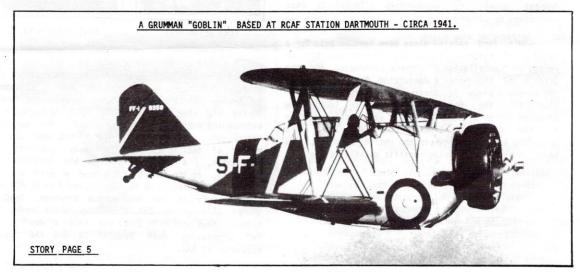
1994 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

For members unable to attend the 1994 AGM, the main details of my AGM report are set out below. As you will see, this is a GOOD NEWS message.

On 4 Aug 94, the SAM Foundation Board received a detailed briefing from Col John Cody, 12 Wing Cdr, and LCol Brian Akitt, the outgoing museum Director, on how the changes arising from the Ottawa Feb '94 defence statement might affect Shearwater and the museum. I'm delighted to report that PROJECT 75 remains a "GO".

A few changes will affect us, but they are not show stoppers. Lost, effective Aug '95, will be the SAM's Curator position. The question of how to fill this important post is being addressed jointly by 12 Wing and our Foundation Board. A draft proposal is already in preparation by the new SAM Director. We WILL survive this loss, but volunteerism must become an increasing feature in the day to day running of SAM.

Members will be pleased to know that a non-governmental organization, the Shearwater Development Corporation Ltd., has been hard at work deciding how Shearwater's surplus potential, following downsizing, can be integrated into the local economy. The corporation's Executive Director, Mr Myman Benjamin, attended our Board meeting on 4 Aug. He told us his corporation has already identified specific areas of strong commercial potential for the base and considers the museum a key player on the tourism side. Funding for the corporation comes largely from federal grants to communities affected by base reductions or closures.

SAM's fund raising plans have been on hold for a variety of reasons, e.g., the persistance of the recession, cancellation of defence contracts, and the details of Shearwater's downsizing. However, now that the museum's place in Shearwater's future has been clarified, the Board has decided to launch the campaign for both PHASE TWO (the structural addition to the converted CANEX) and PHASE THREE (the upgrading and integration of the entire complex). Adm Harry Porter will provide specific details at the AGM.





I am pleased to report that the Foundation's first golf tournament was a most successful event. SAMF's public exposure was enhanced and a profit of around \$4,000 went to our building project. SAMF is most grateful to Ken Whitehead, Ab Brownell, Doug Fairly, David Russell and Eric Edgar who put all the details together. Thanks too to others who

"worked" the tournament as volunteers, especially Denny Shaw, the masterful MC at our wrap-up dinner and celebration. Numerous sponsors served us well with many fine prizes being awarded to winners and non-winners alike. High praise and thanks go from SAMF to the Hartlen Point Golf Club for generously providing an outstanding facility. I, of course, was given full credit for arranging the absolutely appalling weather. Most importantly, SAMF extends thanks to all the participants and celebrities who enjoyed a truly pleasant tournament. Plans are underway for #2 in 1995.

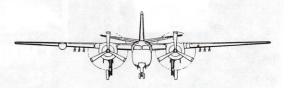


Many thanks to the readers who've written in about items of possible interest to the Search Committee. The overall response to our search activity has so far been promising but we've still got to spread the

"Flash-Back"

THE GRUMMAN GOBLIN

Of all the aircraft ever based at Shearwater, perhaps the least auspicious was the Grumman (G-23) GOBLIN.

The following flashback to the GOBLIN is summarized from a magazine article provided by Sandra Penney of the Shearwater Aviation Museum.

The Grumman GOBLIN was first offered to the RCAF in 1936. It was immediately rejected as obsolete.

However, in 1938, Canadian Car and Foundry (CCF) found itself with 16 GOBLINs stranded on a Montreal dock when a connection was made between the GOBLINs it was then assembling in Canada, and illegal exports to the Spanish Civil War.

CCF turned to Ottawa to help find a buyer. In turn, Ottawa apparently directed an unhappy RCAF to at least test fly the unwanted GOBLIN, even though it was now even more obsolete than when rejected 2 years earlier.

The Air Force reluctantly had 11 of its most experienced pilots conduct an evaluation. Despite confirmation that the aircraft remained unsuitable, 15 of CCF's 16 GOBLINs came into the RCAF inventory in the fall of 1940.

In November 1940, 118 Sqn was re-activated to operate the aircraft as an air defence fighter against German long range flying boats thought capable of attacking the key wartime port of Halifax.

After working up in Rockcliffe, where enormous technical difficulties were encountered, all 15 aircraft arrived in Shearwater (Dartmouth Air Station) on 16/17 July 1941.

Within a week of arriving, one pilot was killed in a crash near Lawrencetown Lake. Shortly thereafter, two other GOBLINs suffered minor accidents and were reduced to spares.

After only two months in Shearwater, 118 Sqn learned it was to be re-equipped with KITTYHAWKs. On 12 December 1941, only 5 months after their arrival, the last GOBLIN was taken off strength.

Seven went directly into storage at Scoudouc, NB. The remaining 5 had earlier been sent back to Rockcliffe to provide air cooperation training for the Canadian Army. However, they proved unsuitable even in this role and soon followed the others into storage.

Finally, to provide radial engines for technical training, the 12 stored aircraft were broken up in early 1942, thus bringing the GOBLIN saga to an inglorious end.

Perhaps the world's only surviving GOBLIN (not one of the RCAF's) is on display at the US Naval Aviation Museum at Pensacola, Florida.

Ironically, a GOBLIN - or any part of one-would today be much welcomed in Shearwater, over 50 years after the last one was cheerfully waved goodbye.

We would very much like to hear from anyone having flown or maintained the Canadian GOBLINs, wherever the location, or having photos or yarns to tell about it.

NOTE: The Goblin on our cover page is in USN livery.

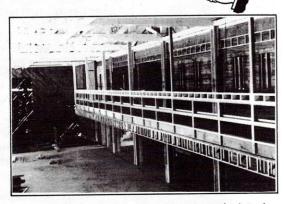
