

The Pastor's Musings



I don't know about you, but I have some really favorite pieces of scripture. I remember when I was in seminary many years ago, there was one particular verse that really grabbed my attention, even though it really confused me and I really didn't understand what it meant.

So the situation made me wonder why this scripture verse called out to me so loudly, which meant I had to try to understand it. And I think it is such an important piece of

scripture that I want to share it with you, and of course, also share what it means.

In Paul's letter to the church at Philippi, he wrote this one sentence: "For me, to live is Christ and to die is gain" (Philippians 1.21). To live is Christ and to die is gain. Those words really struck me as being extremely important in my life and my ministry. But I had to figure out why!

And here is what I discovered. This one short verse, taken in its entirety, totally sums up Paul's approach to life and death. "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." By saying "to live is Christ," Paul first declares that the focus and reason for everything that he does while alive on this earth is for the purpose of glorifying Jesus and making Jesus known to as many people as he possibly could.

But then Paul makes known his tremendous excitement about being with Jesus after he dies. And being with Jesus when he dies is the biggest gain he could ever have! "And to die is gain!" So is it better for Paul to continue his work on this earth, or would it be better for Paul to make that step into eternity with Jesus?

"To live is Christ" clearly defines Paul and should define all of us as well. Of course we joyously await heaven as he did, but our lives on earth are also wrapped up very tightly in Christ. Paul declared Jesus and His saving grace from the moment he met Him until he was martyred for his faith. He spoke of Jesus in synagogues, on riversides, in prison, before and after shipwrecks, and to disciples, passersby, governors, emperors, sailors, travelers, philosophers, priests, Jews, Gentiles, women, men, and prison guards. He intentionally determined that in his life, he would pursue nothing else.

So his dilemma was in trying to figure out which is better - living and even suffering as Christ lived and suffered, or to die and be at rest with Christ for eternity. Paul knew he was called to speak for Christ. But he also knew that, in his death, he would forever be with the Christ that he loved so much.

And this became my dilemma as well! While I love Christ and am honored to be able to speak of Him, I also firmly believe that eternal life with Christ, after my own death, will be “gain,” the gain and excitement of knowing Christ face to face.

As Christians, our lives are lived for Christ, each and every day, in all that we do and all that we say. In other words, “To live is Christ!” To live is to live like Christ! And as Christians, we will experience an indescribable “gain,” when we meet Christ after death, and as we experience His eternal love, grace, and comfort.

During our lives, Jesus gives us the privilege of joining in His work. I pray that we will all be good and faithful Christians, who will one day hear our Master say, “Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master” (Matthew 25:21).

And may we, with Paul, be able to declare that “to live is Christ and to die is gain!” May we live as Christ, knowing the glory that awaits us!
