1 THE COURT: We're on the record, State of 2 Connecticut v. Nicholas Hall. I'll ask the parties 3 to please identify themselves. 4 ATTY. DAVIS: Good morning, Your Honor. Kelly 5 Davis for the State. 6 ATTY. BERKE: Good morning --7 ATTY. PALERMO: Good morning, Your Honor. Elena 8 Palermo for the State. 9 ATTY. BERKE: I'm sorry. Robert Berke for Mr. 10 Hall. THE COURT: And Mr. Hall is present. People are 11 now filtering in. We're here in beautiful courtroom 12 Thank you, Judge Dayton, on the record for 13 14 allowing me to use this. 15 The jury was told that my courtroom 5A is 16 unavailable. You can be seated. I just want to tell 17 the attorneys this. Well, it applies to everyone 18 except for you, Attorney Davis. 19 You have to keep your voices up in here. I say 20 that in a nice way. 2.1 ATTY. DAVIS: I'm not offended. 22 THE COURT: They hear you in Shelton. 23 ATTY. DAVIS: Yes. 2.4 THE COURT: They don't -- so, but especially if 25 you're in the middle. This is a beautiful design, but not for acoustics. 26 27 Now we have a few things to go over.

yesterday I received more records with regards to GT.

I had the opportunity to review them last night. I
have for counsel, of the 135 pages I went through, I
have selected three pages that I think apply.

And I just want to say, and yesterday you were also -- the parties received copies of what I have released. Access to confidential records is left to the Trial Court's discretion. And to --it's my duty to weigh the value against the interest of the confidentiality of the records.

So, I understand they're confidential records, but I also understand the defendant has a right for confrontation. And with respect to that - and I'm talking about, there's two cases in particular.

State v. Slimskey, that's S-L-I-M-S-K-E-Y, 257 Connecticut 842, that's a 2001 case. And State v. Juan, AG-P. That's also very influential in my decision making here.

With respect to GT, the information that I've turned over somewhat relates to behavioral, cognitive, and emotional issues that could affect her ability to observe and understand and accurately narrate the events in question. Anything that was accusatory or anything that was exculpatory was reviewed, but anything that was accusatory in nature, I have also turned over.

It's very minimal, but I thought I would err on

the safe side. Just because they're turned over to the defense does not make it admissible, but I just thought to err on the safe side, I will provide it.

I will also note that the records indicate that GT suffers among other things - there were several diagnoses that do not have to be shared, but anything that had to do with ability to relate or to accurately talk about events in the past and anything that had to do with accusatory in nature, I did

What I've done is I have three, and hopefully no more from the State, but I received three envelopes - well, two envelopes I should say. The last just came to me open. I've marked them as follows: four, five, and six consist of records that I've received from the State. I'm not going to go through the treatment centers, but they are contained therein. They -- four, five, and six are going to be Court Exhibits as I'm required to do.

And I have made Court Exhibit seven, which is the materials in which I have provided to the parties. I will note too that I'll ask Madam Clerk to seal those at this time and they remain Court Exhibits.

Look, I'm very mindful of the fact that a trial is ongoing. It's fluid. Evidence may, which initially may seem relevant or not relevant, may be relevant as the trial unfolds. If something becomes

relevant and material, I will let the parties know and make those records available. So, that is that.

Last night at 6:32, I received an email from counsel, Attorney Berke, with regards to a motion in limine. I just tried printing it out and quickly remembered that my printer is on a different floor, but I have it before me right now.

Did you file one with the clerks?

ATTY. BERKE: I did not. I will. I spoke to the clerk. I'm going to provide them with a copy.

THE COURT: Okay. And there is also a request by counsel, and I'll note that the jury is not in the room, there's also a request by counsel. There is a statement that the State is seeking to introduce.

There was some discussion about agreement of things that could come out. An agreement of things that -- and then there were agreements to disagree on certain other things. Well, last night, it seems that, is that list expanded? Is there more things that you want out?

ATTY. BERKE: Potentially. I'd ask the Court's indulgence, I'm not sure at what point we should do it, but I think -- I have gone through some of the things that were sent to me last night by the State in response to my request. I think perhaps investing a little bit of time may resolve that issue.

THE COURT: Okay. That may save time. By

investing time it saves time. I just want to thank the State because as I was going through it, I want to say about 12:05 a.m., I received an email from them, and I'm not saying this sarcastically, please don't take it that way.

I was working on it, and I'm not saying that because I want Hartford to hear it, but there was a lot, a lot to digest, but the State took it frame by frame, so to speak, as you did, counsel, but I was able to jive it too, which was extremely helpful. So that's good.

The last -- so we'll do that, but so our order is Jada, Jennifer, GT, correct?

ATTY. DAVIS: It's Jada, Jennifer, Detective Wheeler, and GT.

THE COURT: Oh, Detective. Okay. So, we're going to have to address, before Detective Wheeler is on there that video, the DNA, which is counsel's motion in limine, we have to address. Is that going to be you, Attorney Palermo?

