14	later start than we wanted but it's 10:01, I did give
15	the lawyers the bad news is I could not move my
16	three-judge panel sentencing which is on tomorrow at
17	10 o'clock.

19	I was really hoping to get that so, I'm going to
20	tell my jury tomorrow we will be starting at 11. But
21	right now, we have is the detective here?

24	THE COURT: Please have him come on in and take
25	the stand. I don't need to put him under oath again,
26	he's been under oath. I'll just remind him.

ATTY. DAVIS: As close as -- we ended, Your 5 Honor, at 35 -- 36:35. I --6 7 THE COURT: 36:35, yep. 8 ATTY. DAVIS: Yeah. 9 So, I should be able to -- all right. I got it 10 to 36:13. THE COURT: Good. 11 ATTY. PALERMO: Your Honor --12 13 THE COURT: Yes, anything. 14 ATTY. PALERMO: Before we bring the jury out, we 15 did discuss with Attorney Berke he has subpoenaed 16 Detective Wheeler, I think for tomorrow, and we 17 indicated to Attorney Berke that Detective Wheeler is 18 having some -- he had to have knee surgery so he's in 19 some pain. 20 And we were hoping that maybe he could question 2.1 him about whatever he wants to question him about 22 today. 23 THE COURT: Oh, absolutely. 2.4 As long as you don't object for outside the 25 scope. 26 ATTY. PALERMO: No, but apparently there -- he 27 may still have to call him depending on what is --

1 testimony comes in through G.T., so --2 THE COURT: G.T. Understood. I understand. 3 It's a fluid -- fluid situation. 4 ATTY. BERKE: So, I subpoenaed people for 5 tomorrow afternoon that's colossally unlikely that 6 we're going to get to those people. DAVIS: Mm-hmm. 2.1 THE COURT: It sounds like winter is coming all 2.2 in one week and it's during the week of this trial. 23 So, we'll do what we can. 2.4 The jurors have -- they still have the 25 notifications there on who they have to call and 26 (Indiscernible) listen to, but we'll get going. 27 Let's get going today and let's see where we

1 are. Bring in the jury, please. 2 (Pause in proceedings.) 3 THE COURT: And you know the notepads are right 4 there, right? 5 (Jury enters.) 6 THE COURT: Will counsel stipulate to the 7 presence of jurors and alternates. 8 ATTY. DAVIS: The State stipulates. 9 ATTY. BERKE: Defense stipulates, Your Honor. 10 THE COURT: All right. Ladies and gentlemen, good morning. 11 12 THE JURORS: Good morning. 13 THE COURT: And thanks for all coming back. I 14 mean that. 15 We're going to start now; we're going to pick up 16 just where we left off. Detective Wheeler is still 17 under oath, we're watching the video. 18 Originally it was at -- we stopped it at 3645, 19 somewhere around there. We're going to go back like 20 one question. 21 And then, again, this is something that's in 22 evidence, it's a full exhibit, you'll get to look at 23 it if you so choose. 2.4 But for now, we're just going to start right 25 here and work your way -- yeah, if you want to move 26 down. And when we initially start, just raise your 27 hand if you can't hear it well.

19	ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, could we have a side
20	bar?
21	THE COURT: Absolutely.
22	Ladies and gentlemen, we'll be right with you.
23	Could we go off the record for a minute, please.
24	(Sidebar taken.)
25	THE COURT: All right. If we could go back on
26	the record, please.
27	THE MONITOR: (Indiscernible.)

THE COURT: We're back on? Thank you.

Ladies and gentlemen, what we heard was excerpts from the police interview of Nicholas Hall. There are a few things that I told you in advance and I'm going to remind you now.

First, we're not hearing the entire interview.

There were questions by the police and responses by

Mr. Hall that I have excluded. I have excluded these
questions and responses in accordance with

Connecticut case law and our general statutes.

You are not to speculate as to what might be asked or answered. And you are not to speculate as to why I excluded it.

Second, there may be references to they, or them, or the kids, in the responses. However, such response, I want you to know, applies to L.T. only.

There is only one individual alleging such behavior and you can give the video whatever weight you want. You could deem it -- you can give whatever weight you deem it appropriate as it -- and I just want you to know that it applies to L.T. only.

