issions of the Month 2021

The GUMC missions plan for Missions of the Month and Holiday giving has been approved. These are the missions that were selected for this year.

** The Sunday before the third Wednesday of Every Month all loose coin offerings will be used toward support of the Ridgewood United Community Pantry, Joliet, Illinois. The food pantry operates every Wednesday in support of the Ridgewood area on the east side of Joliet. The funds will be used to supplement the pantry's budget for purchase of food from the Northern Illinois Food Bank for distribution through the pantry. Dates in 2020 are: Jan 17, Feb 14, Mar 14, Apr 18, May 16, Jun 13, Jul 8, Aug 15, Sep 12, Oct 17, Nov 14, and Dec 12.

January – Red (pg. 6) Solar Oven Partners UMC (#418812)

The solar oven training and distribution program works in the Dominican Republic to provide the knowledge and tools to alleviate hunger through clean, affordable solar cooking. Primary activities are 1) education in the concept of solar box cooking to conserve family income and reduce clear-cutting of trees for fuel, and 2) training in the use of solar cooking. SOP has previously distributed over 10,000 solar ovens in Haiti.

February – (Local Benevolences) Daybreak Shelter, Joliet

Daybreak Shelter operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and provides emergency housing and supportive services to individuals and families who are homeless. Some participants in the program are in need of short-term housing, as a result of a situational crisis. Others need support services as the work to reestablish permanent housing. Homelessness prevention services are also provided to individuals and families who are at risk of losing their homes.

March – Yellow (p. 7) Tree of Life Ministry, Pierre, South Dakota (#123615)

This ministry with Lakota Native Americans addresses needs on the Rosebud and Pine Ridge reservations in South Dakota by "nurturing the body, strengthening culture, and enhancing the spirit". This ministry provides groceries and meals to the hungry, repairs to substandard homes, and supports local teachers as they reclaim native culture and language.

April – (Local Benevolences) ASP

Funds collected will be used to help fund the ASP mission trip in June.

May - Cunningham Children's Home, Urbana, IL

Cunningham Children's Home strives to give hope to those who need it most—youth who suffer from serious emotional and behavioral challenges that have been caused by abuse, neglect, mental illness, and more. Cunningham provides expert care to help kids learn positive coping and behavioral skills, to achieve realistic academic goals, and to develop the life skills necessary to be successful in the community. It provides caring support and therapeutic intervention to close to 300 children, youth, young adults, and their families each year.

June – Green (pg. 11) Wesley Woods Conference Center (#50000046)

Wesley Woods provides facilities and staff for NIC Summer Residential Camps, Summer Day Camp, Adult and Youth Retreats, and numerous community service and missional projects. These funds are used to maintain and improve facilities, furnishings and equipment as well as to support specific ministry opportunities that sometimes arise.

July – (Local Benevolences) Lakota Indian Mission Trip

Funds collected will be used to help fund travel expenses for the Lakota Indian Mission trip in August.

August – <u>Blue</u> (pg. 12) Ridgewood United Community Ministries (#60000203)

This ministry initiated by Trinity United Methodist Church operates a food pantry serving two zip codes on the east side of Joliet. The pantry is open weekly, and clients can receive food once per month. Funds will be used to purchase food from the Northern Illinois Food Bank, and to help defray the operating cost of freezers.

September – (Local Benevolences) Right Here, Right Now

Funds collected will be used by the pastor to help meet immediate financial needs of members of this congregation.

October - Purple (pg. 16) Larry Kies (#09572Z)

Larry is a Technical Advisor working with the farm manager in developing the agricultural program at the Africa University in Zimbabwe. He is also involved in the agricultural practicals, as well as teaching classes in crop production and farm management.

November – (Local Benevolences) Will Grundy Medical Clinic

Funds collected will be sent to the Will Grundy Medical Clinic to support their mission of providing medical care for those in the community who cannot afford it.

December – Orange (pg. 7) Heifer Project International (#982532-1)

HPI is a worldwide self-help organization that provides livestock, such as heifers, goats, sheep, pigs, rabbits, bees, chickens, water buffalo and other animals, as well we agricultural services to more than 84 countries. Each recipient of an animal agrees to give the first female offspring to someone else in need, thus expanding the project.

Easter Envelopes -Blue (pg. 15) Rockford Work Camps (#60000234)

75% of the money collected will go to general budget with the remainder to this fund. Rockford Work Camps is the best volunteer and mission site in the Northern Illinois Conference. Mission groups from around the country stay in Rockford at local UM churches and do good work for nonprofits and families in need. Funds will be used to purchase materials for repairs in depressed neighborhoods.

Holiday Envelopes 2021 (Thanksgiving & Christmas) will go 75% to general budget with the remainder to two local ministries. The funds received by Missions will be split equally between **ASP** and the **Lakota Indian Mission Trip.**

White The white band, the Sister Church Relationship Band, has been removed from the Rainbow Covenant in 2017. This band was intended to promote United Methodist church-to-church and congregation-to-congregation connections through cooperative missions and ministries by establishing and/or maintaining a sister church relationship with another United Methodist Church anywhere in the world. We will continue our sister church relationship with: <u>Trinity UMC, Joliet, IL</u>

NOTES:

- 1) Identifiable (pledge) income was about as expected for 2020. The surplus was primarily due to receipt of a PPP loan which has been forgiven.
- 2) Budget expenses were nearly \$38k below plan, even when apportionments were paid in full.
- 3) For 2021, we do not expect a financial surplus. We do not expect additional PPP help, and do expect expenses to return to normal levels as the building is re-opened.
