





March is Women’s History Month, the month during which we specifically recognize and celebrate the many women around the world and throughout history who have contributed to making our lives better. The library has a good selection of books about some of these courageous women.

D-DAY GIRLS by Sarah Rose recounts the story of the 39 extraordinary women who, in the summer of 1942, were recruited by SOE, Britain’s elite spy agency. Trained in everything from demolition to sharpshooting, they secretly parachuted into France to train the resistance and sabotage the Nazi efforts, helping lay the groundwork for the D-Day invasion. The author writes “This book is not fiction. It was built from archives in Britain, France and the United States and from the memories, both written and oral, of those fortunate enough to survive.”

In the genre of historical fiction, based on fact, is THE WOMEN OF THE COPPER COUNTRY by Mary Doria Russell. The novel pays homage to “Big Annie” Clements who, in 1913, led a strike against the biggest copper mining company in Calumet, Michigan, becoming the public face of a growing labor movement lobbying for better pay, shorter hours and safer working conditions. Also depicting the spirit and courage of young women who dared to fight for better, safer working conditions is Kate Alcott’s book THE DARING LADIES OF LOWELL. These women, eager to escape New England farm life in the 1830’s, found a sense of freedom and independence in the Massachusetts cotton mills, but also atrocious, dangerous working conditions. Of interest, as well, is author Carol McCleary’s series based on the life of Nellie Bly (1864-1922), a pioneer in the field of investigative journalism. Bly actually feigned insanity to go undercover in New York’s Women’s Lunatic Asylum to investigate and report on the deplorable conditions in that institution.

Middle school readers can read about amazing heroines from Joan of Arc to Mother Teresa in GIRLS WHO ROCKED THE WORLD. Younger readers can enjoy the adventures of Nell Richardson and Alice Burke who toured the United States in 1916, spreading support for the right of women to vote. They can learn about Molly Williams, America’s first female firefighter, and Sarah Emma Edmonds who, disguised as a man, became a nurse for the Union in the Civil War and later a spy.

Women are awesome!
