Firstly, we must say "welcome" to our new parent/carers and reassure you how well the children have settled. It's been wonderful to see new little faces in the baby barn and getting to know them. All the children who left the baby barn are coping well with new routines and it's lovely to see the older children looking after them when they're moving around the site.

The children have been so busy since they've been back. We had heavy frosts some mornings and turned this into a valuable learning opportunity. The children were able to mark-make in the frost, which encourages prewriting skills. Christmas trees were donated to us, the children used scissors to cut the smaller twigs and loppers to cut the bigger branches. The branches were used for den building and camouflaging our hedgehog house. These activities use and develop children's fine and gross motor skills, creativity and working cooperatively. Using tools in this way also helps children to understand risk management and the importance of following simple instructions.

With the cold weather, the children learnt about the different ways we can look after our wildlife during the winter months. They made several designs of bird feeders and dotted them around the site. There was a lot of excitement when the birds started to feed from them. We spotted long-tailed tits, blue-tits and a couple of robins. We also have a cheeky squirrel who loves to eat the food from the feeder by the fire circle.

Chinese New Year was celebrated by the children. They learnt how to use chopsticks, ate Chinese food and even tried green tea and Jasmine tea, which went down a storm. We shared books about Chinese New Year, stories, songs and even tried some writing.

By using different types of mirrors, we have been thinking about our emotions. By labelling our feelings, children can understand that it is OK to have emotions. It's what we do with those feelings that matter, for example, it's normal to feel angry at times, but this does not allow us to hit or lash out at others. We used clay to make faces depicting different emotions and read stories to go along with the theme.
