

## **New Testament Survey: An In-Depth Bible Study**

### **Introduction: Understanding the New Testament**

The **New Testament** is a collection of 27 books, written by multiple authors between approximately **45 A.D. and 95 A.D.**, all of whom were inspired by the Holy Spirit. It is the story of God's redemptive work through **Jesus Christ**, revealing the culmination of His plan for salvation, and it calls believers to live out their faith in a world transformed by grace.

### **Historical Background**

The New Testament was written during a time when the **Roman Empire** dominated the known world, shaping the cultural, social, and political backdrop of the early Christian church. The Jewish people were under Roman rule, longing for the promised Messiah. Into this context, **Jesus Christ** entered history, fulfilling Old Testament prophecy and inaugurating the **Kingdom of God**.

### **Structure of the New Testament**

The New Testament is divided into several sections:

- **The Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John):** Accounts of Jesus' life, ministry, death, and resurrection.
- **The Book of Acts:** A historical record of the early church's formation and expansion.
- **Pauline Epistles (Romans–Philemon):** Letters written by the Apostle Paul addressing doctrine, ethics, and church life.
- **General Epistles (Hebrews–Jude):** Letters from other leaders providing encouragement and instruction for believers.
- **Revelation:** A vision given to the Apostle John, revealing the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom.

### Matthew – Jesus the Promised Messiah

- **Author & Audience:** Matthew, a Jewish tax collector turned disciple; written primarily for a Jewish audience.
- **Purpose:** To show Jesus as the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy and the long-awaited King of the Jews.
- **Themes:**
  - Jesus as the Messiah, fulfilling prophecy
  - The Kingdom of Heaven
  - Righteousness and obedience to God's Word
  - The teachings of Jesus (especially the Sermon on the Mount)

- **Key Passages:** Matthew 5–7 (Sermon on the Mount), Matthew 28:19-20 (The Great Commission)
  - **Memory Verse:** *“Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...”* (Matthew 28:19-20)
  - **Discussion:** How does Matthew connect Jesus to Old Testament prophecy? What does the Sermon on the Mount teach us about God’s Kingdom?
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## **Mark – Jesus the Servant King**

- **Author & Audience:** John Mark, companion of Peter; written for Roman believers.

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### Chapters 3–5: Bold Witness and Opposition

- **Summary:** Peter and John heal a lame man, preach boldly, and face opposition from the Sanhedrin. The believers pray for boldness, and the Holy Spirit shakes the place.
  - **Key Insight:** The Holy Spirit empowers believers to face opposition with courage.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Acts 4:31* – “They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke the word of God boldly.”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 4:8:* Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, speaks to the leaders.
    - *Acts 4:31:* The believers are filled again with the Holy Spirit, highlighting **ongoing filling** beyond Pentecost.
    - *Side note:* Boldness is a recurring result of the Spirit’s work in believers.
  - **Questions:**
    - How does the Holy Spirit provide courage for witnessing?
    - How can we pray for the Holy Spirit’s boldness today?
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## Chapters 6–7: Choosing Leaders and Stephen’s Martyrdom

- **Summary:** Seven deacons are chosen to serve the church, including Stephen. Stephen preaches powerfully, is falsely accused, and becomes the first Christian martyr.
  - **Key Insight:** The Spirit equips leaders with wisdom, faith, and power.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Acts 6:10* – “They could not stand up against the wisdom the Spirit gave him.”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 6:3,5:* The qualifications for deacons include being “full of the Spirit and wisdom.”
    - *Acts 7:55:* Stephen, filled with the Holy Spirit, sees Jesus in glory.
  - **Questions:**
    - What qualities should Spirit-filled leaders possess?
    - How does Stephen’s witness encourage us in faith and boldness?
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## Chapters 8–12: The Gospel Expands Beyond Jerusalem

- **Summary:** Persecution scatters the believers, leading to the spread of the Gospel. Philip preaches in Samaria, Peter’s vision opens the door to Gentiles, and Cornelius’ household receives the Holy Spirit.
  - **Key Insight:** The Holy Spirit breaks down barriers, bringing salvation to all.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Acts 10:44* – “While Peter was still speaking... the Holy Spirit came on all who heard the message.”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 8:15-17:* Samaritans receive the Holy Spirit through prayer and laying on of hands.
    - *Acts 10:44-46:* Gentiles in Cornelius’ house receive the Holy Spirit and speak in tongues.
    - *Side note:* The Spirit’s work shows that God’s grace is for everyone, Jew and Gentile alike.
  - **Questions:**
    - How does the Holy Spirit’s work among the Gentiles challenge prejudices?
    - What can we learn from Philip’s obedience to the Spirit’s leading?
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## Chapters 13–15: Missionary Journeys and the Council at Jerusalem

- **Summary:** Paul and Barnabas are sent out by the Holy Spirit on missionary journeys. Miracles and conversions happen as the Gospel spreads. The Jerusalem Council settles the question of Gentile inclusion.
- **Key Insight:** The Holy Spirit directs the Church’s mission and empowers leaders.

- **Memory Verse:** *Acts 13:2* – “The Holy Spirit said, ‘Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.’”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 13:4:* Paul and Barnabas are “sent out by the Holy Spirit.”
    - *Side note:* The gifts of the Spirit operate as Paul ministers (e.g., healing, discernment).
  - **Questions:**
    - How can we discern the Holy Spirit’s direction today?
    - How does the early church’s decision reflect the Spirit’s guidance?
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## **Chapters 16–20: Growth and Miracles**

- **Summary:** Paul continues missionary journeys, facing opposition, persecution, and miraculous deliverances. The Gospel spreads across Asia Minor and Europe.
  - **Key Insight:** The Spirit leads, protects, and works through signs and wonders.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Acts 19:6* – “The Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied.”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 16:6-7:* The Spirit prevents Paul from going to certain places.
    - *Acts 19:6:* The Spirit fills believers at Ephesus, with tongues and prophecy as evidence.
  - **Questions:**
    - How does the Spirit guide Paul’s mission?
    - How can we remain sensitive to the Spirit’s leading?
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## **Chapters 21–28: Paul’s Trials and Journey to Rome**

- **Summary:** Paul’s arrest in Jerusalem, trials before leaders, and eventual journey to Rome where he continues to testify to Jesus.
  - **Key Insight:** The Spirit gives courage and wisdom to face suffering.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Acts 23:11* – “Take courage... you must testify in Rome.”
  - **Holy Spirit Notes:**
    - *Acts 23:11:* Though not explicitly mentioned as the Spirit, God’s reassurance is given, and Paul’s boldness reflects the Spirit’s work.

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## Romans – The Gospel of Grace

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### Chapters 1–3: The Problem of Sin

- **Summary:** Paul introduces the Gospel as the power of God for salvation. He explains humanity’s universal sinfulness, the consequences of sin, and the need for God’s righteousness.
  - **Key Insight:** All have sinned and need salvation.
  - **Memory Verse:** *Romans 3:23* – “For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.”
