Western salvias: Ideal for the summer heat

Bring out the beauty of your western landscape with regionally native salvias! These long-blooming, shrubby perennials thrive in the heat. Many start producing vibrant flowers in July, attracting hummingbirds, pollinators and admiring neighbors into fall.



<u>Ultra Violet salvia</u> Salvia 'Ultra Violet' PP21,411

This compact salvia has iridescent purple blooms. A magnet for bumble bees! An introduction from the garden of Horticulturist Lauren Springer.



Furman's Red sage Salvia greggii 'Furman's Red'

A long-blooming beauty. Attracts a variety of pollinators. Has darker flowers and better overall hardiness than the wild species (Wild Thing sage).

Mojave sage Salvia pachyphylla

There are cultivars on the market now, but we love our original selection: the wild species. Typically, no supplemental water is needed once established. Mauve-purple bracts linger into fall. Silvery, semi-evergreen foliage offers year-round beauty. Worth noting, Mojave sage can attract Japanese beetles, as well as butterflies, hummingbirds and bees.





WINDWALKER® royal red salvia Salvia darcyi x S. microphylla 'PWIN03S'

A hummingbird favorite! Comes back more reliably in colder climates than <u>VERMILLION BLUFFS®</u> (*Salvia darcyi* 'Pscarl') because it's blended with colder-hardy *Salvia microphylla*.



Autumn Sapphire[TM] sage
Salvia reptans 'P016S'

Airy and lovely. An up-and-coming plant that should be used more! Cobalt blue flowers bloom in the fall. A late season source of food for bees and butterflies.

Salvia success tips


Western salvias tend to be happiest in hot, full sun, south-facing locations that have porous soils and get winter heat. They can be very long lived in the right spots.

In areas where western salvias are marginally hardy, they're often best planted in the spring and summer, so they have more time to get established.

Lovely, low fuss fernbush A mid-summer bloomer that's a magnet for beneficial insects

Jump into the summer issue of *Bloom Gardens* as we chat about fernbush *(Chamaebatiaria millefolium)*—a regionally native shrub that shines in manicured landscapes and naturalistic designs. It thrives with little water and attracts a range of pollinators with its abundant flowers in July and August.
