Keep It Chill and Judgment-Free

- Talk it out: Let students know they can speak freely. Respect all opinions and make it clear there's no room for judgment.
- Privacy matters: Assure them that personal things they share stay confidential.
- No labels: Instead of jumping to conclusions about someone's behavior, approach with curiosity and empathy.

Be Open and Easy to Reach

- Open-door policy: Set up times when students can drop by to chat about anything-school stuff or personal issues.
- No judgment zone: Make it clear you're there to help, not to discipline.
- Listen like you mean it: Give your full attention and let them know you're hearing them. It makes a huge difference.

Build Real Connections

- Celebrate wins: Whether it's acing a test or just showing up, acknowledge the effort.
- Reach out: If someone seems down or distant, check in with them casually. Sometimes, that's all they need.

- Know your resources: Be ready to connect students with counselors or support programs when needed.
- Be kind but direct: If you think a student needs help, talk to them privately and with compassion. Let them know they're not alone.