Now at the conclusion of the video we saw that the defendant was placed under arrest. I told you before an arrest is merely procedural steps that starts the process.

The arrest is a formality, so to speak, that brings the individual to court to be charged. Arrest

1 does not mean that the defendant has done anything 2 wrong. 3 The fact that the State, the fact that the 4 police accused him of committing these crimes does 5 not mean he has done anything wrong. And the fact 6 that someone has been arrested, you are not to use 7 that against them. 8 As I said, the arrest is merely a procedural 9 stage, and it gets us to where we are today. 10 Now, what we have next is cross examination, but we're going to take a five minute -- well, we'll make 11 12 it a ten minute recess and then we'll come back out. 13 So, it's 11:35 -- see this is what I like about this 14 courtroom, this clock works, mine doesn't. 15 It's 11:35, so we'll be back at 11:45. Thank 16 you. 17 THE MARSHAL: All rise. The Court is in recess. (Recess is taken.) 18 19 THE COURT: All right. 20 We're back on the record, the parties are 2.1 present on State versus Hall and the defendant is 22 here. Thank you to Detective Wheeler. 23 We can bring the jury in, please. 2.4 (Jury enters.) 25 THE COURT: Does counsel stipulate to the 26 presence of all jurors and alternates? 27 ATTY. DAVIS: Yes, Your Honor.

ATTY. BERKE: Defense stipulates. THE COURT: Thank you. Please be seated everyone. As I indicated ladies and gentlemen, and that was the conclusion of direct examination. At this point, we have the second part of cross examination.

1 DAN WHEELER, 2 called as a witness by Attorney Palermo, having been duly sworn in, was examined and testified under oath as follows: 4 THE COURT: Attorney Berke, please. 5 ATTY. BERKE: Thank you. 6 CROSS EXAMINATION BY ATTY. BERKE: (Cont.) 7 Detective, did you take part in scheduling the 8 forensic examination of L.T.? 9 Α Yes. 10 And did you take part in scheduling a subsequent medical exam? 11 12 Α No. On May 27th, 2020, it was brought to your attention 13 14 that there was an audio tape of L.T. that was taken by G.T. 15 Α Yes. 16 And that was transmitted to the department on -- your police department on June 1st of 2020? 17 18 Α Yes. 19 When you were advised that there was an audio tape, 20 was that over the phone or was that in person? 21 That was over the phone. 22 And do you know of any limitations at that time on 23 why that audio tape couldn't be submitted to you on May 27th 2.4 when you found out of this -- its existence? 25 Α No. 26 Did you follow up to identify when that audio tape 27 would be submitted to you?

BERKE: 18 19 During the context of the interview with Nick Hall, 20 do you remember a comment by either you or Detective Lavin 21 to Mr. Hall that evidence was found not just in the bedroom? 22 Yes. It's a form 20 that was revised and effective May 1st, 2018. 2.1 It indicated it's completed by Trumball Police 22 Department, and it has Detective Wheeler's email address. 23 2.4 So go ahead. 25 And we'll have to -- it -- I'm just going to ask 26 that this -- we're going to have to -- the victim's 27 name is in it fully on the first line.

1 So, we're going to have to redact it. I didn't 2 know that when I had it marked. Shame on me. 3 ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, in fact, I was going 4 to have a different --5 THE COURT: Oh, so you were --ATTY. BERKE: -- version of that marked --6 7 THE COURT: Yep. Sorry about that. 8 So, this will be marked for ID and sealed, and 9 then the other one would be -- could be coming in. 10 So --ATTY. BERKE: Although I did not redact it 11 12 because --13 THE COURT: We could do it. 14 ATTY. BERKE: So, if I can have this version 15 marked for ID, please. 16 THE COURT: Sorry about that. 17 ATTY. BERKE: There's a small -- the only 18 difference with the version I'm submitting is that at 19 the bottom there's a -- the Bates stamp from the 20 State's Attorney's Office. 21 THE COURT: Okay. Okay. Go ahead. Why should 22 it come in. 23 ATTY. BERKE: (Indiscernible.) 2.4 THE COURT: And why is it not hearsay? 25 ATTY. BERKE: It should come in under a couple 26 of grounds. Recording recollection, business record, 27 and residual hearsay.