ATTY. PALERMO: It is, Your Honor, and I haven't had time to even look at this whole motion, and I'm going to need time to do that and to speak to some people at the lab. So, I'm not going to be ready to do that today.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, that -- I take it someone from the lab is going to come and testify?

1 ATTY. DAVIS: Yes. 2 ATTY. PALERMO: Yes. 3 THE COURT: And that was not scheduled for 4 today? 5 ATTY. PALERMO: No, it was scheduled for 6 tomorrow. 7 THE COURT: Okay. Yeah, and speaking of 8 tomorrow, I did not listen to the news this morning. 9 I actually -- in a while I haven't listened to the 10 news, but that's beside the point. There's supposed to be snow. 11 12 ATTY. DAVIS: There is. And there was a concern 13 from the State about getting here safely. 14 THE COURT: And an inopportune time. You know, 15 I'll tell this to the lawyers, I'll tell this to the 16 people here, and I'll tell it to the defendant. 17 Look, don't make any heroic efforts to come in. 18 We've got some time built in. You know, the 19 judicial does what judicial does. We all have each other's cells, or we'll make sure we do today, and 20 2.1 we'll keep in touch that way. 22 But the jurors, Madam Clerk, always on top of 23 things, has provided the jurors the numbers to listen 2.4 to, or the radio stations to listen to, and I think 25 even an 800-call line, or a website. 26 THE CLERK: Yes.

THE COURT: So, they'll be able to hear when we

1 hear. So, anything else we need to do before we 2 bring the jury down? ATTY. DAVIS: Just briefly. With regard to the 3 4 meeting about the statements. I know this is fluid, 5 but the paralegals here now, it might take a while if we need to cut more things. That's what I'm 6 7 concerned about. So, I was just wondering if the 8 Court has any idea when we want to have that 9 conversation? 10 THE COURT: It was you, Attorney Berke, that said if we take time, we may be able to save time. 11 12 ATTY. BERKE: Right. So, I'd have to just look 13 at those segments in the video. 14 THE COURT: Okay. 15 ATTY. BERKE: And jump to each segment to 16 confirm whether things were moved or not. 17 THE COURT: Okay. That'll be Wheeler. 18 be at 2:00? 19 ATTY. DAVIS: No, the first two witnesses are going to be very short, I think. 20 THE COURT: Okay. That's always famous last 2.1 22 words, but. 23 ATTY. DAVIS: Yes. Yes, knock on wood. 2.4 THE COURT: And I do want to say something to 25 the paralegal. I know -- and your name for the 26 record? 27 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Iris.

THE COURT: Heroic measures on your point.

Look, I sat where these folks sat, and I didn't have the benefit of having a paralegal. I did my own editing, so to speak, and I was horrible at it. But at one time, I went and had Quantico look at stuff, and they were a lot better.

But to have this done in real time is just

But to have this done in real time is just phenomenal and thank you. It assists everyone. So, I do want to say thank you. I'd be remiss if I didn't.

ATTY. DAVIS: I just have one more thing.

THE COURT: Of course you do.

ATTY. DAVIS: If we could just put it on the record now. We did speak in chambers. Attorney Berke alerted the State and the Court to supporters of the defendant wearing crosses. Yesterday, the defendant did not -- the State did not see up close what it said. The State assumed it was a scripture.

I personally have still not seen any of these stickers up close, Your Honor, but I was told by multiple people and staff that it says, not guilty, innocent. In light of that, I think they should be removed.

THE COURT: Counsel, you want to be heard?

ATTY. BERKE: You know, it's complicated. This doesn't affect what my client is wearing, so it's a little bit different. These are people that are in

support of him. It's hard to see from unless you look close. You know, it's not really my argument to make in some respects, but they have a First Amendment right to present something that's not offensive, and I guess the Court has to make that decision whether it's offensive or somehow inappropriate or prejudicial.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything further?

ATTY. DAVIS: Yeah, I think that they're just appealing for -- the cross in and of itself, if it was just a cross would be fine. But I think coupled with those words, especially just for the record, the setup of this courthouse, there's only one set of elevators.

People are close to each other in the hallways.

I just think with those sentiments; it could give the jury some inkling based on a decision. I know the Court advises them that they're not to consider extrinsic evidence, but that's just so blatant.

And also, the State thinks it's appealing to religious sympathies perhaps. I just think it's too close to the line.

THE COURT: Do you have any case support for it?
ATTY. DAVIS: No.

THE COURT: Okay. And the reason I ask is -- and you can sit down. And we have animal abuse cases where Desmond's Armies come in. They all wear

uniforms. The Court's never asked to take off your shirts, take off your uniforms. Now, it's a lot different than a cross that says not guilty and innocent.

I do -- there is a case. It's *State v. Johnson*, 288, Connecticut, 236. It is a 2008 case. In that case, a murder defendant's claim that jurors were improperly biased against him as a result of their observation of spectators sitting on defendant's side of the courtroom during testimony of State's key witnesses.

It's not one of juror misconduct, but rather more appropriately characterized a claim that the courtroom environment or the courtroom situation improperly biased jury, and thus the Trial Court was not required to conduct an inquiry on record with counsel, and defendant had the burden of proving either that the environment was inherently prejudicial.

