

Working for Carers: Impact Report 2024-25

The demands of looking after a friend, family member or neighbour means carers often face more challenges when finding and maintaining employment. They have to prioritise their caring role, which can be unpredictable, time-consuming and exhausting. Carers often struggle to balance looking after someone, with work.

The Working for Carers project supports unpaid carers aged 16+ across Newcastle, North Tyneside and Northumberland, to maintain or find work, access education, training or volunteering opportunities.

With specialist employment, legal, and benefits advice, the project supports individuals to overcome work-related barriers and better balance their caring role with work or education, whilst maximising their income.



196 organisations engaged with to create carer-friendly workplaces, including implementing the Carer's Leave Act.

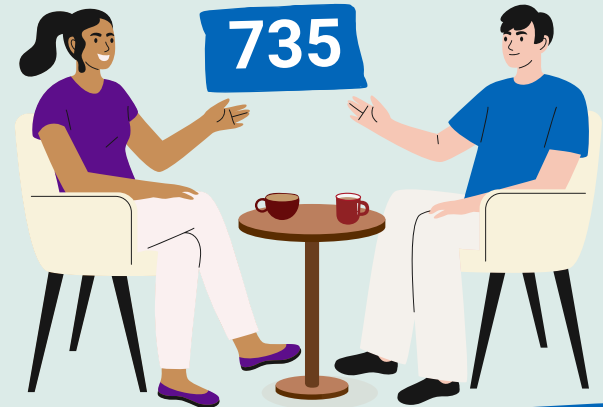

Jakub's story

Jakub provides daily care to his elderly, frail father, balancing this alongside childcare responsibilities. He lacked confidence, so finding a job that would fit around his caring role appeared impossible. 'Employability jargon' also proved a barrier to Jakub as English is his second language.

He was referred into the Working for Carers project, where the support was transformational - developing his CV and highlighting a multitude of relevant skills Jakub had developed in his caring role. Jakub and his advisor worked together on mock interviews, breaking down barriers to employment and enabling Jakub to secure a job as a cleaner in a local school.

Jakub accessed a grant from the Working for Carers Progression Fund to support him with the commute before his first wage was received. Jakub is now ecstatic to be enjoying his part-time role; his first employment in over eight years.