1 Let me start with residual hearsay. The 2 trustworthiness of the document, it's -- it was 3 presented to the Court through the witness from the 4 Trumball Police Department's file itself. 5 Although it's not signed, I think the adoption 6 of the Trumball Police Department file with the name 7 -- this detective, the date, and other qualifying 8 information. 9 Secondly, the significance of the State's 10 Attorney's Office stamp on the bottom, this was received in the course of discovery. And that's 11 12 another addition of its reliability, I received this 13 from the State. It's not something that I generated 14 or created myself. 15 THE COURT: No, and I don't think that's 16 counsel's argument that you would have retrieved it 17 or done anything to it. Just because it's in 18 discovery or discoverable doesn't make it not 19 hearsay. 20 ATTY. BERKE: I understand that. I'm just 2.1 talking about its inherent reliability. 22 THE COURT: Counsel, I mean, it's a business 23 record, right? It's kept in the ordinary --2.4 ATTY. PALERMO: It --25 THE COURT: -- course of Trumball P.D. 26 ATTY. PALERMO: Well --27 THE COURT: In fact, counsel -- he went and

1 retrieved it. 2 Sorry. 3 ATTY. PALERMO: If I could -- first of all, if I 4 could ask the detective, this isn't a -- this is not 5 a Trumball Police Department form, Your Honor. This is a State of -- this is a lab form. 6 This 7 is not a Trumball Police Department form. 8 detective is not familiar with this form, he doesn't 9 use this form. 10 He has no present recollection of ever filling this form out. He does not fill out this form in the 11 12 regular course of his police business. 13 THE COURT: Yep. But it's still part of a -- I mean, we put hospital records in through non, you 14 15 know, people who don't make the records. 16 ATTY. PALERMO: Right. 17 But he has no --18 THE COURT: Do you understand what I'm saying? 19 ATTY. PALERMO: -- recollection of filling this out, Your Honor. 20 2.1 THE COURT: He doesn't have a recollection of 22 what we just saw on the video. 23 ATTY. PALERMO: But, Your Honor, we don't know 2.4 who put in this information. This is a form that was 25 -- he was asked to go to -- to records and find this 26 form. 27 So, does that mean that I should put in every

1 police report he made? Because it's the same thing 2 that I would ask that it be allowed to put in his 3 police reports. 4 This is a document that he has no recollection 5 of filling out. He may have filled it out, but he 6 has no present recollection. It's not something he 7 -- he does in the ordinary course of his business to 8 fill this out. 9 And it's -- then every police report should go 10 in too then. THE COURT: But --11 12 (Pause in proceedings.) ATTY. PALERMO: Your Honor, this is a rare form 13 14 that apparently the lab requires when evidence is 15 submitted without a sex kit in a sexual assault case. 16 So, I think, one, there's -- it's hearsay and 17 it's not something he has any recollection of. We 18 have no idea who filled it out and it's like any 19 other -- it's like any other business record. 20 All police reports are business records too but 2.1 they -- that doesn't mean they get in, Your Honor. 2.2 THE COURT: No, and I --23 ATTY. PALERMO: I mean --2.4 THE COURT: I understand -- I understand that. 25 But I mean, you know, here, in this case, the fact 26 that he doesn't remember filling it out, the fact

that somebody filled it out and put his email address

on it.

I mean, isn't counsel allowed to explore the fact that there was evidence submitted to the -- it's kind of cumulative in a sense. Evidence was submitted to the lab and there was not a sex kit done.

I mean, isn't that what this document says?

ATTY. PALERMO: Well, I think the purpose that counsel's trying to get it in are there are dates on these that don't correspond with his testimony and he's saying I didn't fill out -- I don't -- I don't recall filling this form out.

He may have sent it to the lab, but he -- I've asked him independently do you remember filling this form out at the request of the lab and he's going to say I don't remember filling it out. He doesn't even know if this information was put in there by himself or someone else.

And the information is contradictory to what he's testified to. So maybe someone else put this in and we don't know who. And they put his email in it because this -- he was the lead detective.