You know, I love this building. And what I like about it best is there's a lot of experts that work here because everyone's been weighing in on me, whether when I'm going on the elevator on what to do or what not to do in this case. Advice such as tell them to rip them off now. And I think I'm not going to.

Do I think it's borderline pandering? Yes. It

is a cross. It is approximately three inches long and -- three and a half inches long, two and a half inches across. It says not guilty across and down as in a crossword style innocent. You can't read it. You can't read it from any distance. And I'm not saying that because I've got older eyes. I've walked through the hallway several times.

Yesterday when it was brought to my attention, I actually walked up close enough and I still couldn't read it. It was only -- I only learned about what it was when one of the sharp-eyed marshals did indicate to me what was said on there.

Look, do I think it's in poor taste? I'm not to answer that. But I will say this. I have told the jury when they came in during the indoctrination, so to speak, that what they see in the back is not evidence.

That evidence comes from two very important pieces, properly introduced exhibits and the court sworn testimony of witnesses. What happens in the back, what happens outside this courtroom is not evidence. I said it to them then. I said it to them, you know, when they gathered yesterday. And I've said it to them at night.

Our jury is at best 30 feet away from them. I don't think they could read it. And I'm not asking people to take off crosses.

1 ATTY. DAVIS: Thank you.

THE COURT: I don't think in any way that it prejudices either side. It could be seen, as I said, as pandering. It could be seen as a desperate cry.

As has been often said, there's no atheist in a foxhole.

So, I'm not going to ask to remove it. If they get bigger or the lettering gets bigger, I'll reconsider it. I understand trials are fluid. And we'll take it from there. Anything further?

ATTY. DAVIS: No, nothing from the State.

ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, in a prior chambers conference, we had discussed the fact that the Court may release information to the defense in abundance of caution. But prior to its admissibility, I assure the Court that I would ask for a hearing outside the presence.

THE COURT: Yes.

ATTY. BERKE: As the Court can realize, now there are a number of different issues that that may arise. So, I will make an attempt to try to alert the Court. I'll try and keep them in one segment, so it doesn't -- it's not that choppy.

THE COURT: Thank you. All right. That being said, I'm going to ask that we bring the jury down. So, we're going to just take a brief recess, maybe about five minutes, and we'll have the jury down.

1 Thank you. 2 (Recess) 3 THE COURT: Okay. Ladies and gentlemen, we're 4 on the record. The jury is here. Anything before we 5 bring the jury out? 6 ATTY. DAVIS: No, Your Honor. ATTY. BERKE: 7 No. THE COURT: And when I say we're on the record, 8 we're on the record in State v. Nicholas Hall. 9 10 may be seated. I do want to say this. In addition -- and I'm following up on the lapel crosses. 11 12 In addition to the jury being quite some 13 distance from the public in both courtroom 5A and now 14 the courtroom we're in 3, there have been measures by 15 our marshals. The jurors come in and out of the 16 hallway rather quickly and go right into their room. 17 They report on the seventh floor, so they're not 18 lingering outside with others. They're in and out. 19 But I do want to make that clear, in addition to 20 being at least 30 feet away. They're -- if they do 2.1 see someone in the hallway, it's very brief as 22 they're being walked in and walked out by marshals, 23 escorted I should say. So, with that being said, if 2.4 we could --25 Oh, I do want to ask. So, the witnesses that 26 are coming in, any initials, anything we have to deal

with as to that?

1 ATTY. DAVIS: No, Your Honor. 2 THE COURT: And are we just using Jada's first 3 name or are we using --4 ATTY. DAVIS: Just Jada's first name. 5 THE COURT: Is her name on Court's Exhibit 1? 6 ATTY. DAVIS: No. ATTY. PALERMO: No. 7 8 ATTY. DAVIS: She's 19 now as well. 9 ATTY. PALERMO: Yeah, I don't think we need to 10 use her initials. THE COURT: Good. Then we'll use it. And we 11 12 haven't been asking anyone their addresses, so we're 13 not going to do it now. 14 ATTY. DAVIS: And just -- the Court reminded me, 15 and I just want to put on the record, I did give 16 three records of the three lay witnesses today, so 17 it's --18 THE COURT: Oh, that's right. 19 ATTY. DAVIS: -- G.T., Jada Garrell, and 20 Jennifer Foster. I did talk to Jennifer Foster and 21 Jada Garrell because Jada, it shows an arraignment on 22 her record. I did talk to them. She was arrested 23 for a drug offense and pled to an infraction for 2.4 that. 25 And Jennifer Foster has nothing on her record. 26 And G.T. has an eavesdropping pending case, which the

Court's aware of, which is the extent.

