Greetings to the esteemed members of the Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA,

As the Professor of Military Science at the University of Oregon, it is both an honor and a responsibility to share updates from the front lines of leadership development—our Army ROTC program. Despite a shifting national landscape and policy adjustments, I'm pleased to report that our enrollment numbers remain strong. Interest in military service among today's students continues to rise, particularly among those motivated by the call to serve their country in an increasingly complex world.



One of the most significant shifts we've seen this year is in the ROTC scholarship environment. We are proud to say that our Cadets remain mission-focused and resilient in the face of change.

As alumni, veterans, and lifelong supporters of military service, your continued mentorship and engagement play a vital role in this mission. Whether through speaking engagements, networking events, or quiet encouragement, your example fuels the drive of the next generation.

NOTES:

Business continues to be conducted on the 501(c)19 account as we await the IRS Letter of Determination on the 501(c)3 account.

The Bottle Drop Account remains at \$603.34 as of April 16, 2025. Cans are being held until the drive in late April that offers 20% extra for returns.

There is a large discrepancy from the April Luncheon, due to a mistaken overcharge. This has been addressed and will be corrected at the May ROTC Dinner.

OLD BUSINESS:

- 1. Any new developments on the new non-profit organization? LOD received yet? Donors are asking.
 - A. The Letter of Determination (LOD) has not yet been received. IRS is working on applications filed on 1 Feb; ours was filed on 23 Mar.
 - B. Technically we can receive funds into the new 501(c)(3) account, but would have to return them if application not approved.
- 2. MOAA National visit

President Bard, Dick Kimbell and Michael Kennedy will be attending the appearance of Frank Michael, Senior Director, Affiliated Councils and Chapters for MOAA, at Willamette chapter on 23 April. We are comfortable that this will count as our visit from MOAA head-quarters.

- 3. Preps for the ROTC dinner
 - A. All presentation material turned over to President Bard except the printed programs. Once the awardee bios are received, the secretary will forward the file to him.
 - B. The board decided that gold bars will be presented to the ROTC cadets at their tables by our members during the self-introductions.
- 4. Picnic: President Bard will assist John Toensing with the picnic this year with the hope of another member being able to take over next year.
- 5. Guest Speakers for Sep Nov.
 - A. BG Hoffman will help to line up some military-themed speakers.
 - B. President Bard stated he could use his contacts with the U of O to get someone from there.
 - C. Jonathan Landon suggested he or a contact of his could make a presentation on service dogs.
- 6. "Thoughts from the Board" schedule.
 - Joe Snyder turned in the article for the May newsletter. Elaine Callahan is on deck for June.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. Veterans Service (\$2,500) and Bottle Drop (\$600) fund. What can we do to support Vets? President Bard charged all board members to look for ideas to visibly support our veterans and bring them to the next board meeting.

Clair Wray, Communications Specialist from EWEB, sent the following in response to a question from a member that went something like this: "How come whenever a repair/improvement is made to the water system, my electric bill seems to go up?"

Her response:

"EWEB follows governmental accounting standards and maintains separate financial books for the Electric and Water utilities. Each utility generates its own revenue, which is used to fund its operations, maintenance, and infrastructure improvements. EWEB prepares separate cost-of-service studies for Electricity and Water to set rates fairly and to safeguard that electric customers aren't paying for water infrastructure, and vice versa."
