UNDAUNTED® Ruby muhly grass is one of North America's most beautiful native grasses, developing clouds of airy, pink seedheads in the fall.

later than usual. Late April and early May would be good times to trim back this grass in 2023.

HOA tip: Low-water plants can be water opportunists Don't get fooled by some of their habits

Some low-water plants are "water opportunists"—meaning they'll take more water if you give it to them.

The trick is to adjust your watering habits, so you aren't giving these plants more irrigation than necessary after



they're established in your landscapes. Don't let them fool you into thinking they need more water! Here are a few examples...