1 THE COURT: Thank you. Okay. If we could 2 please bring in the jury. 3 (The jury enters the courtroom) 4 THE COURT: Good morning, everyone. 5 THE JURY: Good morning. 6 THE COURT: Thanks for coming back. Will 7 counsel stipulate to the presence of the jurors and 8 alternates? 9 ATTY. DAVIS: The State stipulates. 10 ATTY. BERKE: The defense stipulates, Your Honor THE COURT: Okay. Nice, huh? This is the big 11 12 court, so I really switched just to see if you folks 13 would switch chairs. You did, so that tells me 14 something. 15 We're going to begin today. I will say this. 16 On the table, and I'm saying this now because I don't 17 want to forget. On the table, Madam Clerk, she could 18 have been a Boy Scout, always prepared, left you 19 radio stations and the like. Tomorrow there's 20 supposed to be snow, or there may be snow. 2.1 I don't follow any of the Doppler or anything 2.2 like that. I'm not going to pretend to be a 23 meteorologist, but we'll see how it is. But there is 2.4 a website. There are radio stations, TV stations you 25 can watch and listen to. And, you know, we'll just 26 have to play it by ear. It all depends on where the

rain line is versus the snow line.

But look, and I told the parties this, and I'll tell you this. If we're on and there is inclement weather, no heroic means coming in. We'll get this done. Still come in, but, you know, don't -- you know, I don't want you, you know, going crazy saying, I've got to be there, I've got to be there, I've got to be there.

As you see, we didn't start on time today. I

As you see, we didn't start on time today. I apologize, but that doesn't mean we haven't been doing work. We're doing work. Sometimes, you know, and I think I said it yesterday, to save time, we take time.

So, we're working on stuff now that should save us time in front of you. So that being said, I'll ask that the State call their next witness.

ATTY. PALERMO: Thank you, Your Honor. The State calls Jayda Garrell.

THE COURT: Ms. Garrell, if you could please come right over where the marshal is standing. All right. If you could remain standing, raise your right hand, and face Madam Clerk. She's going to put you under oath.

71 1 Police Department? 2 My first position was a patrolman. 3 How long were you in patrol? Q 4 Α I was in patrol about 10 years. 5 And then after patrol, what did you do? After patrol, I became a detective. 6 Α 7 And as a detective, what are your duties and 8 responsibilities? 9 My duties are to investigate larger cases that take 10 more time and that are more detailed than on a patrol level. And what? 11 0 They take more time and they're more detailed than on 12 13 a patrol level. 14 And what type of cases would those include? All different cases. Sexual assault, larceny, 15 Α burglary, robbery, pretty much any type of major crime. 16 17 As a detective, do you get involved with interviewing 18 people, witnesses, suspects? What are some of the things a 19 detective does? 20 Yes, we would basically handle the investigation. We would search for evidence. We would interview suspects. We 21 22 would keep the case in order. And sometimes we have to do

investigate the case.

Q In order to become a police officer, did you have to have any special training? Did you have to go through any training?

search warrants, arrest warrants, whatever is needed to

- 1 A Yes, basic police training.
- 2 Q And what does that include?

basic training for a police officer.

- A You go to the police academy. It's about a five- to six-month training class where they train you physically and on all of the laws of the State of Connecticut and basically
- Q Do you have to take some type of test to pass the academy?
- 9 A Throughout the academy, there's tests pretty much on 10 every subject as you go along, yes.
- Q Do -- as an officer or detective now, do you have to get recertified, or do you get updated training over the vears?
- 14 A Yes, every three years we recertify.
- 15 Q And are you up to date in your recertification?
- 16 A Yes, I am.
- Q Have you had any special training in any areas of law enforcement?
- 19 | A Yes.

- 20 Q What kind of trainings?
- A A lot of criminal investigation trainings, becoming a detective, also including sexual assault trainings.
- Q And what kind of sexual assault trainings have you had?
- 25 A I've had several of those. From a patrol level, they
  26 would call it minimal facts. That's finding minimal facts
  27 of a sexual assault. And then in the recertifications we do

- 1 every three years, there's basic sexual assault classes
- 2 | there. I've had drug and alcohol-induced sexual assault.
- 3 | I've had normal week-long sexual assault trainings. Also,
- 4 | Finding Words was one of the trainings that I've done.
- 5 O What is that?
- 6 A Finding Words is a -- it's one of the advanced sexual
- 7 assault trainings. That's a training that's set up for
- 8 speaking to children about sexual assault crimes.
- 9 Q Is there a special detective or person in the
- 10 | Trumbull Police Department that handles sexual assault
- 11 cases?
- 12 A I handle all the sexual assault trainings at the
- 13 | Trumbull Police Department -- not trainings. I handle all
- 14 of the sexual assault investigations at the Trumbull Police
- 15 Department.
- 16 Q How long have you been doing that?
- 17 A I've been doing that since I became a detective,
- 18 about 10 years.
- 19 Q Approximately how many sexual assault cases have you
- 20 investigated?
- 21 A I've been in the detective bureau for 10 years, so it
- 22 | would probably be around 50 to 100 sexual assault cases.
- 23 | Q I'm going to refer you to a date of May 26, 2020. D
- 24 | you recall if you were working that date?
- 25 A I believe I was, yes.
- 26 Q And were you assigned to investigate a particular
- 27 | case that day?

