Take OR-126 to the Bob Straub Parkway, then turn South for 3.7 miles.

Turn right on Parkway Rd, cross the river , then drive 0.6 miles.

Turn left onto Jasper Park Drive.


From I-5 (either north or southbound): -


Take Exit 188 to OR-58 toward Oakridge.

After 5.4 miles turn left onto Parkway Rd.

Drive 2.2 miles, then turn right on Jasper Park Drive.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

I have been pondering lately the relationship between local organizations and the national iteration of those local groups. Many of the organizations that we find in Eugene have national or even international connections. Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts have local, national, and international structures. Some churches also have local, regional, national, and world-wide gatherings. And many fraternal organizations, such as Masons, Eastern Star, Elks, Lions, and many others, also have structures beyond the local manifestations. We often do not see or even think about the larger context of the groups that we belong to.

MOAA is a perfect example: there is the local chapter (Emerald Empire Chapter), the Councils (Oregon Council), and National MOAA.

As I was reflecting on this, I recalled that I was aware of National MOAA before I became affiliated with our local chapter. Our son and his wife lived in Alexandra, VA some years ago. In our visits I would wander around downtown and I noticed a large building with just the initials on the wall: MOAA. I had heard about The Retired Officer's Association (TROA) and I had attended several meetings in Eugene right after I retired from active duty in 1996. But I was not aware that a change of names had taken place and did not realize that they were basically the same. When I then came to meetings of MOAA in Eugene, I made that connection. I had seen the National MOAA HQ before I became aware of the local Emerald Empire Chapter, not the usual way of learning about structures beyond the local chapter.

At the end of September, we will be having a special meeting to hear from a representative of National MOAA, CAPT Frank J. Michael, USN (Ret). Captain Michael is a 30-year veteran aviator. He had command tours at the squadron and major command-at-sea levels. He commanded Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron Light 47 (HSL 47) and led efforts to assist following the 2004 Indonesian tsunami and Hurricane Katrina. He commanded the USS Boxer (LHD 4) and participated in the 2011 Captain Phillips rescue mission in the Indian Ocean.

Captain Michael joined National MOAA in 2021. His primary responsibility is support of MOAA's robust nationwide network of active and engaged affiliates to influence legislation, serve local communities in impactful ways, grow membership at the local and national levels, and increase MOAA's brand awareness nationwide.

Our special meeting on September 28, at the Vet's Center, at noon, will be our chance to hear what National MOAA is doing on our behalf and remind ourselves that we are connected to an active national presence in addition to our local activities. I hope to see you there!

WE ARE A 5-STAR CHAPTER ONCE AGAIN

The Levels of Excellence (LOE) Award is one of MOAA's most prestigious awards. Chapters self-nominate by documenting their programs, initiatives, and successful experiences throughout the 2021 calendar year. National MOAA says, "Only the very, very best councils or chapters receive a five-star award."

What follows are just some of the items that earned the Emerald Empire Chapter the 5-Star award.

Grassroots Advocacy: Chapter Legislative Chair provides an article for the monthly e-bulletin. Members are reminded to utilize the MOAA magazine letters to their congressmen and senators. State Senator James Manning, a retired CSM, U.S. Army, is an honorary member of the Chapter. He relies on the Chapter as a resource for veteran related legislature.



Community Engagement: The Chapter has ongoing support programs with: University of Oregon, Army ROTC; St Vincent de Paul veterans relief, and Habitat for Humanity home repair.

- * The Chapter Foundation and member donations annually award three \$1000 scholarships to MSIII cadets. Furthermore we host an awards dinner for the graduating MS IV cadets, spouses and cadre. All commissioned 2nd Lt's receive a set of gold bars upon commissioning. ROTC staff instructors are members of Chapter and board members.
- * The Chapter donates cash to the St Vincent de Paul veterans relief fund. This cash donation allows the organization some flexibility in assisting local vets in need of a short term financial solutions.

*The Chapter has partnered with the local affiliate of Habitat for Humanity and their home repair service; providing advocacy for vets.

