## BEHIND-THE-WHEEL DRIVER EDUCATION PERMISSION LETTER

## Dear Parents/Guardians:

Your son/daughter is requesting enrollment in the behind-the-wheel (in-car) driver education course with Veterans Driving Academy LLC. This seven-day course consists of approximately two hours a day of range and on-road instruction, and a final road skills examination. State-certified driving schools like this one teach the course with instructors that are certified and licensed by the Department of Motor Vehicles. The driver education vehicles have dual brakes, restraint systems, extra rearview mirrors, cameras, and other safety devices.

To be eligible for in-car instruction, the student must have a Virginia learner's permit, completed an approved classroom driver education course (or currently enrolled with a minimum of 10 hours of instruction), and completed a minimum of two hours of driving with a parent. Parental involvement with 10 hours of driving instruction is recommended by following sessions 1-7 in the 45-hour Parent/Teen Guide before beginning in-car instruction.

Upon successful completion of classroom driver education, in-car instruction, 45-hours of supervised driving with fifteen of those hours after sunset (conducted before, during, and after program), and the road test, students may be issued a 180-day temporary driver's license. The 180-day temporary driver's license will become valid on the day the student turns 16 years three months, and only if the student has held a learner's permit for at least nine months. This 180-day temporary license, accompanied by a valid Virginia learner's permit, allows the student to operate a motor vehicle with no adult supervision.

A parent's insurance policy usually covers students driving with a learner's permit; however, we recommend parents obtain confirmation with their insurance company. Students will need additional coverage once they receive their 180-day temporary license. Virginia law requires that a student be adequately insured when the 180-day provisional license is issued.

It should be emphasized that successful completion of in-car instruction does not always qualify your student as a safe, accomplished driver. As the parent, you must make the final decision to determine if your student is ready to handle the responsibility of operating a motor vehicle unchaperoned; and therefore, the student's 180-day temporary license is provided to the parent at the completion of in-car instruction.