So, this was sent to the lab, I believe through his email but as I talked to him yesterday or -- I don't know when I spoke to him -- he has no recollection of ever filling this form out, Your Honor.

1 And this is not something he fills out. 2 doesn't even recall if he's ever seen this form even 3 blank before. 4 THE COURT: Okay. 5 ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, if it was sent from 6 his email, certainly, the trustworthiness that it came from him -- I wasn't aware of that fact --7 8 THE COURT: Well, I'm not so sure we can say it 9 was sent from an email because it's not a -- his 10 email is listed on it. ATTY. BERKE: That's just something that I 11 12 thought was just stated to the Court, that it was sent from his email. 13 14 ATTY. PALERMO: It -- I asked the detective to 15 see if he could find how this -- if this was sent to 16 the lab. It was, it was sent through his email. 17 He found that out through IT, but he has no 18 recollection if someone said, listen, here's the 19 form, you need to send it to the lab. Because 20 remember he wasn't the evidence officer. 21 He didn't bring up the comforter, the mattress 22 cover, the sheets --23 THE COURT: Okay. What --2.4 ATTY. PALERMO: It was -- it was -- I believe it 25 was Detective Murray. 26 So, it's very possible that Murray filled this

out and gave the form to Detective Wheeler, but

Detective Wheeler has no recollection of this, Your
Honor.
THE COURT: Okay.

ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, it's recorded recollection -- if the item is adopted, even if he doesn't remember it, that's another ground it's possible. And if it's sent from his email, I mean, I'm not sure what else I could prove aside from his signature that he adopted it.

ATTY. PALERMO: It's not recorded recollection.

He does not remember this form. He just called IT

and asked them, was this form ever sent to the lab,

and he was told yes. But he has no recollection

present.

And the lab, I believe, sent it to Detective
Murray not Detective Wheeler. So, if Counsel wants
to ask Detective Murray if he -- if he has any
knowledge of this form, I understand that.

But to put in a record that he is not saying he generated or authored, I think is misleading the jury and it's hearsay. It's hearsay and it falls in no exception to the hearsay rule.

THE COURT: Well, I'm not quite sure it's hearsay.

And I'm not quite sure it's hearsay because it could be -- it's an out of court statement indeed, but if he -- if this was mailed from his email, I

PALERMO: From our information, the lab 26 said this a very rare form to use, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay.

1 ATTY. PALERMO: So it's not a form that's used 2 every time sexual assault evidence goes to the lab. 3 THE COURT: Okay. 4 ATTY. PALERMO: This is a rare form. 5 probably why he doesn't recognize it. Because he's never used it. 6 7 THE COURT: Okay. 8 ATTY. PALERMO: And it's not used regularly. 9 THE COURT: Anything further? 10 ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, just to perfect the record, if I may, this is also a ground, and I don't 11 12 know if I previously said this in the residual 1.3 hearsay exception a statement that is not admissible 14 under any of the foregoing sections is admissible if 15 the Court determines there is a reasonable necessity for its admission. 16 17 And two, the statement is supported by an 18 equivalent guarantees of trustworthiness and the 19 liability that are essential. 20 THE COURT: What is the necessity for it? 2.1 Impeachment. He testified about ATTY. BERKE: 2.2 certain dates and certain other factual 23 (Indiscernible) in that that are inconsistent with 2.4 his trial testimony and the defendant has a right to 25 present a defense which includes the Sixth Amendment 26 right to confrontation and confront Detective Wheeler

with his recollection and documentation.

THE COURT: Anything further?

ATTY. PALERMO: Only that how could we impeach him if he has no memory of actually creating this document. So, I think that argument falls short. If he has no memory that he put this information in, how is he being impeached by it?

ATTY. BERKE: If I may, Your Honor. Omissions -- impeachment by omission is done frequently. mean, just because someone doesn't remember it doesn't mean that you can't impeach them with it.

THE COURT: I mean, here's my problem, he just watched a video for two hours and was asked questions about that video. This is a video in which, I mean, I would think a detective would review before taking the witness stand and testifying in a case of a sexual assault.

