In October, 2018, he made up a third of the "Saturday Night Crew" that included newly elected vice chair, Linda Myers, and her husband, Art. Hearing the stories of the guests, seeing their smiles when they encountered kindnesses they hadn't experienced in a long time, and especially, while coloring and teaching English to the kids, John found he was incredibly fulfilled.

Early in 2021, John joined the Inn board and was elected as board secretary; he has been pivotal in creating employee and staff protocols and documents.

Aside from his non-profit work with the Inn and the local NPR affiliate in Tucson, John is a social media manager for a communications company, overseeing teams in Arizona and Mexico City.

He and his partner, Lucas, an immigration attorney, enjoy traveling and experiencing new cultures, Tucson's under-appreciated craft beer and restaurant scene, studying languages, enjoying the beauty of the Southwest, and hanging out with their two hounds and small flock of pet chickens.

# A Message from Our Director



First, I would like to extend a huge THANK YOU to all volunteers, donors and board members who have stayed committed and flexible through times of change. Only with this support have we been able to receive and support over 23,000 individuals seeking asylum since opening our doors in December of 2016. The Inn of Southern Arizona is now officially a sub-awardee of Pima County and has moved to a new hotel location, operating 40 rooms. This has afforded more opportunities for support and better access to FEMA funding. When families and guests arrive, they are provided hygiene kits, snack bags, and room assignments. When families and guests arrive, they are provided hygiene kits and a welcome snack bag, we then assign rooms. Guests can come to our office for other needed items such as clothing and items for their children. This is a wonderful time for volunteers to provide support and have time with the guests. Meals are delivered to guest's rooms three times daily. Please reach out if you have any questions about volunteering. We would love to get you connected! In one shift at The Inn, you have the opportunity to make a huge impact proving radical hospitality and welcome to asylum seekers.

## What an Experience! A volunteer's story by Linda Myers

Last Spring, I volunteered twelve times as an airport driver for The Inn of Southern Arizona. When I got a call that a family needed a ride from The Inn to the airport, I drove from my house to The Inn to pick up the family. I took them to the airport, helped them get boarding passes, took them through security and, sometimes, waited at the gate until they boarded their plane. I used Google Translate to supplement my very limited Spanish. People always thanked me as though I was the person responsible for their upcoming new lives. All I'd done was give them a ride.

One day I picked up Priscilla and her husband and son. They were from Brazil, so they spoke Portuguese. I made a hasty language change on Google Translate. Not too far off from Spanish, I thought. But it was awkward going. I tried to speak slow and simple Spanish instead. Fortunately, Priscilla could usually understand me, or she spoke slow Portuguese back to me. When we got to the gate, we had some time to wait, and Priscilla told her story as we sat side by side with our masks on. She said her mom had died nine years ago, and they had left the rest of their family behind to come to the US. Tears filled her eyes as she grieved the losses even as she hoped for better times ahead. I said, "I do not have your sadness, but my heart hears your heart." She rested her head on my shoulder.

When it was time for the family to board, Priscilla asked me to give her my email address and phone number so she could let me know when they arrived safely at their destination. I did. I said, "I am Airport Linda". And she said, "I am Airport Priscilla." Her husband took a picture of us.

A couple of weeks ago I got a text message with the picture of us. Her message said, "Hi, Linda. I am Airport Priscilla. Do you remember? We are safe here now." I said, "Of course I remember you!"

So, as we continue in Roy's passion for walking in solidarity with all of those needing a helping hand, a quote from Pastor Rolly...


"He fed people from all walks of life, encouraging folks to gather at the table to share a meal and be in fellowship together. Roy was full of laughter and joy."




## Data Breakdown
