moderate income homeowners who need financial assistance with health or safety related repairs to their residence. The program operates on a first-come first-serve basis and can assist income qualified Lorain County residents of owner occupied homes.

The repairs may address roofs, furnaces, hot water heaters, minor electrical, plumbing, sewer tap-ins, septic system replacement or the elimination of other threats to health and safety. Home repair assistance is available for up to \$8,000 per eligible client or up to \$15,000 for septic system replacement.

AMHERST TOWNSHIP PARK REMINDERS

Residents are reminded that as of March 1, 2003 animals are not permitted in the Amherst Township Park. Whoever violates this resolution is guilty of a minor misdemeanor and shall be prosecuted (ORC Section 511.32).

Also as a reminder, vandalism at the Amherst Township Park is prosecutable. Violators will be charged with Criminal Vandalism according to ORC 2909.05. This is a felony offense and carries a fine of \$2500. This will be strictly enforced. The township park is being patrolled by the Sheriff's Department.

2010 Medicare — Premiums, Deductibles, & Financial Assistance

2010 "Part A":

Hospital deductible:	\$1,100

<u> 2010 "Part B":</u>

Annual Deductible:\$155.00

"Part B" premiums:

- Those who were on Medicare prior to 2010 and had premiums withheld from their Social Security check will remain at \$96.40/month.
- Those who are new to Medicare in 2010 or who do not currently have the premium withheld from their Social Security check will pay \$110.50/month.
- Higher income beneficiaries (above \$85,000 for single, or 170,000 for married) will pay **\$110.50 plus** an additional amount based on their income.

"Part B & D" Financial Assistance

The resource limit for the Ohio <u>QMB/SLMB/QI</u> program in 2010 is increasing to **\$6,600 for an individual** and **\$9,910 for a couple.** This increase could help many clients become eligible for assistance with their "Part B" premium.

QMB — **Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program** acts like a free Medicare Supplement policy. QMB pays for all deductibles and coinsurances that Medicare does not pay. It also pays the Medicare "Part B" premium. To be eligible:

<u>Individual Income</u> - less than **\$923/mo**. <u>Married Income</u> - less than **\$1,235/mo**.

<u>SLMB</u> – Specified Low Income Medicare Beneficiary program pays the Medicare "Part B" premium. To be eligible:

<u>Individual Income</u> - range \$924 - \$1,103/mo. <u>Married Income</u> - range \$1,236 - \$1,477/mo.

QI — Qualified Individual program also pays the Medicare "Part B" premium, but these benefits are limited and an individual may need to apply annually. To be eligible:

Individual Income - range \$1,104 - \$1,239/mo.

Married Income - range \$1,478 - \$1,660/mo.

Those eligible for one of the QMB/SLMB/QI programs are also eligible for the "Part D" Prescription Drug financial assistance.

Don't Get Burned: Protect Yourself from Common Fire Hazards

The best defense against a deadly house fire is to have working smoke detectors installed in several rooms, particularly sleeping areas, and on every floor of your home. For as little as \$7 each, smoke alarms can nearly cut in half the risk of dying in a fire. Smoke alarms sense abnormal amounts of smoke or invisible combustion gases in the air and can detect both smoldering and flaming fires. But having them is only part of the solution; they must always have fresh batteries (install a fresh set each year) and be tested regularly (at least once a month). Smoke alarms wear out over time, so replace yours if it is 10 years old or older.

Once you have the reassurance that you and your family will be alerted if a fire starts in your home, focus on things you can do to prevent a fire from starting in the first place:

Make sure the only thing you cook is food.

Turn handles of pots and pans toward the back of the stove to avoid accidentally knocking them over. Do not leave anything unattended on the stove, even for just a minute. Do not wear loose-fitting clothing around the stove and keep towels, potholders and paper away from hot surfaces. Use the

oven and stove only to cook – do not use them to heat your home.

Watch your butts.

If you smoke, use deep-seated ashtrays on steady surfaces. Never smoke while lying down, when tired or when taking medications that cause drowsiness. Keep lighters, matches and lit cigarettes out of the reach of small children.

• Heat your spaces responsibly.

If you use electric space heaters, be sure the electrical cords and plugs are in good condition and only plug them directly into an outlet rated to carry the load. Do not plug electric heaters into extension cords or outlet strips. If you heat with a fireplace or heating stove, check that the fireplace flues are clear and use a screen to deflect sparks. Keep combustible materials like blankets, curtains and clothing at least three feet away from any heat sources.

Personal Safety Tips

Security concerns, medical emergencies, falls . . . these are all safety concerns among older adults, especially those that live alone. Here are some simple, low cost tips older adults can use to protect themselves.

Keep your **car keys** on the nightstand beside your bed at nighttime and in your pocket during the day. Use the panic button to alert a neighbor that you need assistance. Be sure your neighbor knows what you are doing and how to get into your home if it is locked. Remember that if you lock both the screen door and the house door, someone may have to break out the screen or glass to gain entry.

Place your **cell phone** by your bed in "silence mode" to be able to call out if you suspect an intruder may be in the house. Program in a speed dial for "911".