- 1 A Yes, I was.
- 2 Q What was the nature of the case?
- 3 A That was a sexual assault case.
- 4 Q Did it involve a child or an adult?
- 5 A It involved a child.
- 6 Q Is that the case we're here for today?
- 7 A Yes, it is.
- 8 Q I'd like to show you Courts Exhibit 1 and tell me if
- 9 you recognize the names on the exhibit.
- 10 A Yes, I do.
- 11 Q And how do you recognize those names?
- 12 A The complainant and the victims in the case.
- Q Okay, so, you saw -- and we're going to refer to
- 14 | those people on that court exhibit by their initials, okay?
- 15 A Okay.
- 16 Q Okay. So, do you recognize the name LT?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q And how do you know that name?
- 19 A Because that's the child victim in the case
- 20 ATTY. BERKE: Objection, Your Honor.
- 21 THE COURT: Yes.
- 22 ATTY. PALERMO: Okay. I'm going to ask him to strike the victim.
- 24 THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, you just heard
  25 we don't use the term victim. That's not for you
- 26 to decide if that's -- it's what we call an ultimate
- issue. So sometimes in our everyday parlance, when

1 we're talking, we say it or it slips out, and it's 2 unintentional, but I'm going to instruct the 3 detective not to use that term again. 4 It's the juror's determination whether or not 5 there's a victim here. Sometimes we say alleged 6 victim. It gets complicated. It gets lengthy. So, 7 we're just not going to -- we're going to stay away 8 from it. Thank you. 9 CONT. BY ATTY. PALERMO: 10 So how do you recognize LT's name? That's the child in the case? 11 Α 12 Q The child involving the sexual assault case? 13 Α Yes. 14 Okay. And how about GT? 0 15 That would be the mother in the case. Α 16 When the complaint was made by LT, how old was she at Q 17 the time? 18 She was nine years old. 19 Okay. And when you received this case to start an 20 investigation, was there a suspect? 21 Α Yes, there was. 22 And who was that? Q 23 Α That was Nicholas Hall. 2.4 And what is his date of birth? 0 25 I believe it was 8-10-1993. Α 26 When the police open up an investigation, do -- does

the investigation get assigned a particular case number?

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q And do you -- and was this case assigned a case
- 3 number?
- 4 A The case was 20 for 2020, and then it was 84-24, so
- 5 20-84-24.
- 6 Q Do you recall when the complaint came in?
- 7 A The complaint came in on May  $22^{nd}$  of 2020.
- 8 Q Do you remember how it came in? How the police
- 9 became aware of this?
- 10 A Yes. GT went to the police department, and she filed
- 11 | a complaint with patrol.
- 12 Q When did you get involved yourself as a detective in
- 13 | this case?
- 14 A It got assigned to me on the  $26^{th}$ , and then on the
- $27^{th}$ , I began investigating the case.
- 16 Q Do you recall -- well, let me ask. The complaint
- 17 came in, you said, on the  $22^{nd}$ , and then you got the case on
- 18 the  $26^{th}$ . Was that during the week or over a weekend? Do
- 19 you remember what that time period was then?
- 20 A Yes, I remember. It was a holiday weekend. I think
- 21 | it was Memorial Day. So, the complaint came in on, like, a
- 22 Friday, and then it got assigned -- it was a long weekend,
- 23 | so it got assigned on a Monday, which I believe was the
- 24 26<sup>th</sup>.
- Q Okay. And do you recall the first thing you did in
- 26 | terms of your investigation?
- 27 A The first thing I did was reach out to GT.

- 1 Q How did you reach out to GT?
- 2 A Via phone.
- 3 Q Why did you reach out via phone?
- A That was during COVID, so physical -- that was at a point where things were kind of unknown.
  - Q I'm sorry?

- A That was at a point where things were unknown, and we weren't really supposed to have many people, unless absolutely necessary, in the police department, and, you know, it was the height of COVID, so contacting people was a minimum.
- 12 Q And what was the purpose of contacting GT?
- 13 A Well, I received the initial complaint from the --
- 14 ATTY. BERKE: Objection. The next statement is
  15 going to be what the complaint is.
- THE COURT: Yep, without saying what the
  complaint said. And we don't even use the word
  complaint. You received a call from GT.
- 19 THE WITNESS: Okay. Okay. Sorry, Your Honor.
- 20 CONT. BY ATTY. PALERMO:
- 21 Q Why did you call GT?
- 22 A I called GT to obtain further information.
- Q Okay. And when you called GT, could you describe her voice and her emotional state as you perceived it over the phone? How did she sound to you when you talked to her?
- A I remember she was really upset. She was in tears, and she had a hard time telling me and answering my

