

Curriculum News

Pupils in the middle school have taken part in St John's Ambulance First Aid training. The children learnt how to deal with bumps, burns, breaks and bleeding, carry out CPR and deal with someone who is choking. The children have said their favourite sessions were when they learnt how-to put-on bandages and treat burns. Another favourite was practising the Heimlich manoeuvre on a practice dummy. We received great feedback from Katie, the first aid trainer, "The group of kids I have are amazing! I'm so impressed with not only their knowledge but their willingness to get involved! They aren't self-conscious at all; they love a bit of role play. They're keen to have a go and ask questions, which for this age group is quite rare!"



We congratulate all nominees who were selected as finalists for the Medway Youth Awards. The pupils were: Tegan-Lilly Tester, Riley Baglan and Louie Cross. There was a dinner and ceremony at Gillingham Football Club to honour all nominees. Families and staff fro attendance.













Pupils in the lower school visited The Royal Engineers and took part in a wide variety of workshops linked to their history curriculum. The workshops included: Catapults at the ready- the children learnt about the different types of historical siege engines and their effectiveness at breaking down castle walls. They then designed their own catapults and tested their effectiveness by competing against each other, firing different coloured projectiles to breach the walls of a model castle.





Zulu Warriors- we learnt about the Zulu war of 1879, and explored Zulu armour and arms. The children tried on armour and carried a Zulu shield, they then went on to creating their own Zulu headdresses and shields.





Turrets Tracks and Tanks- the children discovered the different modes of transport the Army use to support their work. The children explored tanks and armoured trucks up close and built their mechanical vocabulary. We looked at pictures of the first types of tanks used in the First World War and found out how they got their name. To end the session, we focused on the tanks' protective covering and conducted a science experiment to create protective armour for an







Snob the dog: children unearthed the story of Snob the dog. We discovered how he was found beside the body of a Russian officer after the Battle of Alma and adopted by the 11th Company Royal Sappers and Miners and brought back to England. Learners found out how he was re-christened Snob after originally being called Alma when he preferred the Officer's Mess at Chatham to the Guardroom. The children met the real taxidermy of Snob in the Crimean War Gallery and found out how he was awarded a miniature Crimea Medal with a Battle of Alma bar; to reward him for his involvement in the Battle. We then made our own sock puppets of Snob complete with a
