Introducing RAMBLER™ mountain fleabane

A water-wise delight for low and high elevation gardens





New for 2025, RAMBLER[TM] mountain fleabane (*Erigeron formosissimus* 'P022S') produces lavender, daisy-like flowers in early summer. It's a great addition to water-thrifty landscapes, needing only an occasional, deep watering in long, dry periods or extremely hot temps. Plant it in full sun or part shade in nearly any well-draining soil.

This charming, low-growing fleabane is a native selection from Mike Kintgen, curator of alpine collections at Denver Botanic Gardens. He selected it for its short stature and its high elevation hardiness—up to 13,000 feet!

Erigeron formosissimus is a <u>native to much of the Intermountain West</u>. It's beloved by butterflies, bees and other invertebrates, making it ideal for pollinator gardens.



Many people shut down their landscapes for the winter, as if to say, "This yard is closed. Come back in the spring."

But who says winter landscapes can't be lovely and inviting? Wouldn't it be nice to boost your



curb appeal year-round?

Add rich, green color to your winter landscapes with hardy manzanitas

Hardy manzanitas (Arctostaphylos x coloradensis) are selections of lowgrowing, low-water shrubs from the Uncompaghre Plateau in western Colorado.

They add vibrant color and texture to landscapes in every season, including the depths of winter.



These evergreen

shrubs also offer shelter for smaller songbirds and wildlife, and they give beneficial insects a place to overwinter in leaf debris beneath the plants.

Good for elevations up to 8,125 feet (and potentially higher). Very little supplemental water needed once established.

Key differences among Plant Select's manzanitas



Mock bearberry manzanita

Arctostaphylos x coloradensis

Mock bearberry has the smallest leaves and is the lowest growing of Plant Select's manzanitas. Think of it like an oversized kinnickinick. It has a beautiful presence in naturalistic landscapes, standing out among other plants.



Panchito manzanita

Arctostaphylos x coloradensis
('Panchito')

Panchito is the tallest, growing 18" to 30" tall. It's also the most floriferous, producing pink flowers that attract hummingbirds in the spring. New leaves are pointed with slightly folded midribs. It thrives in a variety of environments, including medians.



<u>Chieftain manzanita</u> Arctostaphylos x coloradensis ('Chieftain')

Chieftain has a more open growth habit, highlighting its interesting bark and branches. Its oblong leaves are rounder, wider and flatter than Panchito's. Once established, it's a vigorous grower, quickly expanding in width. During winter, its leaves can take on an attractive amber tint.

Success tips for growing hardy manzanitas

- Plant them in well-drained soils. (They also tend to like slopes.)
- Leave room for horizontal growth.
- Consider planting short-lived perennials around them during establishment. (They can be slow to establish.)
- Trim them back, as needed, with hand pruners or shears.
- Don't trample them. Manzanita branches can break with rough care, unlike junipers which have more malleable branches.


