
Get to know Rocky Mountain goldenrod

A "keystone plant" and one of our 2025 selections!

Many goldenrods flower late in the season and grow large, but not Rocky Mountain goldenrod (Solidago multiradiata). This dwarf, well-behaved goldenrod adds vibrant color to drought-tolerant landscapes in the late spring.

Rocky Mountain goldenrod is <u>native</u> to <u>much of the West</u>. Dr. Doug Tallamy and the National Wildlife Federation recognize it as a **keystone plant** for <u>multiple</u> <u>ecoregions</u>, including what they call the North American Deserts and the Northwestern Forested Mountains.

Keystone plants feed and host "significant numbers of butterflies, moths, and pollen specialist bees." These plants play an essential role



in ecosystem health.

Add Rocky Mountain goldenrod to pollinator strips, borders, rock gardens and high elevation yards. Our thanks to Richard Anderson and our collaborators in Utah for bringing this gem to Plant Select!

In the garden with Grace How to move Plant Select perennials

Need to move perennials in your garden? Looking for ways to improve your success rate with transplanting?

3 elements for successful transplanting



Temperature

Move perennials on mild or cloudy days to reduce plant stress. Avoid moving perennials in the heat of summer.



Water

When you move a perennial, don't "set it and forget it." It's important to keep transplants well watered. Irrigate them like you would a new plant.



Roots

Perennials have different types of root systems, from thick, fibrous roots (see above) to tap roots. Tap-rooted perennials often don't transplant well.

Looking for tough plants for mountain landscapes?


Mike Kintgen, curator of alpine collections at

These plants have been tested at 8,150 feet near the Colorado/Wyoming border. Many can thrive in even higher elevations, particularly in the right microclimates.