- 1 questions.
- 2 Q Okay. And when you say she had a hard time telling
- 3 you and answering your questions, what do you mean? Can you
- 4 explain what you mean?
- 5 A I mean she was, like, choking up. She was having a
- 6 hard time speaking. But I had to get some basic information
- 7 so I could begin the investigation.
- 8 Q And did you get the basic information from GT?
- 9 A Yes, I did.
- 10 Q Without telling me what she said, but what kind of
- 11 information were you looking for?
- 12 A I was just looking for some background information
- 13 regarding everything involved in the case.
- 14 Q And was she cooperative?
- 15 A Yes, she was.
- 16 Q And did you provide her with any information?
- 17 A Yes, I did.
- 18 Q Like what?
- 19 A I advised her that in order to move forward, we'd be
- 20 setting up a forensic interview.
- 21 Q And what is a forensic interview?
- 22 A A forensic interview is rather than having police
- 23 officers, you know, in uniform or with badges, a forensic
- 24 | interview is an interview that's set up and it's designed
- 25 for children.
- 26 Q So, and is this something that just Trumbull does, or
- 27 | is this unique to Trumbull PD, or is this like a standard

- 1 procedure involving child sexual assault cases?
- 2 A Most towns have some kind of center in order to --
- 3 | not most towns. There's different areas that have different
- 4 kinds of centers that do forensic interviews. Ours in the
- 5 area happens to be the Center for Family Justice out of
- 6 | Bridgeport. They handle Trumbull and a few other
- 7 | surrounding towns, and they do the forensic interviews
- 8 there.
- 9 Q And how does this forensic interview work? Who does
- 10 | it?
- 11 A They have interviewers who interview the children.
- 12 It's a comfortable environment for the children, and they're
- 13 | also trained to speak with children.
- 14 Q Are these police officers?
- 15 A They're not police officers.
- 16 Q So when you were speaking to GT, you were telling her
- 17 | about setting up a forensic interview?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q Okay. Did you tell her anything else? Did you
- 20 provide her with any other information?
- 21 A I believe I was asking her to send me something.
- 22 Q What were you asking her to send you?
- 23 A Is it okay to say?
- 24 O I believe it is.
- 25 A I was asking her to send me an audio file that she
- 26 was telling me she had.
- 27 Q An audio file, what type of audio file?

- 1 A She told me she had an audio file of her speaking
- 2 | with her child.
- 3 Q Which child?
- 4 A LT.
- 5 Q So after your conversation with GT that day, that was
- 6 on the  $27^{th}$ , what else did you do that day?
- 7 A I just began to set up the forensic interview.
- 8 Q With whom -- through whom, I'm sorry.
- 9 A Through the Center for Family Justice.
- 10 Q Okay. And did you have a date for an interview? Was
- 11 | a date scheduled at that time?
- 12 A A date was later determined to be June  $3^{rd}$ .
- Q And do you recall what you next did regarding your
- 14 investigation?
- 15 A You mean like the next timeframe?
- 16 Q The next -- did you do -- yeah, the next timeframe.
- 17 Well, let me move back. After you set up the
- 18 | forensic interview or started the process, did you do
- 19 anything else that day on the 27<sup>th</sup>?
- 20 A That was pretty much it on that day, I believe.
- Q Okay. And then did you do anything on June 1st?
- 22 A Yes, I did. Yes.
- 23 | Q What did you do on that date?
- 24 A On that day, I called GT for further information.
- 25 Q Why would you call GT for further information?
- 26 A One, probably to let her know about the forensic
- 27 | interview and explain that, and also to get further

- 1 background information.
- 2 Q And why did you need further background information?
- 3 A I just needed further background information. I
- 4 | wanted to find out how this disclosure came about.
- 5 Q Okay. And were you provided with that information?
- 6 A Yes, I was.
- 7 Q Did you receive the audio, or tape, or whatever GT
- 8 was going to send?
- 9 A On that day, yes, it was received.
- 10 Q Did you review it?
- 11 A Yes, I did.
- 12 Q Okay. After reviewing it, is that when you called
- 13 GT?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q And did GT provide you with additional information
- 16 | that you didn't have when you first spoke to him?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q Okay. As a result of your conversation with GT after
- 19 talking to her on the first, and basically reviewing the
- 20 audio, what did you do next in your investigation?
- 21 A Next, I contacted another person.
- 22 Q Who did you contact?
- 23 A Another person.
- 24 Q Who did you contact?
- 25 A I contacted Jennifer Foster.
- 26 Q And who was Jennifer Austin?
- 27 A Jennifer Foster.

- 1 A I wanted to have them in so we could speak in person.
- 2 Q And when you say wanted them in, in where?
- 3 A Into the police department for an interview.
- 4 Q Sorry?
- 5 A Into the police department for an interview.
- 6 Q And were they willing to come in?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Do you recall -- were they living in Connecticut at
- 9 | that time?
- 10 A No, I believe they were living in Poughkeepsie, New
- 11 York.
- 12 Q Did you do anything else that day on the 1st of June
- 13 that you remember?
- 14 A I believe that was it.
- Q What do you recall next doing in terms of the
- 16 investigation?
- 17 A I believe next was the forensic interview on June
- 18 3<sup>rd</sup>.
- 19 Q Now tell the jury, where did that forensic interview
- 20 take place?
- 21 A The forensic interview took place at the Center for
- 22 Family Justice in Bridgeport.
- 23 Q And can you kind of describe the setup of that area
- 24 | in terms of how a forensic interview is done? Is it with a
- 25 | lot of people there? Kind of just explain it a little bit.
- 26 A Yes, so the forensic interview with the child takes
- 27 | place in a room, and it's just the trained interviewer and