Recruiting and Retention: For the 2021 calendar year, the Chapter gained four new members, 12 basic members (ROTC 2nd Lt's), and eight members passed or relocated. In light of the prolonged covid pandemic and lack of in-person meetings, the Chapter has made efforts to keep the monthly news e-bulletin and website relevant and cogent with local and statewide information. These two modes of communication have been awarded MOAA's four and five star levels of excellence.

Within State and County health regulations, the Chapter met in person on only four occasions. At these meetings new members were introduced and given an opportunity to brief their personal and military history. The Chapter has a "calling committee" to contact members for an RSVP for upcoming in-person meetings.

Leadership Succession Plan: One of our Chapter goals is to establish a viable progression of Chapter members to leadership roles in the organization. We identify chapter members who demonstrate a desire to join in the growth of the Chapter. We encourage all members to consider membership on the Board of Directors or Committee Chairs and successfully fill a nominating slate of officers every year plus the 13 committee chairmanships.

In compliance with State and County health regulations, we found it necessary to suspend most monthly in-person general sessions during the pandemic. To assure that we did not lose continuity with our membership, the Board established supplemental newsletters sent by email to all Chapter members. Through that newsletter we reached out to our most vulnerable members to assure them of our support and to provide phone numbers if the needed to request assistance. Upon resuming in person meetings, our attendance quickly returned to pre-pandemic norms.

DoD Releases Details on Atomic Veterans Commemorative Service Medal, By: Kevin Lilley

A half-million veterans may be eligible to receive an award honoring their service related to atomic weapon use, testing, and cleanup in the decades after World War II.

The Atomic Veterans Commemorative Service Medal will be available to hand out by year's end, according to a July 5 DoD press release. The creation of the medal was part of the FY 2022 National Defense Authorization Act; the law allowed DoD to establish eligibility criteria with recommendations from House and Senate Armed Services Committee members. Veterans eligible for the award must have performed one of the following actions as part of official military duties from July 1, 1945, to Oct. 1, 1992, according to the news release:

- 1. Directly participated in the detonation of an atomic weapon or device.
- 2. Directly participated in the cleanup of radioactive material resulting from any such atmospheric detonation.
- 3. Directly participated in the cleanup of radioactive material resulting from an accident associated with an atomic weapon; or
- 4. Were exposed to ionizing radiation resulting from the operational use of atomic weapons during World War II.

The next-of-kin of deceased veterans who meet the above criteria may apply for the medal, as well. An online application process will be created "in the near future," per the DoD press release. It's unclear how many veterans participated in such operations. Most reports suggest about 225,000 servicemembers took part in atomic testing and development, but when those who worked in cleanup efforts or suffered other exposure are added, the total figure could eclipse 500,000. The medal's design, also released July 5, includes an eagle and a symbol of an atom on the obverse, and language on the reverse noting the honor was "awarded for unique service in support of nuclear deterrence."



Both our charities are GuideStar Platinum-rated and have adapted the programs we provide to those we serve, and I am proud of the progress we have made. Here are a few illustrations of what we have accomplished with the support of generous donors:

- TMF has created a fifth pillar of support to serve uniformed servicemembers and their families when disaster strikes.
- In 2021, almost 900 students received financial assistance for their college education through the MOAA Scholarship Fund.
- The amount of money distributed through Community Outreach Grants has increased over 10% since 2019.
- In 2021, 36% of the financial assistance distributed by the Scholarship Fund was in the form of grants up from 12% in 2019.

Our development team is constantly speaking with MOAA members, chapters, and beneficiaries across the country to ensure our programs meet the current needs of uniformed servicemembers and their families.

Robert, a Life Member of MOAA, told me recently that he donates to our charities because "MOAA is an officer organization, and we have a leadership responsibility to take care of our own. Donating to the charities gives us a chance to do that."

With so much gratitude, I give thanks again to our members for supporting our association and truly making a difference in the lives of so many veterans, servicemembers and their families.
