2020 Grant Recipients

Med-I-Assist pays for eye exams and glasses for people living at or below the poverty level. This grant will provide additional glasses and reduce 2 yearly to annual eye examinations for specific HH area. This grant will purchase equipment for fresh fruit and cases

Memory Matters offers support services to those patients afflicted with Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia. This grant supports partial cost of a certified nurse for 24 clients

National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) works to preserve and strengthen family relationships challenged by severe mental illness. This grant supports community advocacy education for those with mental illness and an updated data base

Pockets Full of Sunshine makes Beaufort County a sunnier place by employing intellectually and physically disabled people. This grant supports the micro printing process

Programs for Exceptional People (PEP) enhance the lives of disabled adults with opportunities for socialization and employment. This grant provides for additional clients and partial cost towards replacement of a damaged vehicle.

Sandalwood Community Food Pantry provides fresh food, love, dignity and spiritual guidance to 700 families mainly in the vegetable storage.

Second Helpings rescues food from supermarkets, restaurants and stores for delivery to charities and food banks to feed 5900 people weekly. This grant will go towards vehicle maintenance.

Special Olympics SC provides year-round training for special needs children and adults in a variety of sports and competitions. This grant supports purchase of materials for a one day SC Olympic track and field event

Volunteers in Medicine HHI (VIM) provides free medical, dental and mental healthcare to poverty stricken and underinsured residents. This grant will support a program to reduce the incidence of cancer by funding some 75 mammograms and pap smears to patients aged 30 and older.

Volunteers in Medicine Bluffton provides the same services as VIM HHI to Bluffton clients. This grant supports the only Diabetic Retinopathy Treatment program including screenings, treatment and injections to uninsured clients in Beaufort County



Dear Neighbors and Friends of the Foundation

When this letter was first drafted we were celebrating our annual luncheon, and the awarding of more than \$234,000 to 32 deserving organizations; I was quietly reflecting on a family wedding in London and the prospects for the year ahead. How dramatically things have changed over the course of a few weeks. With the impact of the Covid 19 virus so many of our local agencies and the people they support are facing unprecedented difficulties and almost certainly will well into the future. However, your Foundation is proactively talking to the charities that we donated to this year and establishing where we can provide additional assistance. Accordingly, I wrote to you with an appeal for extra help and I am proud to say the outpouring of support from Wexford members was terrific.

We have said many times that this is <u>your</u> Foundation, dedicated to responsibly making grants to deserving causes throughout Hilton Head and the surrounding area. Each application we receive is examined by our Grants Committee and if judged to be worthy of further consideration is allocated to a committee member for a more detailed review. Personal visits along with a detailed examination of financials, operating procedures and management structure results in a comprehensive grant application. During December, the Grants Committee meets to review all completed applications for the year before recommending to the Board of Trustees which charities should receive a grant and how much it should be. Grants are then awarded at the Grants Awards Luncheon every February and there is a follow up process to ensure grants have been correctly utilized in the way that the application described.

All of this is a very long way of saying that your donations are handled responsibly and since the Foundation operates as an all-volunteer team handling fundraising, allocation of grants and administration, nearly 97% of every dollar raised goes to the charities that we support.

We truly appreciate your involvement in whatever capacity you may be able to help because we could not do it without your support and your generous contributions.