He didn't review it. Then he sat through it, and he said, well, the audio is bad. But there are certainly questions that Counsel asked that would certainly -- that I recall being asked and I have only seen the video once.

Granted I've looked at transcripts of it.

So, you know, the fact that he doesn't remember authoring this I don't think -- it certainly fits within a business records exception.

You certainly could ask him questions on redirect with regards to it but I'm going to allow it

1 about a transcript it's 152 pages in length and when 2 I say transcript, I'm talking about the one just 3 submitted before lunch by the State. 4 ATTY. DAVIS: I have it annotated. But, of 5 course, my annotated copy is downstairs. So, I 6 apologize. 7 THE COURT: And I'm sure your annotated copy may 8 be different than --9 ATTY, DAVIS: Oh. 10 THE COURT: -- the one we have here but if you 11 can ballpark it. 12 ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, the objection I had was notice of the fact that the statement on the 26 27 devil that's --

1 ATTY. DAVIS: The State didn't consider that, 2 but I understand Counsel's remarks, but the State did 3 not consider that prior misconduct. There was no 4 arrests made, it was a verbal argument between a 5 couple. 6 If that -- every time that happened it was prior 7 misconduct, I mean, we'd be here all day. 8 ATTY. BERKE: Unfortunately, prior misconduct 9 doesn't require an arrest be made. 10 THE COURT: No, I know. ATTY. BERKE: There's a lot of content --11 12 THE COURT: I recognize that. 13 ATTY. BERKE: And I'm concerned that -- I mean, 14 I quess my concern is that there may be other issues, 15 not just this. I'm not faulting anyone but maybe we 16 should address this before this continues to happen. 17 I think this is an uncharged misconduct that 18 should be stricken from the record. There's no prior 19 notice of this. And even if it was prior notice, the 20 Court was placed under this as well as the defense 2.1 that the State wasn't seeking to utilize uncharged 2.2 misconduct. 23 ATTY. DAVIS: So -- the State's response to that 2.4 is saying that you're the devil is not -- in the 25 State's opinion -- any prior misconduct. I also 26 think it's being entered to explain the context of

the video we -- that came in as a full exhibit --

1 that portion. 2 And just to address Counsel's further concerns, 3 I don't think we're getting into anything else along 4 this realm. 5 THE COURT: If I could have just a moment, 6 please. 7 (Pause in proceedings.) 8 THE COURT: So what is the purpose of 9 introducing it? 10 ATTY. DAVIS: It goes to the defendant's state of mind. If Counsel wants it stricken where --11 THE COURT: That he's actually the devil? 12 13 ATTY. DAVIS: He says look into my eyes, I'm the 14 devil and that's what he thinks of himself. 15 THE COURT: And does the State, I mean, this is 16 -- I didn't see it coming, I'm somewhat surprised by 17 I didn't expect those particular words. 18 was there some sort of notice to Counsel upfront with 19 regards to it? 20 ATTY. DAVIS: Not about that specific adage, 2.1 because it was the State's belief that the defendant 22 would know what he said to G.T. And he speaks about 23 it in the video, which is why we inquired about it. 2.4 THE COURT: Well, you know, it's questionable 25 whether or not he speaks about it in the video. He 26 talks about paranormal, something happening, and he

doesn't come right out and say I'm the devil.

That

1 ATTY. DAVIS: He said he had to be blessed. 2 Which is the part that we took from that, that 3 there's ghosts and he had to be blessed. And, so, we 4 had asked G.T. about it and that's when we learned 5 this. 6 THE COURT: All right. The Court -- anything 7 further Attorney Berke? 8 ATTY. BERKE: Your Honor, I would ask that to be 9 stricken T --10 THE COURT: (Indiscernible.) ATTY. BERKE: I'm concerned about not having 11 12 notice of it. I'm concerned about its implications. 13 Obviously, there are, you know, rather significant 14 religious implications of claiming you're the devil. 15 It's prejudicial and I don't know how that goes 16 to state of mind necessarily. It doesn't really 17 explain to me -- his video -- is a video -- it says 18 -- if it was something that she was explaining from 19 the video, that's clearly not -- those -- that 20 language is not from the video. That's very distinct from what he's claimed 2.1 22 regarding paranormal activities. 23 THE COURT: All right. And the Court's going to 2.4 rule as follows: 25 I find that the evidence is somewhat relevant, 26 however, I'm taking into account whether or not the

facts may unduly arouse the jurors' emotions.

is whether or not -- it's the weighing of the prejudice versus probativeness.

