Turn left onto Jasper Park Drive.


From I-5 (either north or southbound):


Take Exit 188 to OR-58 toward Oakridge.


OLD BUSINESS:

- 7. MOAA Database, Committee Module access update: 52 changes need to be made to the national MOAA database. Ken and Pat will be working on it and should show significant progress by the next board meeting.
- 8. MOAA table at UO Spring Football game: John and Ken spent three hours in the cold wind with very little to show for it. The light traffic only brought three eligible people to the table, but all were from out of town. Ken thinks that with a better location, and the end of entrance construction next year, that we should have better luck. Using an "easy-up" canopy would assure a dry spot in case it rains.

THOUGHTS FROM THE BOARD

What is the Chapter Operations Fund? Is it just Dues?

The Chapter Operations (CO) Fund is one of four designated funds within the Emerald Empire Chapter of MOAA and is the one that serves as the administrative backbone to support our mission to provide scholarships for ROTC cadets and assist local veterans service organizations. The fund is composed of the annual member dues, currently set at \$25, and member donations specifically targeted to Chapter Operations. Additionally, any donations to the Emerald Chapter that are not specified, are allocated to Chapter Operations, allowing us the flexibility to direct those resources where they are most needed. By maintaining a robust CO Fund, we ensure that our administrative costs are covered, enabling us to focus on our core mission of supporting future leaders and those who have served our country.

Within the CO Fund, dues are meant to cover the basic administrative costs, (facility use, of-fice supplies, mail box fees, chapter and state registration fees, insurance, website maintenance). Also included is the Jasper Park Annual Picnic, which has been an annual event for many years, and is entirely paid for by the Chapter. The monthly luncheons are meant to be self-paying. We use the modest income from the door prizes to pay for our speaker gifts.

Unfortunately, with decreasing membership and an inflationary economy, the dues no longer cover these expenses. In 2024, we were \$500 short and this year, we anticipate being \$700-\$900 short. The options are increasing our membership and/or increase the dues. This will be an ongoing discussion at our board meetings. Please feel free to give us your thoughts.

Our State Legislature in Action

When asked about the progress of Senate Bill 225, Oregon State Senator James Manning, a honorary chapter member, said, "So far so good." The bill, which states, "There shall be subtracted from federal taxable income for a taxpayer who has attained 63 years of age before the close of the taxable year and whose federal taxable income includes federal retirement pay or pension for service in the Armed Forces of the United States up to \$17,500 in federal retirement pay or pension received for service in the Armed Forces of the United States."

The bill is currently in the Senate Committee On Finance and Revenue, and is scheduled for a work session on Wednesday, 28 May at 8:00am. Senator Manning promises to update us soon.


# New Members Welcome

# **D-DAY ANNIVERSARY**

Some lesser known facts about D-Day:

- In October 1941, Winston Churchill told Captain Lord Louis Mountbatten to start thinking about an invasion of Europe: "Unless we can go on land and fight Hitler and beat his forces on land, we shall never win this war."
- On 7 December 1943, US President Franklin D. Roosevelt met with US General Dwight D. Eisenhower in Tunis and told him he would be commanding the invasion of Nazioccupied Europe.
- Eisenhower smoked up to four packets of Camel cigarettes a day in the months running up to D-Day. In contrast, Field Marshall Bernard Montgomery was completely sober; he did not smoke or drink.
- The basic pay for a British infantryman was 3 pounds and 15 shillings a month. Unskilled laborers could earn 6 pounds per month. On the other hand, US soldiers earned in the region of £12 per month. As a result, they were very popular with young British women, and 70,000 British women married American servicemen during the war. Approximately 9,000 children were born out of wedlock to American GI fathers.
- On the eve of D-Day, the Allies had 15,766 aircraft available, and by June 1944, Luftwaffe aircraft were outnumbered by more than 30-to-1 in the western theatre of the war.
- The Allies didn't lose a single plane to the Luftwaffe, although anti-aircraft fire did shoot down 113 planes.
- Around 7,000 vessels of all shapes and sizes were used by the Allies on D-Day, including 139 major warships, 221 smaller combat vessels, more than 1,000 minesweepers and auxiliary vessels, 805 merchant ships, 59 blockships and 300 miscellaneous small craft. Over 4,000 landing craft were used to transport the invasion force onto the beaches of Normandy.
- Shortly after midnight on 6 June, around 24,000 US, British and Canadian airborne troops began landing in France. Just one-in-six landed in the correct place.
- In order to continue supplying fuel to the invasion armies, the so-called "PipeLine Under The Ocean" (PLUTO) was laid. This delivered Allied fuel directly from England to France. US tanks were consuming an average 8,000 gallons of fuel per week at that time.
- Although the Allied forces who took part in the D-Day operation were primarily from Britain, the US and Canada, they also had Australian, Belgian, Czech, Dutch, French, Greek, New Zealand, Norwegian, Rhodesian and Polish naval, air and ground support.