- 1 the child. That's typically recorded with a camera. It's
- 2 | just them two in the room, and then it's broadcasted into
- 3 | another room like a couple rooms over.
- 4 Q Sorry?
- 5 A It's broadcasted. They video and audio record it.
- 6 And then it's also -- we watch from another room. But
- 7 | because it was COVID, we weren't able to watch in person, so
- 8 I watched it via Zoom.
- 9 Q When you say we watched, who's we?
- 10 A I know I watched it. The DCF caseworker watched it.
- 11 And then the representative from the Center for Family
- 12 Justice, she would have been there in person, like, hitting
- 13 the record buttons, and she works there, so she's kind of
- 14 | allowed in that building at that time.
- 15 Q And this forensic interview was of whom?
- 16 A Excuse me?
- 17 0 Who was the forensic interview of?
- 18 A It was of LT.
- 19 Q Okay. And did you watch the interview as it was
- 20 taking place?
- 21 A Yes, I did.
- 22 Q Do the police typically in cases of child sexual
- 23 | assault cases typically do the interviews?
- 24 A No.
- 25 Q Why?
- 26 A Because we use the Center for Family Justice to do
- 27 | forensic interviews that are with children, and it's because

- 1 | they have trained professionals that are usually in that
- 2 business that can talk to children, and they're trained to
- 3 talk to children.
- 4 Q And what is the purpose of these interviews?
- 5 A The purpose of the interviews are to make the child
- 6 | comfortable and to basically -- it's a fact-finding
- 7 | interview to see what happened.
- 8 Q So you watched LT's interview?
- 9 A Yes, I did.
- 10 Q Could you describe LT's emotional state as you
- 11 observed her on that day?
- 12 A Yeah. During the interview, I remember she was very
- 13 upset. She had a hard time saying things. At times she had
- 14 to write these things on a board. And I remember at one
- 15 point, her -- she kind of had her hands on her face, and she
- 16 | looked -- she kind of looked defeated, and her hair was over
- 17 her body, and she just looked upset.
- 18 Q How old was she?
- 19 A She was nine years old.
- 20 Q After the interview, after you observed the forensic
- 21 | interview, did you interview anyone else that day?
- 22 A Yes, I did.
- 23 | Q Who did you interview?
- 24 A Back at the police department after the interview, I
- 25 met with Jennifer and her daughter, Jayda.
- 26 Q And what happened when you met them at the police
- 27 department?

- 1 A I interviewed them.
- 2 Q And was this interview recorded? Was it videotape,
- 3 audio tape?
- 4 A Video, audio recording, yes.
- 5 Q Is that typical?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 Q And were they cooperative?
- 8 A Yes, they were.
- 9 Q And what was the purpose of you interviewing Jayda
- 10 | and her mother?
- 11 A To get their side of the story, to find out what they
- 12 know.
- 13 Q Okay. And did you use that information in your
- 14 investigation?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q Did they give -- after the end of the recorded
- 17 | interview, did they give a statement?
- 18 A Yes, they did.
- 19 Q And what was the purpose of that statement?
- 20 A The purpose of the statement was so they would just
- 21 basically swear to what they told me.
- 22 Q To what?
- 23 A To what they had told me during the interview.
- 24 O So was it a short statement?
- 25 A Yes.
- Q What else did you do on June 3rd?
- 27 A Later that day, Sergeant Coppola (phonetic) and I

- 1 went to GT's residence. 2 For what purpose? 3 We went there to photograph the house. 4 And why did you do that? 5 We wanted to speak to GT a little further, see if there was any evidence at that time we could collect, and 6 7 also photograph the house so if and when we went to court, 8 the photographs of the house at the current time would be 9 present. 10 Did you collect any evidence that day? Besides taking photographs, did you take any -- collect any evidence 11 12 that day? 13 Α No. 14 Did you do anything else that day on the 3rd? 0 15 I believe that was it for the  $3^{rd}$ . Α
- 16 Did you do -- what did you do the following day or 17
- what was the next thing you did in terms of your
- 18 investigation?
- 19 The following day on the  $4^{th}$ , I directed other 20 investigators to go back to the house.
- And why would you do that? 2.1
- 22 That day, I again, spoke to GT because it was after 23 the forensic interview, so I wanted to obtain further 2.4 information from her. While speaking to her, she made 25 mention about --
- 26 ATTY. BERKE: Objection.
- THE COURT: Sustained. 27

- 1 | CONT. BY ATTY. PALERMO:
- 2 Q What was the purpose of calling her? I don't want
- 3 | you to tell me what she said, but what was the purpose of
- 4 | calling her?
- 5 A To obtain further and additional information.
- 6 Q And did she provide you with additional information?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Do you remember if you called her or if she called
- 9 you?
- 10 A I'm not sure.
- 11 Q Did you get additional information?
- 12 A Yes, I did.
- 13 Q As a result of the additional information, what did
- 14 you do?
- 15 A I asked other investigators to go to the house.
- 16 Q And what did you ask the other investigators to do?
- 17 A I asked them to go into the bedroom and use light
- 18 sources to look around the bedroom at the kids' beds and see
- 19 | if there was anything of interest.
- 20 Q And what do you mean?
- 21 A If there was anything that could be collected as
- 22 evidence.
- 23 Q Such as what?
- 24 A Bedding.
- 25 Q And you were there the day before. Why didn't you
- 26 | collect bedding the day before?
- 27 A We did a lot that day. I'm not really sure why we

