Turn right on Parkway Rd, cross the river, then drive 0.6 miles.

Turn left onto Jasper Park Drive.


From I-5 (either north or southbound):


Take Exit 188 to OR-58 toward Oakridge.

After 5.4 miles turn left onto Parkway Rd.

Drive 2.2 miles, then turn right on Jasper Park Drive.

Once in the park find a place to park in the first parking lot. We are in Picnic Area #4, the very first one you come to.

- 9. Board determined by discussion that a budget committee was not necessary. The Board of Directors would serve as a committee of the whole for any decisions to be made as we move forward.
- 10. Liability insurance has been paid.
- 11. Eugene Mission Support: A suggestion was made to connect with the Mission for future assistance with veteran services.

New Business:

- 1. MOAA picnic is scheduled for 8 June, 1200 to 1600, approximately. Members need to respond to the RSVP to obtain an accurate head count to have enough food on hand. John Toensing will do the buying and cooking. He needs several people to help set up and to clean up afterwords.

2024 ROTC RECOGNITION DINNER



MS III Treben Webb



THOUGHTS FROM THE BOARD

Dear Fellow Members,

It is Spring, the weather is perfect. It is my month to discuss the role of the Treasurer for the Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA. I will try to be brief, for you and I should be outdoors in God's country.

I keep the books and pay the bills. This pleases the IRS, Oregon Secretary of State and our creditors, which is so important for our continued existence as a nonprofit (501(c)19) organization.


OK, probably not enough information. So, take a look at the Treasurer's report. The Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA is a social, informational, and philanthropic organization. Income and expenses are divided into the following categories:

Chapter Operations. This includes dues, door prizes, luncheons, and contributions. Our \$25 dues generate about \$1900 and closely match our basic expenses, these include use of the Vet's building, website maintenance, office supplies, government /nonprofit fees, liability insurance, post office box. No surprise that our largest expenses are the lunches and dinners. The Chapter tries to match the cost with the member's payment. The door prizes generate only about \$30-\$50 profit, but this pays for our guest speakers and prospective members. Again, in 2023, there was minimal loss, so thank you for honoring your reservations and participating in the raffle! Further contributions to the Chapter Operations help to cover the Jasper Park picnic, and other awards and recognitions. The Board would like to send a representative to the annual National MOAA meeting at least every other year, but the cost is large and depends on funds available.

The remaining funds represent the philanthropic arm of the Emerald Empire Chapter. The **ROTC Annual Drive** strives to cover two \$1000 scholarships for our UO and Southern Oregon cadets. The Emerald Empire Chapter has met and exceeded this goal annually for as long as I have served as Treasurer. After the scholarships are paid, the remaining funds are turned over to the **Benton Community Foundation Emerald Empire Endowed Scholarships,** which now can generate at least one scholarship annually. This year the Board is investigating whether we can establish another endowment fund, so you will see an "**ROTC Scholarship Fund**" separate from the Annual Drive.

<u>Veterans Service Fund</u> (formerly Special Projects) originated with planning the Vietnam Moving Wall event in 2016. Using this fund, the Chapter has donated to a number of Veterans' charitable organizations over the years. The Board is considering establishing annual donations to local organizations, aiming to select organizations where our assistance would provide a greater impact. No decision has been finalized. **Your input is important!** Is there a local organization specific for veterans that you would like this Chapter to support? To this end, and attempting to expand our role locally, the Board is submitting a request to change the nonprofit status to a 501(c)3 organization, which would allow a broader application.



IT STARTED IN INFAMY

The "date which will live in infamy" changed many peoples' lives in the United States. A whole generation... actually two or three generations... had their lives changed by the attack on Pearl Harbor. One high school student who had dreamed of flying one day, the war looked like the opportunity of a lifetime. Two weeks after graduation, that student volunteered for the Army and got himself into pilot training. Nine months later he became one of the youngest fighter pilots to fly a P-38 Lightning to support the war efforts out of England, eventually participating in the D-Day operations.

That started the career which took Dick Heyman into two more wars before he decided to retire as a full-bird colonel, eventually landing in Creswell, Oregon, where he joined MOAA and served as the chapter president in 1977.

As you can see in the photo above right, Dick and his wife of more than 60 years, Barbara, were introduced to the crowd before the game and had their pictures displayed on the Jumbotron while the crowd sang the national anthem

and the flag was unfurled on the field. A flight of F-15s did a flyover as the crowd cheered to cap off the event. We really have to hand it to LTC Joe Snyder who put this whole thing together, even arranging a VIP parking space to Dick and escorting him through the Moshofsky Center to view all the static displays. And, yes, it does rain in Autzen Stadium... but it never dampened the spirits.

As if anything could top that, the chapter bought Dick a cake and presented it at the annual ROTC Recognition Dinner on May 8th. The cake was decorated with a photo of a P-38 Lightning in full Army Air Corps regalia with the name "Lindy" painted on the nose. Thanks to Barbara who had found out that Dick had named his airplane after his mother, who was known as Lindy.
