VITAMIN E

Here's your reminder about Vitamin E again! We want to keep those lambs growing so don't just think there is enough in the feed. Factors including growing, harvesting and storage conditions and timing will have an impact on hay and making it difficult to predict amounts in hay. Naturally occurring Vit E is more unstable making it less reliable compared to supplements.

Deficiency is common in rapidly growing lambs and sheep on dry feed. It can cause sudden deaths, weakness, growth rate drop, or reluctance to stand despite remaining alert.

Administer vitamin E by drenching in the yards or mixing it into their feed (and act quickly!).
