The Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA is a Eugene-based 501(c)(19) veterans organization that meets regularly at the Veterans' Memorial Building at 1626 Willamette Street. We have 141 regular and associate members made up of active, retired and former members of the nation's seven uniformed services and their surviving spouses. We, and the national organization, are a non-partisan advocate on military personnel matters, especially proposed legislation affecting the career force, the retired community and veterans of the uniformed services. As a local chapter, we focus more on the local military community, e.g., gathering clothing and personal care items for the patients in the VA Hospital in Roseburg. #### **OLD BUSINESS:**

ROTC Dinner/Scholarships:

MS-IV medallions are on hand.

- Dinner: Centerpieces are on hand. Pat Harris volunteered to buy placemats and napkins to dress up the tables. The programs are ready except for the bios of the award winners. Pat Harris will follow up with LTC Warren.
- Cadet meal donations are now handled as just part of our operations funds. The board discussed and recommended we track cadet meals separately so that, as we solicit donations, members can see where their money is going. It would also allow us to set a goal.
- Scholarship awardees update: Funding is all set. Awardees will receive a presentation check and a certificate. The medals for them are on back order with MOAA.
- Raffle prizes: Darren McMahon will provide some ROTC incentive-type items to raffle off along with some items from the National Guard. Dick Norton suggested the newsletter solicit members to bring in something they feel would be appropriate for a raffle prize.
- LOE award has been submitted. Though we have not reached our 95% of chapter members being in good standing with their national MOAA memberships, we feel strongly that our submission will get us a four- or five-star award.

Storage locker update and discussion: The board discussed the possibility of emptying and downsizing the current storage locker. Though a proposal was made to hold one more sale,

the board unanimously passed the following motion made by Eric Watkins and seconded by Dick Norton No more yard/garage sales. Donate current material to a charity that will remove it. Re-negotiate our storage space for a closet-sized space to store file cabinet and small miscellaneous items, e.g., posters and banners.

Membership update: We currently have 86 regular members, with 76 current on their dues. Five members have been contacted and are sending in their dues and four will be removed from the roster for non-payment. One member will be kept in a grace period as he is currently in memory care. Membership chair plans to address associate members who have not been heard from in a



long time and members who are on the chapter roster but are not in good standing with national MOAA.

Request for visit of MOAA National staff: President Kennedy will respond to MOAA's query about a visit to us sometime this summer.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

- Contribution to Housing Our Veterans: The board discussed a possible donation to Housing Our Veterans. A member approached the board and said he would make up the difference from whatever we decide to make the total donation \$1,000. The Dick Norton made a motion to donate \$500 to Housing Our Veterans. It was seconded by Tom Kulick. The motion was unanimously approved. The President will contact the member to finalize the donation.
- Proposal from Dick Kimbell to provide each new member with a MOAA/Service lapel pin upon dues payment, retroactive for 2021 new members. Cost is \$3.10 for each pin. It was suggested that we stock these pins and sell them at our regular meetings. A motion to stock the

do not know about you, but we seem to get a half dozen or more requests for financial support every day. It is a little overwhelming. Especially so, since most are very worthy charities: Doctors Without Borders, Paralyzed Vets, Wounded Warrior Project, Boys Town, VFW, Eugene Mission just to name a few.

The easiest charities to support are ones that we know about by seeing them in action and being able to talk with those who work in them. For the many other charities that we cannot see close up, my wife and I do research to be as sure as possible that our contributions will be used well. We use charitynavigator.org and givewell.org to evaluate various charities we are considering.

This brings me to two local organizations that we were privileged to hear about at two of our recent MOAA luncheons: CAHOOTS and Housing our Veterans. CAHOOTS

provides mobile crisis intervention and basic-level emergency medical care among other services. We were privileged to hear about their mission

from Berkley Carnine and to present CAHOOTS on April 13 with a check for \$1000 from the Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA. Many of our veterans with PTSD or who are homeless have been helped over the 33 years it has been in existence. It is a model that other cities are emulating.

At our luncheon meeting on April 13, we were able to hear of another local organization: Housing our Veterans. Lorie Perkins "is a one-woman force for ending veteran homelessness in western Oregon, a task she has pursued for more than a decade" (from a fact sheet she handed out). Currently, her organization has 10 homes that can provide 80 to 85 beds in the Eugene area. Studies have shown that being housed can allow people to begin reentering society. We are hoping to be able to raise funds to support this very worthwhile project.

These are two very helpful organizations that we have heard tell us about their projects and their local outreach to veterans. These are two programs that deserve our support.