2.4

Whether answering the proof provokes -- may create a side issue that will unduly distract the jurors and whether or not there'll be -- the defendant -- having no reasonable grounds to anticipate the evidence was unduly surprised or unprepared to meet it.

Based on that one and that factor, which is discussed in *State versus Hill*, 307 Connecticut 369, a 2013 case. Also *State versus* -- I think it's -- *George Leniart*, 166 Connecticut Appellate 142. Cert was denied in 2016.

You know, my concern is this, that the -although this is going to be it as far as it goes, I
think the witness could certainly -- could testify
that this was a contentious time but because of the
surprise to Counsel --

And I know what you're saying is -- what the

State is saying is, you know, it's to put in context

that part in the video, well, nothing in the video -
seeing paranormal, or seeing ghosts, or being

blessed --

Look, I've been blessed in many ways but that doesn't mean I'm the devil or that I believe I'm the devil. I'm going to rule that that be stricken and that I think there's other ways, certainly, the State

1 -- and I'll give you great leeway in order to discuss 2 the manner of the state of the marriage at that 3 particular time. 4 But because of the reasons I just stated that it 5 may -- it's more prejudicial than probative and also the fact that Counsel was unduly surprised as I was 6 7 with it. It doesn't matter about me, but with 8 regards to Counsel in countering, I think is 9 significant. 10 So, I'm going to not allow that. But I will certainly give you leeway in asking about the state 11 12 of the marriage. And this would be in December, so this was within two months of them being married. 13 14 Is that correct? 15 ATTY. DAVIS: January. 16 THE COURT: January. So, it was within two 17 months of their --18 ATTY. DAVIS: They got married in December 2018. 19 So, we're in January 2019. 20 THE COURT: 2019. All right. So, thank you. 2.1 So, 13 months. Thank you. 22 So, when the jury comes in, I'll -- and I'll 23 have to -- I provided to counsel a rough draft, so to speak, of my charge. 2.4 25 Of course, I'll have to amend my charge because 26 now I'm striking something and that will go to the

section of what is evidence and what is not evidence.

1 So, I'll note the State's exception for the 2 record, but I'm not going to allow it at this time. ATTY. DAVIS: Just --3 4 THE COURT: Sure. 5 ATTY. DAVIS: -- for --6 THE COURT: Anything. 7 ATTY. DAVIS: I just want --8 THE COURT: Don't worry about it. 9 ATTY. DAVIS: I think you said it was a 13 month 10 delay. I just want to make sure the Court's aware of the timeline. BERKE: -- the statement. 19 THE COURT: Yep. 20 Okay, if we could bring in the jury, please. 2.1 (Jury enters.) 2.2 THE COURT: Does counsel stipulate to the 23 presence of the jurors and alternates? 2.4 ATTY. DAVIS: The State stipulates. 25 ATTY. BERKE: Defense stipulates. 26 THE COURT: Okay. Ladies and gentlemen, there 27 was an objection just before you left, and I'm sorry,

I'm not doing this so you get your steps in, I'm doing it so we could argue freely, so to speak, and we've done that. And when I say argue, I say that in a very nice way.

So, I'm going to sustain the objection. What does that mean? That means the testimony you heard is stricken, I'm not even going to repeat it, because it's silly to do that to say. You know what you heard, and I just repeat it, now I've stricken it.

So, it means you're disregarding it. You know, at the end of the case I'll give you an instruction with regards to what is evidence and what is not evidence. You've already heard me say what is evidence numerous times.

But I'll tell you what is not in evidence and what is not in evidence is something that I've stricken which is the last thing. Some of you may have already forgotten it by going in there, but you're not as old as me, so I'm sure you still remember it.

But I'm telling you it's stricken and no -- it's not to be evidence. Go right ahead.

ATTY. DAVIS: Thank you, Your Honor.