1 didn't do it that day. I know on the 3rd, I spoke to GT,
```

- 2 | and it didn't seem like anything was really relevant that
- 3 day.
- 4 Q I think you said then you spoke to GT the next day?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q And did you get additional information that day?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Is that why you sent the officers there?
- 9 A Yes, it is.
- 10 Q Did you go with them that day?
- 11 A No.
- 12 Q Do you remember what, if anything, of evidence they
- 13 | collected that day?
- 14 A Yes, I believe they collected three items from the
- 15 beds.
- 16 Q From the beds?
- 17 A Beds, yes.
- 18 Q Do you remember whose beds those items were collected
- 19 from?
- 20 A Yes.
- Q Whose beds?
- 22 A GT and I can say the other one?
- 23 Q Yeah, whose beds? Just say the initials.
- 24 A GT and ST.
- Q Okay. And do you recall what bedding they took?
- 26 A I believe they took two items from -- one item from
- 27 ST, and two from ST. I get a little confused on that. I'm

- 1 not sure off the top of my head.
- Q Okay. Do you remember what the items were?
- 3 A There was three bedding items, like sheets or
- 4 comforters that they took.
- 5 Q Okay. Did GT ever -- did you ever ask GT to come
- 6 | into the police department to give any type of statement?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Okay. And why did you do that?
- 9 A I asked her to come because of what she told me on
- 10 | the phone. I wanted her to provide a statement regarding
- 11 | what she was telling me.
- 12 O Okay. And did she come in?
- 13 A Yes, she did.
- 14 Q What -- as a result of all the information you
- 15 received from GT, Jayda, and Jayda's mom, and the forensic
- 16 | interview, what happened next?
- 17 A An arrest warrant was applied for.
- 18 Q For whom?
- 19 A For Nicholas Hall.
- 20 Q And what happened next?
- 21 A Later, the arrest warrant was approved.
- 22 Q And then what happened?
- 23 A And then I contacted GT to ask her to have Nicholas
- 24 come to the house so we could arrest him.
- Q And why did you ask GT to have Nicholas come to the
- 26 house?
- 27 A It just seemed like the easiest way to get him,

- 1 knowing that he lived in New York, and we had an arrest
- 2 | warrant for him, so it seemed like they were still talking,
- 3 and it was the easiest way to get him to come to the house
- 4 so we could arrest him for the charges.
- 5 O So did he come to the house?
- 6 A Yes, he did.
- 7 Q And what happened?
- 8 A He was arrested and taken to the police department.
- 9 Q When he got to the police department, what happened
- 10 at the police department?
- 11 A He wanted to talk about the incident, so we
- 12 interviewed him.
- Q And before you started interviewing him, is there a
- 14 procedure before you interview people in terms of reading
- 15 | them -- do you have to give them any -- do you have to tell
- 16 | them or give them the opportunity to not speak to you?
- 17 A Yes, you have to read them the Miranda Rights.
- 18 Q And did you do that?
- 19 A Yes, Officer Lavin read his Miranda Rights to him.
- 20 Q Were you there when that happened?
- 21 A Yes, I was.
- 22 Q Okay. And was -- did the defendant willingly speak
- 23 to you?
- 24 A Yes, he wanted to speak about it.
- Q When you spoke to the defendant, where did you speak
- 26 to him? What area did you speak to him?
- 27 A I spoke to him in the Detective Bureau interview

- 1 room.
- 2 Q And could you describe that interview room?
- A It's just a small, square room with a camera in it
- 4 and three seats.
- 5 Q Is that -- was the interview of the defendant, was
- 6 | that recorded?
- 7 A Yes, that was audio and video.
- 8 Q Is that standard procedure if you're speaking to a
- 9 suspect that's been arrested?
- 10 A Yes, it is.
- 11 Q And you said he spoke to you that day?
- 12 A Yes, he did.
- Q And did anything happen -- during the course of the
- 14 interview, did you ask him to provide you with anything?
- 15 A I asked him to provide a DNA sample.
- 16 Q And why did you do that?
- 17 A Just in case any evidence was acquired, we just
- 18 | wanted to be able to show that it was his DNA or not his
- 19 DNA.
- 20 Q And was he willing to provide you with a DNA sample?
- 21 A Yes, he was.
- 22 Q And how does that come about? Like how do you get a
- 23 DNA sample?
- 24 A A DNA sample, it's basically a cotton swab on a
- 25 | stick. So, I would hand it over and I would ask you to rub
- 26 | it inside your mouth for about 30 seconds and then push it
- 27 on a -- it's a card, a little piece of paper. I would have
